Memory and Communion

"This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." Luke 22:19



For nigh unto two thousand years the heart of Christianity and Christian worship has been found in the Eucharist/Communion. This has been so whether it was done simply or with greater elaboration; whether frequently, at least weekly, or at longer intervals. This has been so whether done in the open air, in a hovel, or in a massive cathedral; whether with many

gathered or with a few.

Eucharistic worship has been the constant alongside baptism for Christians at all times in the long and often tortuous history of the church. It has always sustained the saints of God. Theologians have devised all sorts of explanations for what occurs, what happens, at this gathering together by Christians for the breaking of the bread. Equally these explanations have been fought over, both figuratively, and, regrettably all too often, in actuality.

At its heart, and most simply put the Eucharist is a unique encounter with Jesus Christ; not the Jesus of history only, nor the Jesus solely of two thousand years ago. It is always communion with the risen and living Jesus now; whenever now is. It does not preclude encountering Jesus Christ along the road, in what-

From the Senior Warden

This month's column is a bit of a hodge-podge of things financial. St. Luke's is blessed to have a knowledgeable and hard-working Finance Committee, made up of Sally Hoover, Fr. Sanford Johnson, Peter Rosengarten, and Kathryn Wright. Among other things, this committee is responsible for drafting



the budget each year and for producing policies as needed to guide our use of St. Luke's financial resources. They also provide consultation to the Vestry throughout the year as issues arise.

Sally Hoover is also, as you probably know, our Church Treasurer, assisted by Norm Harrison. These are demanding jobs, requiring much attention to detail and a fair amount of computer wrangling, at least on Sally's part. We are grateful for their willingness to give so generously of their time and expertise to St. Luke's.

St. Luke's has several "Restricted Funds" on its books. These funds contain monies designated for specific uses. For example, we have a *Handicapped Access* fund, a *Memorial Garden* fund, a *Camp Scholarship* fund, an *Organ Maintenance* fund, and several others. At its last meeting on June 16, the Vestry added another fund to this list, to hold donations for replacing the chairs in Willard Hall. Suggested by a parishioner who made the initial contribution, this fund will be used to provide more comfortable seating than the metal chairs we currently have.

Vestry discussions often necessarily focus on money. There is an inherent tension arising from all the various requests, requirements, and wishes for how our money should be spent. This year's deficit budget heightens these tensions. (See related article in this issue of LITS.)

As a general rule, the Restricted Funds are not funded unless people wish to make a directed donation to them*. For example, if one wanted to make a donation to the Memorial Garden fund, he or she would need to let Norm know of this intention and this money would go directly to that fund. Likewise, when a memorial garden expenditure is made, the money comes directly from that fund. Likewise, donations to the "Chairs" fund, the Organ Maintenance

events of life, to live out this Eucharistic encounter, this communion, in all encounters; that they too become communions with Christ Jesus.

In a dismembered and dismembering world, Christians have always been called to re-member. In the Eucharistic remembering the past becomes present, the present past, and all things are moving into the future of God. In this Christian remembering, in the Eucharist, all things and all persons including ourselves are found together in the transforming forgiveness and love of Christ Jesus; the living and the dead, the wronged and those who have done the wrong, and all the other categories of human division that we have created in this world. They are being transcended and eventually resolved in a unity beyond our making, but not beyond or without our participation. Thanks be to God. — Lest we forget.

fund, etc. are entirely at the discretion of individual donors and money accrues only as people make contributions to the account. As these are not part of our operating expenses, they do not become a part of the budget process.

If you haven't done so lately, you might consider expressing your gratitude to the folks mentioned at the beginning of this column. Their work is certainly appreciated by the Vestry, and we are grateful to have such depth of knowledge available to us.

* One exception, for example, is the Camp Scholarship fund, which is a budget line item. At the end of the year, any unused funds from that account are rolled into the Restricted Fund bearing that name.

Our Budget Challenge

At the beginning of the year we stepped out in faith and approved a budget with a deficit of about \$21,000.00 trusting that, as the year progressed, God would meet our needs – not our wants – but our needs as we serve as His people here in the Chester area. At mid-year we can say that the good news financially is that our income has met and even exceeded our expenses slightly. As you will see from the treasurer's report, we are currently in the black. And a number of people in the parish are working on fundraising projects to help us meet our needs for the remainder of the year.

But we must share with the whole parish that we do still have a financial challenge of an \$18,000.00 deficit which may force the Vestry to make some very hard decisions and choices before year's end. So we ask that everyone prayerfully consider what they might offer to assist St. Luke's continuance as a vibrant presence and witness.

The Vestry is not making any decisions at this moment, but wants the parish to be aware of the situation.



He was an exceptional, hands-on father to his three sons and daughter, as attested to in the heartfelt tribute written by his son Bruce and printed on the memorial service bulletin.

Called to Be a Church

A the June Vestry/Parish book study on "Called To Be A Church" we began to look at interpreting Act 1:1-14 as scripture and how to engage Acts 1 for today's church. Many of the points in this chapter are relevant to St. Luke's as we seek God's direction for us. Here are a few highlights as food for thought and to encourage more parishioners to join this monthly discussion.

- Remembering the church's story (Acts) reminds us of who we are and whose we are: it reminds us of our purpose by telling of the formative events and experiences in our history.
- Breaking bread together and breaking open the bread of life, Scripture, were both crucial elements of Jesus' extended preparation of his apostles.
- Jesus gives the responsibility for the work of restoring God's Kingdom and carrying on his great ministry, back to the people (us)... "you will be my witnesses."
- The church does not have a mission—it is the mission. Mission belongs to the whole church. Those of us who are baptized Christians are all missionaries, set down here to be witnesses to God's love and God's dream for a broken and bruised creation.
- To become a Christian is to "join up," to be a part of the long line of witnesses, members of Christ's body on earth, bearing witness to a love and power that moves the planets and heals hearts. This mission, this purpose, belongs to us all...but we also are reminded that the mission is not our own: it is God's mission, which began before us and will continue after us.
- A time of waiting: We don't go (on this mission) when we are ready—or think we are; we go when God sends us. That is, we don't go in our strength alone; we go in the strength of the Lord. We must await the coming of the Spirit, who will empower us to fulfill our calling to be the church.

At the next **Vestry/Parish Book Study** on **August 18, 6:00 p.m.** in Willard Hall, we will read and discuss Chapter 4 (Acts 2:1-20). Please come to join us, even if you haven't begun reading "Called To Be A Church", you are welcome to sit in on a discussion.
