Transitions And Transformation



We at St. Luke's are entering a new phase in our life as a parish, just as Fr. Paul is embarking on a new chapter in his life and ministry. In his sermon on May 20th, Fr. Ian Montgomery spoke of some of our feelings as we enter this transition. The bottom line to his message is that we are held in God's hand as we move forward and God calls us to the fulfillment of His purpose for our parish and lives. On Friday evening, May

18th and the following morning, the Vestry met for their annual retreat. It is a time of fellowship and a time to look ahead in our life together. This year the focus was on our transition, and Canon Lynn Bates, the Diocesan Deployment officer, was with us to talk about our search for a new rector, and how the process proceeds. Friday evening Fr. Paul and I joined the Vestry as we offered our thanks and appreciation to Fr. Paul for his ten plus years as our rector. Then on Saturday Canon Bates and the Vestry met (without any clergy) to explore the process and way ahead.

The image that I keep seeing over the past couple of weeks or so is that of a trapeze artist. This seems to express where we are at this moment in our transition. Highlights of St. Luke's Vestry Retreat on May 18-19

The two-day Vestry Retreat, hosted by Jane Davis and Jean Hancock at beautiful Blue Hill Farm in Chester, was a time for new and current Vestry members to get to know one another better, conduct regular monthly business, and address the major matter of Paul's retirement and the continuation of services and other church responsibilities in the immediate and near future until a interim minister can be found.

At the Friday night dinner meeting, among many business matters, camp scholarships were awarded, progress reported on the plaque installation for the Memorial Garden, and plans for Recognition Sunday/Annual Parish Picnic on June 10, and recognition of a parishioner for "The Good & Faithful Servant award." The remainder of the evening was devoted to attendees sharing their personal experiences of the many positive ways Paul's ministry at St. Luke's has impacted their lives and their faith. Vestry members were urged to invite other members of the congregation to also make their appreciation known to Paul before the farewell celebration being planned for Sunday, July 1.

The Saturday morning session was dedicated to addressing the short- and long-term needs of St. Luke's and its members due to Paul's retirement and the immediate alternatives to supplying those needs, as well as the long-term process of seeking a new minister and the several choices regarding a part-time or full-time position. From the Senior Warden

A Person of Prayer



The Vestry held our Annual Retreat on May 18th and 19th, and we made a lot of progress in identifying the process that we must go through to call a new rector. We met with **Lynn Bates**, Canon to the Ordinary and the Diocese's Deployment Officer, who provided us with lots of reading material

and posed many questions that we need to answer before we can begin our search. Do we want to call an Interim, who would act as our Rector during the search process? (Since we will continue Fr. Paul's salary and benefits through October, we would call an Interim who would begin on November 1.) Do we want to align ourselves with another parish that may be struggling? If you have thoughts on either of these questions, I urge you to speak with me or another member of the Vestry. It is critical that each member of the parish has an opportunity to contribute their viewpoint on these issues.

Once we have made decisions on these two questions, we will form two committees to proceed with the search. The Self-Study Committee will compile information regarding the abundant gifts in our parish, a tally of what we have to offer to a new rector, and where we envision ourselves in the next five years. The Discernment Committee will seek and screen candidates and ultimately present their final choices to the Vestry. Each of these sub-committees of the Vestry will consist of seven members, two from the Vestry and five from the general church population. Membership in either committee will require a huge time commitment, as both will involve many, many meetings and lots of reading and discussion and prayer. The primary criteria for joining either committee, "the one bedrock quality needed in every person who will serve in this capacity, is that they are spiritually committed persons of prayer". If you are interested, centered in daily prayer and eager to do the work in finding a new rector, please let me know on which committee you'd like to serve.

The Vestry needs your prayers. We have been charged with filling the huge vacancy that Father Paul

was run by Lynn Bates from the Vermont Diocese. She is Canon to the Ordinary, a trained Transition Minister, and also a formal representative of the Bishop. She stressed that she and the Bishop are in partnership with us in the search and provided a variety of helpful written materials to aid the Vestry in the process. She noted that the search usually took 18-24 months in order to be able to assess the needs and desires of the parish, recruit the members to serve on the Ministry Discernment Committee (formerly called the Search Committee), and do the necessary research and visitations to narrow the candidates. While there is much to do, fortunately between Sanford's help and that of Ian Montgomery, the immediate basic needs are covered. That leaves the next and most important mission for a good and proper celebration of Paul's ministry when he returns for his last sermon and service on Sunday, July 1.



There will be only one service (at 10:00 a.m.) that day so that our entire community can share this time together. It is hoped that all who value Paul's ministry at St. Luke's over the past ten plus years will attend this fond farewell.

In Memoriam



Louise R. ParkNovember 3, 1919 – May 4, 2012

ouise Park was a long-time Episcopalian and member of St. Luke's in Chester for 22 years and prior to that a member of Immanuel Church in Bellows Falls for 17 years. Although raised a Methodist, Louise told Bonnie Watters, when she interviewed her for a profile in 2003, "she felt the church was too big, too unfriendly." Upon being introduced to the Episcopal Church by a friend, she was impressed with the warmth she received as a newcomer and became confirmed at age 25. Louise spent a good portion of her life being active in the church. She was secretary to Bishop Harvey Butterfield (the first time a Bishop had a secretary) and became immersed in peace, justice and rights of citizens. She became a prime mover in the Episcopal Diocese of Vermont and her communities throughout her life. She also taught Sunday School at the Cathedral and at one time was editor of the Mountain Echo.

Louise and her husband, Charles, moved to Grafton in 1976, from Burlington, where she has lived until her death on May 4. She continued to remain a strong force in the surrounding communities having founded the Rockingham Area Land Trust and served as its treasurer, served as auditor for the town of Grafton, served as a treasurer of Parks Place, and was a board member of Grafton Cares. One cannot overstate the importance of her contributions to these community outreaches. Louise Park always gave her all.

Louise was well-loved and respected at St. Luke's and was known for her savvy, outspoken opinions and her delightful sense of humor. She served as assistant treasurer, was a member of the Budget Committee and also served on search committees. She was a faithful attendant of the 8:00 a.m. service until her health made it difficult to get out and about so early in the morning.

We are all grateful to God for sharing with us the life of this dedicated and faithful servant of the Lord.


"Shrimp Boil" And So Much More

This year there were 26 in attendance and the menu was expanded to include chicken wings for those folks for whom shrimp simply doesn't work. We also had the option this year of "peeled" or "u-peel'em" shrimp. Some of us prefer the latter, as it slows down our consumption. Belinda Whipple-Worth outdid herself bringing at least 6 sauces and a delectable boiling concoction.

The Outreach Corner

Operation Christmas Child & Other Outreach Needs

Thank you to everyone who has been saving all the covers and shoe boxes! We could use some more tuna fish type cans for making the Mancala games.

We are collecting items to put inside the boxes throughout the year. We can always use school supplies—pencils, pencil sharpeners, crayons, notebooks, paper, DUAL POWER calculators, etc. Please remember our "Change For Children" jar at the back of the church, which is pretty empty at the moment. It's waiting to receive your spare change (pennies are definitely OK)—we welcome any and all change.

KAS (Knit-A-Square) is a global group of knitters/crocheters who make 8-inch squares. All the squares we send are put together with everyone else's squares to make "global" love blankets for kids in Africa with AIDS. It's the world in a blanket! Grandmothers and prisoners in South Africa help to sew these blankets together which provides them with a sense of purpose, dignity and ability to give back to their community. These blankets tell the kids how special they are. Five hundred kids become orphaned in Africa every day due to AIDS, poverty or both. Most people think of Africa as hot. The African winter is coming up very quickly and is expected to be colder than usual with temps to below freezing at night. We invite you to join us in knitting or crocheting 8-inch squares to make some blankets for them. So far, we have sent 52 (8-inch) squares to Africa (35 make a blanket), and 6 hats. KAS also needs T-shirts. undershirts, and socks in all sizes—used is fine. They also need sweaters and vests for children ages 2-10. These are knit or crocheted in rectangles and sewed together, no special stitches or patterns are needed. They can be made up in any kind of yarn and you could use up your left-over yarn to make them. Please help us warm some more children.

A local pastor will be going to Africa in the next few months and has asked for jeans to take with him. They don't have to be new but they do have to be without holes. If anyone has any they could part with, we could use any size from kids to adult.

Lastly, please don't forget our soldiers! Even though we are only supporting 2 soldiers at this time, they still need to hear how much we appreciate them and what they are doing for our country. There is a basket in Willard Hall filled with blank cards and pens. See me if you have any questions. Many thanks. —*Cindy*


PINS Collecting For Summer Camp Necessities

Once again Partners in Service (PINS) will collect items for foster kids and kids in crisis who are going to summer camp, either day camp or overnight camping. St. Luke's is the only church in this area that over the past few years has donated items necessary for kids to have a good camping experience. At the rear of the church will be a bin for donations of: duffle bags, flashlights with batteries, personal hygiene kits, flipflops, beach towels, sun block, journals with pens and clean sleeping bags. The collection will end on Sunday, June 24th.

The PINS program allows social workers and other staff to voice the needs of the children in their caseloads, needs that would otherwise go unheard and unmet. This insight allows congregations to give a focused and immediate response to these young victims of neglect, abuse and family stress. —*Marcia Clinton*

The Outreach Committee met for the first time since the Annual Meeting. Many items were discussed in trying to get a handle on what our job is and how we might get it done. We are truly blessed to have a congregation that recognizes the importance of giving and as a result we have tithed in our annual budget for the past few years. We see EVERY MEMBER of

the parish as a member of the Outreach committee and because of that we are asking for your input on the following areas.

- Selection of recipients in the past was based on the premise that the number of recipients for each year should be limited so that the support we give is meaningful. Last year there were 18 donations made: 9 local; 9 national/international. 1. What do you think about this practice?
- In the past we have allotted 50% of the funds for local charities and 50% for national/international charities.

2. What is your feeling on this practice?

- The selection of which charities/organizations to support has not been reviewed for a couple of years. Our discussion centered around supporting organizations that you are particularly interested in or personally participate in. Your thoughts please. 3. Do you have one to suggest?
- We would like to foster a deeper relationship with the recipients. Our plan is to send a letter to each recipient to develop closer ties. We would also like to have someone from the parish be the "in house" or "contact person" who would be willing to represent that particular organization. We already have members who are aware of the goals and accomplishments of past recipients. This could be a great help to those of us who are not familiar with all of these organizations and their missions. For example, Jane Davis and/or Belinda Whipple-Worth would be naturals for CHABHA and the Chester/Andover Family Center contact might be Dee Robinson, Jane Davis, Adelaide Johnson or Cindy Roundy-Winston.
- 4. Would you be willing to be the in house contact person for one or more of the recipients? Which one(s)?
- 5. What is your reaction to this approach?

We know that there are other parish members that are interested in serving on the Committee, but were not able to attend this particular meeting and we hope that they are able to attend our next meeting which is scheduled for **June 17** at **9:15 a.m.** in **Willard Hall** between services.
