This Latin word for peace us frequently seen in Christmas art and decorations, reminding us that Jesus came as the Prince




we trust that God will answer our prayers.

November Vestry Meeting Highlights


- Meeting Focus: Financials 101. The business part of the meeting on November 9 started with a "class" by Assistant Treasurer, Kathryn Wright in the basics of financial reports. Using familiar and comparable line items she created for a mythical individual, Kathryn explained like categories for St. Luke's and reviewed profit and loss reports, balance sheets, and the ins and outs of equity. A preliminary draft budget for 2016 was distributed for Vestry members to take home, review, and make suggestions. Increased pledges and new sources of income will be needed to offset present and projected losses as a result of supporters who have moved from the area.
- Rector's Report: Heidi told of her increased contact with other Vermont clergy this last month, the positive support and fellowship she experienced at the recent Diocesan Convention which prompted discussion about that experience by the Delegates present and the steady attendance of parishioners at the 8 AM service whose numbers almost approach those of the 10 AM. She outlined Advent changes for prayers and new informal talks about lectionary readings for the Bible studies starting on November 29th.
- Mutual Ministry Review: As a result of the recent Vestry review of the work and conditions at St. Luke's led by a representative from the Diocese, the Vestry will discuss and outline needs and aims for St. Luke's during 2016 at its first full Vestry meeting in the new year and then review progress in those areas at its May retreat.
- New Business: A Community Meal will be hosted by St. Luke's on Saturday January 16th. The Annual Meeting was scheduled for January 24th. A Nominating Committee composed of Pat Fromberger, Janet Hunter, and Belinda Whipple Worth was approved to secure three Vestry members for three-year terms and three Diocesan Convention Delegates and Alternates.
- **Next Vestry Meeting:** December 7th Vestry Annual Christmas Party. This potluck event will be hosted by the Hunters and include a very brief business meeting to approve the annual budget.—*Lillian Willis, Secretary/Clerk*

In Breathless Anticipation

In Whistling in the Dark (Harper One), Frederick Buechner compares Advent to the moments right before a symphony conductor raises the baton to begin a muchanticipated performance. "You hold your breath to listen," he writes. "You are aware of the beating of your heart. The extraordinary thing that is about to happen is matched only by the extraordinary moment just before it happens. Advent is the name of that moment."

During December, silence can seem elusive, Buechner admits. But "if you concentrate just for an instant, far off in the deeps somewhere you can feel the beating of your heart. For all its madness and lostness, not to mention your own, you can hear the world holding its breath."

Operation Christmas Child

Thank you so much to all of the people who helped pack up shoeboxes, made things to put in them, and donated items or shipping fees. We were able to do 193 boxes! Thank



you all for making this happen.

Boys in the 10-14 year old age range and boys 2-4 get the least amount of boxes. If anybody would like to join me in making some things for the shoeboxes for next year, we can use wash cloths, hats, mittens, etc. We can still use any kind of plastic covers from oatmeal, coffee, or big yogurt containers to be made into crocheted rings as well as water bottle, milk jug size lids to be used as game pieces and in making the tops. There is a collection box under the table on the side wall for any type of Operation Christmas Child donations you may have. We can always use little cars, small filler type items, and soap and wash cloths. We tend to run out of these items every year. We welcome any items you can give us—they don't have to be new, they just need to look new. Thank you!

One soldier told me that he put the kids pictures in his helmet and when he was feeling blue, took them out to look at them. He said it made him feel better.

The Vermont Foodbank Gather...Share...Nurture

Some of the St. Luke's church outreach funds support the Vermont Foodbank. As a member of Feeding America, their mission is to gather and share quality food and nurture partnerships so that no one in Vermont will go hungry.

In Vermont, thousands of our neighbors struggle to meet their food needs. Each year the Vermont Foodbank and their network of partners throughout the state, serve as many as 153,000 Vermonters in need of emergency food assistance. One in four Vermonters turn to food banks and meal service programs to feed themselves and their families. This includes 33,900 children and 26,010 seniors. Clients visit their local food shelf an average of 8 times a year.

St. Luke's also supports our local food shelf, The Chester-Andover Family Center, through contributions of food, money and volunteer hours. The Center is an all-volunteer organization. With no paid personnel, almost all of the money raised in the Family Center Thrift Shop are used for the purchase of food for the Food Shelf, and for the Financial Assistance Program. In addition to providing free food, in 2014, the Center responded to the following requests for assistance: 36 electric bills, 25 fuel bills and 8 rent bills. — Jane Davis, Outreach Co-Chairperson

As we have completed 10/12 of the year, October income and expenses should be 83.3% of budget, but "Current Year Pledges" are lagging severely behind at 54.9%. Cash flow is tight, so the vestry has approved moving \$15,000 from the Money Market fund we're invested in to our checking account to cover expenses through the end of the year. (Funds that aren't needed will be returned to the Money Market.) The reason that the October deficit isn't larger is that our year-to-date investment income was all posted in October. One important note is the \$31,452 deficit we projected for 2015 has been whittled down to \$8,557. (This happens every year; it's why we call it "faith-based budgeting".) —Lynda Farmer, Treasurer
