Anthony B. Robinson, "Be Clear About Mission"

Luke's hosted Anthony B. Robinson on Sunday, June 5 at the 10:00 o'clock service of Holy Eucharist and afterward at a brunch and discussion in Willard Hall. For many of us, having read one or more of his books, it was a chance to hear the voice behind the words and to get a sense of the personality of the author who has presented "a third way" to thousands of people.



In both his sermon and in his presentation at the midyear Diocesan Convention the previous day, he made clear the large and small ways in which the church's milieu has changed over the past 50 years. He spoke of the centrality of the Gospel and the need, always, to be clear about mission. Otherwise, we run the risk of trying either to resuscitate a Christendom institution or to create something that's "new and improved" but has no sense of direction.

In the "Question & Answer" following the brunch, Anthony shared some of what he has observed in his travels across the country—that young families are indeed interested in finding faith communities, and that the idea of the Catechumenate is not dead—and noted that he sensed the Holy Spirit at work here at St. Luke's. He also couldn't get over how much space we have here in Vermont. In fact, he commented on that in his blog the following week!

His visit was just two weeks ahead of the Vestry Retreat, and provided all of us with fresh energy for the work that took place over that weekend at Blue Hill Farm. Anthony's website, www.anthonybrobinson.com, contains postings on various topics each week, including notes from his visits to other faith communities. As we sharpen our sense of vision about what things will look like here at St. Luke's in the months and years ahead, it is inspiring to hear news of how exciting that can be! —Martha Stretton

reread the whole. Augustine for good and ill was/is the father of the theology of Western Christianity. The theology of his Confession however is not academic but experiential. It is his spiritual journey; the first such of a long line of that special and significant genre of Christian writing. The new work I am planning to read is Ian Morgan Cron's Jesus, My Father, The CIA and Me; A Memoir...of Sorts. As the author of Chasing Francis, a novel which I especially appreciated for its insights both on Saint Francis and modern Christianity, I look forward to reading this spiritual autobiography...of sorts.

I am more and more convinced that Christianity can only be communicated by sharing our spiritual journeys as they have intersected with the Gospels. I am equally convinced that we, all of us, to become disciples must be rooted in Scripture, and its intersection with the spiritual journeys of the many others from the two thousand year history of this great adventure called Christianity.

A Christian Symbol: Seeds

The Bible often uses seeds as symbols of faith or God's Word. In the Old Testament, seeds also refer to offspring. Jesus said people who believe in him can perform mighty deeds with "faith the size of a mustard seed" (Luke 17:6, NRSV).

Many of Jesus' teachings use seed imagery; for example, in the parable of the four soils, he said the seed, God's Word, can grow only when people hear it, "hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bear fruit with patient endurance" (Luke 8:15, NRSV).

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Learning Timelessness

We tend to think of our lives in terms of past, present and future. Therefore, we easily become time-bound, living under the restrictions of clocks, calendars and seasons.

The concern of the truly spiritual person, however, is the "now"—that suspension of the flow of hours, days and years. God, who isn't time-bound, breaks in upon our lives, and we sense, however distantly, the eternal. And we're refreshed, healed and lifted up.

The experience of the eternal may happen any time, even amid distraction. But the witness of the mystics is that it most frequently occurs in the time of quiet abandonment in prayer. As we grow spiritually, we become less time-bound and discover that the God of grace isn't limited to the passage of the hours, days and years.

Next year we look forward to another round, when we will offer some alternatives for those folks with shellfish allergies. —*Martha Stretton*

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
Rector on Vacation in July

Richard Crocker Receives Housing Trust Award

At the June 8th Annual Meeting and Picnic of Windham & Windsor Housing Trust, Richard Crocker (a member of St. Luke's Church) was awarded the 2011 Thomas C. Yahn Housing Leadership Award.



"Rockingham Area Community Land Trust (RACLT) has had many dedicated volunteers over the years, but none as dedicated as its current President, Richard Crocker," said Connie Snow at the award ceremony.

Richard first became involved when he purchased a home through the Land Trust in



1995, and joined the board of directors soon after that. He served on the board from 1995-2000, the last two years as President. Under Richard's leadership, RACLT developed the Exner Block in Bellows Falls, and became a chartered member of NeighborWorks America. After a sabbatical, Richard returned to the board in December 2004, serving as Treasurer, Vice President, and ultimately as President from 2008-2011. During this period, the restoration of Union Square in Windsor was completed, as well as the Williams, Pine and South Street redevelopment projects in Bellows Falls.

"Perhaps because Richard has been a Land Trust homeowner, he understands why we do this work on a personal level", said Snow. —from the 2011 Spring Newsletter of the Windham & Windsor Housing Trust.

Back To School Collection For PINS

PINS (Partners in Service) in one of the organizations that St. Luke's Church supports through its Outreach Program. We work closely with the Vermont Department of Child and Family Services. Its mission is to bring together faith communities with human service agencies. They promote the resiliency and success of children and youth who have been victims of abuse and neglect, ranging in age from infants to young adults. With the economic downturn the caseload at the Springfield office has greatly increased.

For the past 2 summers the PINS committee asked the congregation for back-to-school items to give in backpacks for kids from kindergarten to seniors in high school. The first year we filled 25 backpacks. Last year we were able to fill 34 backpacks and give them to the Department of Human Services in Springfield.

We will accept backpacks of all sizes; new or clean, lightly used. The items we need are: 3-ring binders with lined paper, 3-ring 9x12" plastic folders with pockets, pens, pencils, sharpeners, erasers, rulers, 8x10" spiral notebooks, crayons, construction paper, and scissors (round tips for young kids).

The collection will go on through July and end August 14th. The collection bin will be in the back of the church. In mid-July there are usually some good sales on school items at many stores. Look for their flyers in the Sunday papers.

The need is great and every kid returning to school likes to have new equipment, especially these kids who don't often get new things.

Much Appreciated

Once again the "summer camp collection" sponsored by PINS was successful. Besides duffle bags, which are always in demand at Child and Family Services in Springfield, we were able to deliver a selection of flashlights, flip-flops, journals and pens, toiletry items and sun block cream. These items will be distributed by social workers to foster kids or to families in crisis for the children attending day or overnight camp this summer.

Thank you to all who donated to this endeavor. This annual collection is very much appreciated by the staff at Child and Family Services as St. Luke's Church is the only PINS church in the area to assist with donation of summer camp items. —*Marcia Clinton*
