place here at St. Luke's and in other congregations. The Congregational Church, for example, will be celebrating an ordination this month. Here at St. Luke's, there is plenty going on. Lillian's gardening workshop is in full swing and will continue her workshop this month, thanks to our Stirring of the Spirit grant. Our Mid-week Eucharist will not be taking a break this summer but will continue through the summer months. After our Adult Study series in Mark's Gospel ends this month, plans are underway to begin another study sometime in July. More information about this will come as the time nears.

In our corporate worship this month, we are entering into "Ordinary Time" also known as the "Season after the Pentecost." Though this season lasts for quite a while, "Ordinary Time" need not be associated with "Normal Time." This is the season of the Holy Spirit. In this month, we return to Mark's Gospel for our Sunday Readings. One of the Readings we'll hear will be the "Parable of the Growing Seed" that Jesus shares with his disciples and with others gathered with them. As with all his parables about seeds, this parable points to the kingdom of God. "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground...," Jesus says. I like to think of this parable as one of the "willy-nilly sowing" stories Jesus tells. The sower goes out and strews the seed all around, not seeming to care much as to where they will land. That speaks to me of the work of the Holy Spirit in our church and community. Then when the sower is finished, the seeds begin to sprout and grow while the sower sleeps. So, as we embrace summer, may we indeed find our rest in knowing that the Holy Spirit is at work in and through us to "grow us together" in Christ. Knowing this makes our summer far from ordinary!



Thank You God...For This Past Season of Church School

n Pentecost Sunday, which also marks Memorial Day, we remembered all the people in the Bible who we have learned about this year: ones who have "walked with God." It was good to hear everything that our children have remembered: Adam and Eve, the first people; Noah, who listened to God and built the Ark to save his family and the creatures of the Earth; Abraham, who made a great covenant with God; his wife Sarah, who laughed when she heard the news that she would become a mother in her old age. Also fresh in the children's minds was the story of Moses, and the women who guided him: his mother Jochebed who put him in a basket on the Nile; his sister Miriam who watched over that basket as Pharaoh's daughter Bithia found and adopted little Moses. The children know that Moses had a terrible temper that led him to kill an Egyptian, and that he ran away to escape being punished; that he met his wife Zipporah at a spring where he defended her against the shepherds who tried to hog all the water; that it was while shepherding her father's sheep that Moses met God in the burning bush; that God's first words to Moses were, "Take off your shoes, for the place where you are standing is holy ground." They remembered too, on Memorial Day, how God sent plagues on Egypt to convince Pharaoh to "let my people go," and how eventually they did go, in haste, and how they crossed the Red Sea, and how Pharaoh's armies were destroyed behind them; and how Moses smote the rock to get water, and later went on top of the holy mountain for forty days and nights to receive the Commandments; and how Moses' temper struck again when he saw the golden calf being worshipped.

Above all this, they know that the rainbow is a sign of God's covenant; that God promised Abraham and Sarah that their children would number more than the stars in the sky; and that Moses is to lead God's people to a land flowing with milk and honey: the Promised Land. And we are reminded each week that Jesus is shown in the stained glass at the front of the Sanctuary, teaching children—and that if we look closely, there are some around Jesus who have gray hair too.

Really, they know a lot. I do wish there were more kids in Sunday School, but the ones who are there sure are taking it in. We hope this lays the foundation for the faith that will sustain them. Even at their tender ages, they have a growing sense of the mysteries of life: where do we come from; how do we grow; what happens when we die? What a joy it is to teach them now!

Sunday School will take a vacation for the summer and will resume after Labor Day. At our last lesson in June the children will receive a challenge for the summer: to learn the 23rd Psalm and the Lord's Prayer; and on June 7 the Sunday School will be teaching the whole congregation

the beautiful prayer that Father Ian taught us, as well as a couple of songs that we love. Please join in!

To everyone who has supported these precious children as they grow—that is, our whole congregation—thank you. Bonnie and Lew, Ashley, Jessica, Lillian, all of the Meeting Ministers, all who have offered to help, and maybe most of all the anonymous donors who kept the Sanctuary warm so we could "make a joyful noise" downstairs; we thank you.

But from the perspective of a child, there was a certain kind of visit that stood out from the rest: those times when Mary Anderson and Margie DesLauriers were with us. Mary and Margie are young women out in the world; yet they are not so very far from where our young children stand today. When Mary and Margie join us, as each did at key moments in the year—on vacation from college, for instance, or after a spectacular dance recital—the children do sit up and listen. Mary shares the particular excitement of being on the verge of college; Margie has given them a shining example of how it feels when you leave home and make choices about what you want to learn. In these young women, our kids see what it means to grow and "walk with God." It means the world to them.

Thank you, St. Luke's community. Thank You God for all our blessings!

My Vegetable Garden Classes Begin



Participants in the gardening project were very enthusiastic about the different supplies in their "goodie" bags and about learning how to use them.

The first class session of this gardening project, co-sponsored by St. Luke's Church and the Episcopal Diocese of Vermont, took place in Willard Hall on Thursday, May 14 from 10:00 a.m. to noon. Gardeners received a 9'x12' piece of heavy-duty landscape fabric, three 3'x12' strips of white row cover, horizontal and vertical layout plans, plot preparation and planting instructions, and a bag of supplies. The supplies

included a trowel, weeding tool, garden gloves, paper cups for tomato plants to deter cutworms, a container of Miracle-Gro, two old nylon stockings to tie up the tomato plants, and envelopes of garden seeds (green and purple beans, beets, carrots, lettuce, Swiss chard, zucchini summer squash, and butternut winter squash).

How to layout the garden, cut the fabric, ameliorate the soil, and plant and care for the seeds were discussed and questions answered.

After the class, the gardeners loaded into their cars bags each of potting soil, composted cow manure, and sand, plus a large plastic container in which to mix soil and later collect weeds or vegetables. Also live plants of broccoli, Brussels sprouts, 2 kinds of cabbage, two Roma tomato plants, 2 tomato stakes, and 6 different herbs (chives, Egyptian onions, oregano, parsley, sage, and Italian basil). Happy women left the parking lot, and none has answered my follow-up email with cries of help. We shall see if their enthusiasm continues by Session #2 on June 18. —Lillian Willis

The bottom line for April doesn't look very promising but there is an explanation for the big increase in expenses during April. The first thing (and not really great news) is that our pledge income was down for the month compared to previous months. Please try to keep your pledge payments current, even when you are away. The church's bills don't take a vacation. **The second situation** we ran into in April is that we had to have not one, but two emergency service calls for the furnace. The cost of these, added to another call earlier in the year, is over \$1,100.00.

And the final item that put us a little bit into the hole is that the Diocese and the Church Pension Fund caught up with their paperwork to get Heidi's pension contributions started along with the bills for health & dental insurance for Heidi & Doug. So we had to pay 3 months worth of premiums in April for these. Overall, we're hanging in there – with 33.3% of the year gone, we are about 12% ahead of budget on the income side and only 3.5% over budget on our expenses. —Bonnie Johnson
