Interim Rector Reflections



There aren't many times when a Rector gets the chance to reflect on things accomplished. Life just always seems to charge along nonstop until one stops long enough to stop and looks back. As we enter our last few weeks of working together, some thoughts that have been gathering wool are coming together as more of a tapestry worth sharing. As

of this writing, the vestry is busy with the diocese figuring out what will be important for St. Luke's in order to build upon the rich time that we have shared together for a year and a half.

I think St. Luke's is at a cusp—things could go either way. You could return to the comfortable ways from the days of yore ("The Banner Years" as the latest glossy picture poster says) or you can step out and keep trusting that God's Spirit is leading you...which is what I believe. Here is some evidence that supports my thinking:

- There are at least twelve new people who have been coming regularly and are now in our new updated and reprinted Directory.
- There are at least **seven families** "from the diaspora" (members who have drifted on outer rings of the parish) representing seventeen folks who have moved significantly closer in their orbit because they worship more regularly and are currently involved in some aspect of ministry at St. Luke's.
- There are at least two more families I have seen who seem to be pondering a return.
- Of those above, there are nine children represented and one youth who will be doing childcare next year who did not participate that way in the past.
- This past winter two families donated a total of \$5,500 so we could continue worshipping in the church building. This enabled the children's program to get a footing in establishing some routine and spiritual learning for the children. We have tracked the oil usage as well as attendance (to compare to last year) and hopefully that data will be available soon.

Personally, I think it was worth it. A number of our new members began to attend over the winter and have kept coming.

- Speaking of which, we had a full year of **Children's Formation**—weekly!!! Running a weekly program is pretty daunting but thanks to several faithful parishioners, we mapped out a strategy and managed to keep it going from Advent through June 8. This program also enabled a number of parishioners to come visit with the children and share their unique ministries with them. Music, crafts, Godly Play stories have all enriched this time with our children. Research shows a child needs to form about five or six significant relationships in a church community in order for them to stick with "church"as they grow older. We are heading in a good direction.
- This winter saw us **add two young acolytes** to our worship leadership ranks. They were wonderful!!!
- The Lunch Bunch Book Group has decided to continue together after I leave. In a recent reminder of what chapter to read from Henri Nouwen's book: Can You Drink the Cup? this was added: "...please feel free to bring your thoughts and reactions to this section. What does having to hold our own cup mean? Where is God in this picture? Other thoughts?" The exciting part of that question is that it came from a lay person who is tapping into her own faith journey and bringing that spiritual leadership forward to others. Wonderful!
- We have a number of folks who are connected to **Diocesan activities:** Kathryn Wright, our Senior Warden, serves on the Diocesan Council as well as the Finance Committee for the diocese. She is also a Safer Church Trainer for the diocese. Jean Hancock is our Stirrings of the Spirit representative as well as a Companion in Transitional Ministry. Kathryn, Jean and Jane Davis will be our reps at convention this year.
- Outreach has found its footing again and with fresh leadership is asking good questions and examining this ministry at St. Luke's. This includes involvement in the greater community through the monthly Saturday community lunches.
- And speaking of community involvement, we cannot forget to mention the annual Lego Contest that is bursting at the seams each year—also the new "Sale on the Screen" in September that is still evolving in its mission.
- The Worship Committee has been involved this year in helping to shape some pieces of our liturgy such as the Prayers of the People & the Healing Prayers each week.

- The Choir and new Musical Director are steadily developing this ministry together. The addition of choir members for Easter added so much to our worship and now there is at least one new member singing in our ranks. In addition, our Musical Director is a composer and has produced his first CD of original music!! Hopefully a concert of his music will happen soon. Jacob is also working with Gethsemane in Proctors-ville...could it be possible that a mutual concert with these two Episcopal congregations might be possible one day?
- The Office Guild has been "learning the ropes" of keeping an eye on all things administrative as best as they can, given they are only available a few hours each week. Computer work, mail, scheduling for lay readers and liturgical leadership, monitoring the answering machine and "figuring things out" will assist the next clergy leadership to arrive at St. Luke's.
- There is some renewal happening in our formal welcome to newcomers as Progressive Dinners are resurrected in addition to the renewal of Quarterly Saturday Night Suppers with a program theme. These are in addition to the ongoing life that gathers all for meals around faith and fellowship throughout the year.
- And last but certainly not least, our gathering space in Willard Hall as well as the classrooms and office area is newly spiffed up—cleaned, painted, refurbished, doors moved, new lighting installed and ready for the ongoing life of St. Luke's.

These are all important signs of the Spirit at work in St. Luke's—but you are at a point of decision as to how to go forward or rest comfortably back. It is my prayer for you that you continue to listen to God's Spirit at work among you. Ask questions. Seek answers. Take a chance. Have fun. Give in to adventure. Step out in faith and do not be afraid. God is leading you into God's future and what fun it is along the way of getting there. Oh, and don't forget to trust that God is in the front seat driving the bus!

Next Steps In Our Search For A Rector

On Thursday, May 14 the Ministry Discernment Committee met over dinner with Bishop Ely, Canon Lynn Bates and our Vestry. She led a discussion of the narrative questions and the Office of Transition Ministry (OTM) Portfolio for comments, suggestions and clarity. This Diocesan input helps us understand how prospective clergy will view St.



Luke's. It also provides an opportunity to insure everyone is on the same page with regard to compensation. Bishop Ely commented that we have gone deep into our history with nothing hidden under the rug. We have an attractive portfolio that should draw an interesting range of candidates. Lew then walked the group through the church website, again with comments and suggestions to insure clarity since interested clergy usually visit a website first. You can see changes already, and comments and suggestions are especially welcome going forward.

On Sunday afternoon, May 18 MDC gathered off site at NewsBank Conference Center with our Diocesan Companion Ann Cooper and Peter Smith, a facilitator from the Diocese. This important meeting provided MDC with an opportunity to share our deepest thoughts on how we work as a team with a goal of building cohesiveness going forward.

After the OTM Portfolio, reflecting the final changes, is approved by the Vestry, it will be posted by Canon Bates on the Episcopal Office of Transition Ministry website. We will then carefully and faithfully review approved names submitted by the Diocese.

Leonard Sweet, author of *Strong in the Broken Places*, describes a style of Japanese pottery called kintsukuroi. It's the art of repairing pottery with gold or silver lacquer, leaving the piece more beautiful for having been broken.
