Pentecost!

The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. John 3:8
And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Acts 2:2



Lately many of my thoughts and reflections have been focused on the upcoming feast of Pentecost, and in particular the use of the imagery of wind as applied to the Holy Spirit. Now, however, as I write this I find both prayers and thoughts also have been turned to the reality of other winds and their effects; to the people of Joplin, Missouri following the devastating tornado of yesterday evening, May 22. At last count the death toll stands at 116. Among those who have survived many lives will have been changed forever; all this occurring within a very short period of ten to fifteen minutes of time. These are only the latest casualties in a year of horrendous tornadoes; of great loss, greater sorrow, and greatest need.

I myself have experienced two tornadoes close at hand, and directly lived through a hail storm with just a little less than tornado scale winds. I have forever imprinted in my memory an August day turned into a winter landscape with leafless and fallen trees, a barren landscape, windowless houses, and the ground covered with softball sized hail. All of which has given me a very healthy respect for the force of the wind, its violence and power. Witnessed, such

Anthony B. Robinson, Well-Known Author and Speaker to Preach at St. Luke's on June 5

On Sunday, June 5th, Anthony B. Robinson will be the guest preacher at the 10:00 a.m. worship service at St. Luke's Church. He is the author of many books, including two books the Parish/Vestry Book Study Group have discussed and continue to discuss: "Changing the Conversation—A Third Way for Congregations" and "Called to be Church—The Book of Acts for a New Day," the later title co-authored by Robert W. Wall



The Rev. Mr. Robinson is an ordained Minister of the United Church of Christ, who has served four congregations. His present ministry is a multi-faceted one. He travels throughout North America as a speaker, teacher, preacher, consultant and coach serving congregations and their leaders. He is a graduate of Willamette University in Salem, Oregon. He holds a Master's degree in European Cultural and Intellectual History from the University of Oregon. His Master of Divinity degree is from New York's Union Theology Seminary. He has done post-graduate study at Harvard Divinity School as a Merrill Fellow. He is well-known and respected as attested in the following quote:

underestimated. Wind can be fearful in the sense of one standing, or perhaps prostrate, before it full of awe.

Fear is not found in the wind itself. Its nexus is all too often found in our casual relationship with the world in which we live and in our equally casual relationships with God and each other. There is something to be feared in these, and it requires the winds of change. It requires the Holy Spirit.

I firmly believe that Scripture intentionally uses the imagery of wind for the Spirit knowing full well its implications of force and even violent life changing power. The wonderment is that we blithely invoke the coming of the Spirit, neither counting cost nor possible effect. Perhaps we don't really believe it.

On the Day of Pentecost the earliest followers of the Way experienced the Holy Spirit in such a way that it blew them out of their complicity in the death of Christ into participation in his death and resurrection. Their lives were transformed, returned to them forever changed. Invoking the Holy Spirit does this. This Pentecost may we too pray: "Come Holy Spirit," May we do so neither blithely, nor without opening ourselves to whatever change God intends for us individually or as a faith community.

May Vestry Meeting Highlights

St. Luke's Vestry met on May 18 with "Maintenance" as the main focus. After the book discussion on "*Called to be Church*", Richard Crocker shared an aspect of his spiritual journey. He spoke about how God changed his life from one of making machine parts for weapons of destruction to becoming a carpenter & builder. Highlights of the regular meeting agenda are as follows:

- **Norm Harrison** reported on the collection of the offering every Sunday. To be in compliance with new Diocese regulations, two persons will now count the collections, before the money leaves the church building.
- Co-Junior Wardens, **Richard Crocker & Andrew Pennell** reported on maintenance issues. Richard will repair the slate on the roof. Andrew will repair the buttress. Kathryn and Bill will paint the red doors and repair what needs repairing. On St. Luke's Green Up Day earlier this month a small group of workers took a huge load of items from the furnace storage area. There is still lots more to be taken away. The instructions for the alarm are next to the alarm. Our fuel costs are capped at \$3.74 for next winter.
- **Sally Hoover** presented the financial statement which Sanford commented was "remarkably unremarkable." Sally presented a new check request form which the Vestry approved. To get reimbursed one of these forms, which are available online and in the office, must be filled out.
- **Paul's** recent presentation in Randolph to Vermont clergy on "Changing the Conversation", was well received. Anthony B. Robinson will be the guest preacher at St. Luke's Sunday, June 5. The service will be followed by a brunch.
- **The Vestry** will be on their annual Retreat the weekend of June 17-18 at Blue Hill Farm in Chester. Martha Stretton will facilitate a discussion on the mission statement.
- We need to find and complete an inventory and appraisal of church furniture and fixtures.
- There is enough money in the **New Chair Fund** to purchase twelve new fold-up chairs. Another \$288 is needed to get twelve more so we can have 24 which will match. The Harrison's are spearheading this effort.
- The stove in Willard Hall will be sold for scrap as it no longer is functional due to gas leaks. Kathryn and Belinda volunteered to shop for a new standard stove(s).
- **Recognition Sunday/Parish Picnic** will be **June 12**.
- Starting in July, there will be both an 8:00 a.m. and a 10:00 a.m. service on the first Sunday of the month.
- Rudy Roundy-Winston's request to conduct another digital photography course was approved. The Vestry will send a letter to Cindy and Rudy, thanking them for all they do on behalf of St. Luke's.
- Next Vestry meeting is August 17th. (No meeting in July.)

May Worship Committee Meeting

St. Luke's Worship Committee met on Sunday, May 22 at 9:20 a.m. Those present were: Paul Brannock-Wanter, Sanford R. Johnson, Donna Reidt, Martha Stretton, Jane Davis, Pat & Mike Saul, Jean Hancock, and Pat Fromberger.

Paul announced that beginning **Sunday, July 3**, he is recommending we discontinue having only one service on the first Sunday of the month and go back to the 8:00 a.m. & 10:00 a.m. schedule. Paul said the three clergy would rotate their duties on this first Sunday (one clergy off, two on). The committee gave their sanction to this plan.

The question was asked if we would continue to offer Morning Prayer, Rite I at 7:00 a.m. on Sunday. Donna explained that this was done during Lent, but there are no plans to continue it at this point.

Sanford said the question has been raised as to why we use the same hymns for the Offertory and for Communion each Sunday. Paul explained that this was done to introduce new hymns to the parishioners and give them an opportunity to learn them. Both Paul & Martha feel this has worked well and we have broadened our repertoire of familiar hymns as a result.

Sanford also brought up that some people have requested the microphone be always used for the sermon. The clip-on mike works best for this, but is currently being repaired. Once the clip-on mike is fixed, Martha will work with Paul so he feels more comfortable using it.

Question was asked about continuing the Psalm Refrain chant on the first Sunday of the month. This will continue at the 10:00 o'clock service (skipping July & August) and resuming again on Sunday, September 4th.


