"Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven." Matt. 5: 16

Journeying With God

"A great windstorm arose, and the water beat into the boat, so that the boat was already being swamped."

[Mark 4:35-41]



If you use an Ignatian contemplative practice to live into this reading, you can feel the wind in your face and feel the spray of water soaking your clothes. You rocket about in the wild lurching of the boat and the wide expanse of turbulent water that cascades over the side threatens to sink you and the boat to the bottom. Your own vulnerability and ability to

endure comes front and center. Can you make it? Is it possible to survive such a tempest? But then, Jesus comes forward, raises his hands, stills the water and in the dead calm, he turns and asks you, *"Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?"*

It is so easy to feel brave when things are going well. Not so easy when glitches come along. But we can view a setback as an obstacle to overcome or an opportunity to explore. Now, I realize that sounds like a sound bite straight from Pollyanna but think about it. What gift lies embedded in those things we might see as problems?

For example, we have now embarked on a "shake down cruise" of sorts in our music program. As we search for our next musical leader (in addition to our ongoing rector search), it can feel a bit uncertain as though our usual solid footing has been hammered a bit. Like the disciples, it is tempting to say: *"Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?"*

Jesus' calm demeanor, however, is built on trust. Trust in God. Trust that what might feel like skating on thin ice is

MDC Says Mark Your Calendar For Sunday, September 8th



We hope you have enjoyed the improving Vermont summer weather and are ready for back to school and work. Plans are now in place for another important event, an all-parish “**Appreciative Inquiry**.” It will be held on Sunday, **September 8** following the **10:00 o’clock worship service**, and will be led by our Diocesan Companion, **Ann Cooper**.

She will be asking all of us to look at four questions focusing on our spiritual values, what we have appreciated most in past rectors, and what we hope for in our new rector. As is our custom, we will share a meal, as well as provide childcare and transportation. We hope and pray for a good turnout in keeping with the earlier May History Night. This journey, like our faith, is not easy or familiar, but surely, the more participation the better the result.

If you have been worshipping with us this summer, you would know we created and made available draft copies of the *All Parish History Night* documents, both by decade and by topic, which contained the original remarks parishioners posted on the black panels back in May. We have been asking the very same question the MDC will be asking when we begin drafting our Parish Profile: What do you see? We want to know, and we continue to welcome the thoughts of those who have been a part of our community. As was noted by attentive parishioners, some significant moments and events seemed to be missing. If you have reviewed these documents and added comments, please be sure to return them to the MDC chairman to insure inclusion when the drafting of the Parish Profile is underway.

So where exactly have we been in this search for a new rector? Here are some highlights.

- **December 10, 2012** – The Vestry charged the Ministry Discernment Committee (MDC) to conduct their search in accordance with Diocesan guidelines. A budget of \$5,000 to \$8,000 was set with no geographic limitations. MDC “will recommend to the vestry three candidates from whom the vestry will discern which candidate to call as rector.” MDC should make its recommendations as close to April 1, 2014 as possible.
- **Sunday, January 6, 2013** – The Epiphany of Our Lord Jesus Christ Commissioning of the MDC at the 10 o’clock service by **Canon of the Ordinary, Lynn Bates**. A joint meeting followed the service with MDC, Vestry, Interim Rector, Carole Wageman lead by Canon Bates. Lew Watters was elected as chairman of MDC.
- **Sunday, January 20** – the first MDC meeting held following worship services on “housekeeping.”

- **Sunday, January 27** – Interim Rector, Carole Wageman led us in a so-called “Parking Lot Exercise.” As a final discussion at the Annual Meeting inside Willard Hall, parishioners were encouraged to share our hopes and dreams for the future.

- **Sunday, February 24** – MDC met following worship services led by the **Rev. John Miller, Canon Lynn Bates** and **Rev. Carole** joined us as individual spiritual and personality gifts were developed and shared, including the Meyers-Briggs Type Indicator. It required homework, but revealed a balance of talents and gifts among us. Bonnie Watters served a delicious hot meal.

- **Sunday, March 10** – MDC clusters studied from the Parking Lot Exercise with Rev. Carole.

- **Sunday, April 14** – MDC met following worship services to plan the *All Parish History Night*. We brainstormed meeting details, drafted written invitations and assigned contacts with the goal to maximize parish participation.

- **Sunday, April 28** – MDC first meeting held with our Diocesan Companion Ann Cooper. We learned that the search process is “not a corporate hire,” and History Night is first of three special meetings. We cannot decide where to go until we understand where we have been and where we are now. Ann emphasized the evening should be spontaneous and fun.

- **Wednesday, May 8** – *All Parish History Night* held at Fletcher House in Chester. Under rain showers, 38 members and friends of St. Luke’s gathered to share a light evening meal served by friends from the Baptist Church. Young and old shared histories and connections with our church under the direction of Ann Cooper along with MDC members at small group tables. Everyone posted on panels by decade: first topic, what things were going on in the World, second, what was happening in our parish, and finally what transpired in our own personal lives. It was a God filled evening. Anyone can see the results on the large panels still on display in the sanctuary, and some of us are still adding things we missed that eventful night.

- **Sunday, June 6** – MDC processed the results of the *All Parish History Night*. Rev. Carole joined us as we began seeing definite threads, social themes, strong ministries and a resilience to outside pressures. It was decided to provide written drafts of the results by decade and by topic for the purpose of further in depth study, as well as allowing for “the addition of significant missing events by anyone who wished to do so.

- **Tuesday, June 25** – MDC and Vestry held a joint meeting on Discernment at the Watters’ home. Again served around a meal Rev. Carole graciously filled in for our companion Ann Cooper who was flood bound in Middlebury. This serious leadership inquiry centered on questions of who we

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are, who do we want to be, and what specific skills and gifts will we need to get there.

MDC members are busy preparing portions of the Parish Profile describing various towns currently served by St. Luke's. Following the **All-Parish Appreciative Inquiry** on **September 8**, we will be hard at work drafting our profile for review by everyone in the parish, finalized by the Bishop and the Transition Team, including a compensation package prepared by the Vestry.

Hospitality at the Altar Part 1 of 2: Gluten Free Wafers

Unless you are serving at the altar, you might not be aware of the hospitality that takes place in special circumstances. This month and next, we address some particular situations that surface and why we do the things we do. This month: gluten-free wafers.

Gluten sensitivities have become a growing medical concern in recent years and the Church seeks to respond in a way that offers hospitality to those who have allergies to the gluten protein found in wheat and some other grains. During communion, we offer gluten free wafers that are stored in a separate container away from the gluten based wafers. If you need gluten-free, just ask and we will serve you from the gluten-free container. The celebrant will not handle it directly in case gluten particulates are on our hands from the consecration prayer. Other suggestions are certainly welcome.

Next month, Fr. Sanford will address situations for those who choose to not take communion wine. If you have any other topics you might like to see addressed, please speak with Rev. Carole.

Untapped Resources

While taking photos of the earth, the space shuttle Columbia made a surprising discovery: Underneath the harsh Sahara Desert were 26 lakes, as well as miles of underground rivers. That region's inhabitants face tough conditions because those abundant resources haven't yet been tapped.

Churches often suffer a similar problem. Congregations can't reach their full God-given potential unless people discover and use their gifts. When we tap into our talents, however, God promises that we "will be like a well-watered garden, like a spring whose waters never fail" (*Isaiah 58:11*).

Ask, Seek, Knock

The text of Rev. Carole Wageman's sermon on Sunday, July 28 was based on the Gospel of Luke 11 in which Jesus teaches his disciples how to pray. Rev. Carole ended her sermon with this prayer which we wish to share with you.

A Prayer

We are your people, Lord, and you are our God. Keep us ever in your watchful eye and be not far from us.

- Teach us how to Ask and wait for the presence of the Holy Spirit that we might not even realize is there listening through all our asking.
- Teach us how to Seek and Search for your truth and guide us in our seeking.
- Teach us how to Knock down the walls that keep us from seeing the Open Doors that stand ready to receive us. Stand beside us as we Knock to be let in to your table—the table that is already set and waiting for us to arrive.

"Ask, and it will be given you; search and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks the door will be opened." (Luke 11:9-10)

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Spiritual/Christian Formation

Christian Formation is a bit different from Christian Education. "Education" is learning about something. "Formation" is how that learning shapes our lives. An active spiritual life has always been an important aspect of life at St. Luke's. So, how can we continue to thrive spiritually during this in-between time? Is clergy leadership the only way in which we can gather and learn about God, Scripture, Jesus, etc? Are we possibly missing out on the spiritual formation opportunities that occur when two or three are gathered just for prayer or reflection?

Our Children's program is perhaps the most pressing need right now. I would like to gather a few creative and enterprising folks to help re-design how we help our children learn about God's love for them. Please speak with Rev. Carole if you are interested. If you love God, you have what it takes to share that with our kids.

PINS Back To School Donations Deadline is August 18

Although the kids have recently been released from school, the PINS committee is preparing for the next school year. For several years we have had a collection for back-to-school items to fill backpacks that are given to the Springfield Department of Family Services. The staff there distributes the backpacks to kids in foster families or families in crisis. Last year we were able to fill over 40 backpacks and hope to do the same this year. The backpacks go to kids from kindergarten to high school, so the items needed are:

- 3-Ring binders with lined paper
- 3-Hole 9"x12" plastic folders with pockets
- Pens, pencils, erasers, sharpeners, and rulers
- 8"x10" spiral notebooks
- Safety scissors, construction paper, and calculators
- Backpacks (new or in very good condition) of all sizes.

PINS (Partners in Service) is one of the organizations that St. Luke's supports through its Outreach Program. We work closely with the Vermont Department for Children and Families agency. Its mission is to bring together faith communities with human service agencies. It helps promote the resiliency and success of children and youth who have been victims of abuse and neglect, ranging in age from infants to young adults.

A bin will be in the back of the church until **Sunday, August 18th** for your donations. Every kid returning to school likes to start the year with new equipment, especially these kids who don't often get new things. Won't you help us help them? —**Marcia Clinton**

Operation Christmas Child

A heartfelt thank you for all the many donations of covers, shoeboxes, and other recycleable items! They are very much appreciated. We always have a need for any size, shape, type and color of covers or lids. Some of the games we are making require lots of covers, so please don't hesitate to bring whatever kind you have. They can be left on the table at the rear of the church.

We are now at the mid-point of summer, so keep an eye out for the school supplies sales that usually run from now through September. We always need paper of any kind, crayons, (last year we ran out of crayons way too soon), pens, pencils, pencil sharpeners, and erasers. Since all of these items go inside every shoebox, we need a lot of them and any you can provide will go a long way in helping these kids go to school. Children from third world countries are not allowed to go to school if they don't have the supplies. And even if they are able to find the supplies, it costs their parents more than a week's pay just for a box of crayons or a few pencils.

Also as you venture out on special trips this summer, keep *Operation Christmas Child* in mind as you travel and save a hotel bar of soap or two for the shoeboxes.

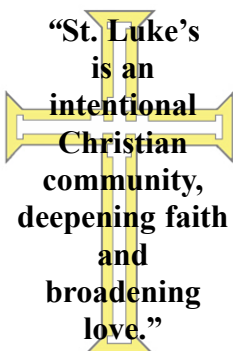
