level of tolerance is reached, and truly, my tolerance has been greatly extended! In any event, such ongoing order as I once prized was illusionary at best. The disorder of the world is merely symptomatic. The real focal point of dust and disorder lies within us. Some call it sin.

Lent, which begins **February 17**, is at its roots about spring cleaning and preparation, the cleaning and preparation that precedes a special occasion. For those very few disciplined individuals, those saints, who keep their houses (their lives) in order day by day Lent holds no allure. For most of us, however, it offers an opportunity to thoroughly examine our lives, to reflect on where the clutter lies and to lay aside the weight and sin that clings so closely.

Lent offers us the time and grace to set our lives in order and to gather up the dust and cobwebs, the dirt that enshrouds our hearts and minds. Musings



nonfession: when I hear the phrase "sacred music" there is an ever-so-slight cringe at the thought of dusty hymnals, ponderous organ registrations, and dour facial expressions. These images are quickly superseded by equally painful recollections of the earnest attempts to modernize church music in the 1970's, which would be a topic for another column. How about you?

"Sacred" is commonly understood to denote that which is set aside, sanctified, holy, distinct from the everyday. How does music attain this designation? Is it a function of the sounds of the melodies, harmonies, and rhythms—the literal physical attributes of the music? Surely the text has something to do with it as well—the images evoked, the doctrines proclaimed, the exhortations extended.

Pushing the issue further, consider what exactly the sacred is set aside FOR. If it is set aside so that it can be adored for its own being, that is idolatry. If it is set aside so that it can serve us, that is presumption. If it is set aside so that it can turn us toward God, then it is indeed sacred.

Those of us in the choir at St. Luke's strive to make our musical offering as lovely as it can be, but our calling is to do so in order that we might all be moved more completely into communion with God. Whether we are singing Bach or gospel, a cappella or accompanied, with bells, or flutes, or violins, alone or joining with the congregation, we are continually challenged to remember why we are singing. It is a living act of recollection, of returning again and again to our reason for being here.

I consider the invitation to sit on St. Luke's Vestry an honor, but also a huge responsibility that made me gulp when I was



Greetings to Our St. Luke's Family from the Jewetts...

Ann and Grey Jewett started attending St. Luke's several summers ago when they came to Vermont to volunteer for the Vermont State Parks Service and as we got to know them they have shared their fascinating life with many of us. After leaving on their next venture in September 2009, Grey and Ann wrote this letter to their St. Luke's friends.

Ann and I have been living in our recreational vehicle for eleven years, since March 1999. That is when we sold our home in Pensacola, Florida and bought our first RV. Our motor home is forty feet in length and has two units called "slide-outs" which expand the interior for more comfort. The RV is a 2004, "Alfa SeeYa Gold" and it is powered by a 400 HP diesel engine.

Our RV is beneficial with respect to keeping in touch with family. They spread from coast to coast and border to border. However, the main focus of our widespread travels is to volunteer for the National and State Parks systems. Our volunteering began at the Gulf Islands National Seashore, Florida, where we worked at Forts Barrancas and Pickens. In addition we have worked at Bonneville Lock & Dam on the Columbia River, east of Portland, Oregon, for the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. State Parks include Wilgus State Park, Camp Plymouth and Little River here in Vermont and Kartchner Caverns State Park near Benson Arizona.

For the period of December 2009 through April 2010 we will be at Boyce Thompson Arboretum, Superior, Arizona and then we will return to Bonneville Lock & Dam for the spring/summer, 2010. We have been employed by the concessionaire at Old Faithful, Yellowstone National Park, and at Lake Powell, Arizona/Utah we have volunteered for the Trash Tracker Program on the Lake. During the five days of this trip we live on a house boat with friends, traveling to remote canyons and beaches on a trash barge. We have seen many remote slot canyons and beaches, the Natural Bridge, the canyon through which the Mormons pulled wagons and steps carved in the stone over which miners and their mules moved. This program is operated under the auspices of the Glen Canyon National Recreation Area, National Park Service.

Our volunteer work consumes the better part of every year, with brief times for visiting friends and family and spending our holidays together. At many parks our volunteer time requires only two to three days a week, leaving time for local travel and visiting. We have traveled to all fifty states, up the Alaska Highway and to all Canadian maritime Provinces. Hawaii, of course, was by a different mode of travel. We return to many places we love but only every other year; you might see us in 2011!

The work we do varies somewhat from place to place. At National Parks we work in visitor centers greeting visitors, answering questions and working in the retail shops. At State Parks our tasks are more physical in nature such as

grounds keeping, operating transportation equipment and leading tours. Our best experience has been the many new friends we have made and many revisited. We belong to a mail forwarding service to receive mail at different locations every couple of weeks. Our address book is quite lengthy and our lap top broadband a

Stewardship Campaign Report

As a result of St. Luke's 2009 Stewardship drive, forty six pledges were returned. Of these, forty one contained pledges, five did not. Fourteen pledges were increased and ten decreased. There were four new pledges and four who pledged last year are no longer here. The total pledged for 2010 is \$92,019 which is a decrease from the \$94,450 pledged in 2009.

The members of the Stewardship Committee have been meeting on a monthly basis during the latter half of 2009. We are attempting to highlight the different ways one can be a Good Steward to Christ and how these acts are already being implemented by members of the St. Luke's community.

Something we all know but need to remember is that stewardship is an ongoing practice. It takes many forms besides financial contributions such as driving someone to an appointment, taking food to a sick person, serving on a community board and many, many more activities.
