I'd missed church the previous week because of a bad storm, so I was determined to make it through the next week's blizzard and get to the 10:00 o'clock service to worship. I'm no longer hungry. I've been fed.

Vestry Meeting Highlights...

The four new Vestry members* elected at the 2015 Annual Parish Meeting, received a warm welcome from Senior Warden, Kathryn Wright and the other Vestry members at the February 19 meeting. Lew Watters, St. Luke's church's omnipresent photographer, was on hand to capture that important moment with this great photo for the LITS and the church archives. (Note: picture caption, asterisks indicate new members and names in bold face indicate all the elected members.) The treasurer is an appointed position. This was our new Rector Heidi's first Vestry meeting as well.

- **Vestry Minutes Discussion:** Sunday Service reporters will remind parishioners that approved minutes of Vestry meetings (minutes that have been approved at the following month's Vestry meeting), as well as the agenda and financial reports, are available in the **Vestry Minutes Book** on the bookshelf at the back of the outer office in Willard Hall. The members agreed that it is important to continue giving brief oral reports at the Sunday morning services following a monthly Vestry meeting, to keep the parishioners up to date as well as be a visible presence.

- **Finance Report:** Because we are just starting the 2015 year, we don't have a tremendous number of expenses yet. However, we already know that Winter Grounds Maintenance (aka snow removal) will exceed the budget. The sidewalk now has to be shoveled after every storm because of the slide from the roof pile, and the parking lot is requiring additional plowing. Thanks to a telephone call, the Town now plows the sidewalk in front of the church as part of its regular plowing patrols.

- **Rector's Report:** Heidi thanked everyone for help moving into their apartment and making Doug and her feel welcome. She reviewed liturgical decisions for the Lenten season, as well as upcoming mid-week worship services and adult education opportunities that could provide outreach and bonding opportunities if publicized properly.

- **Senior Warden's Report:** *Stirrings of the Spirit* Grants. This is the last year of three for these community grants. The deadline for application is **March 15**, and Kathryn Wright is willing to write one or more grants. Several ideas were mentioned, but those interested in heading up any of the new efforts are urged to provide complete details and

commitment in order to receive Vestry approval in time for Kathryn to apply by the deadline.

- **Fundraising Proposal.** The Watters' Scottish friend, Derek Buchan, would like to give a piano recital at the First Baptist Church in Chester on Monday, **October 19** of Columbus Day Weekend. Proceeds from the one-hour concert, at a cost of \$20 per person, would be split evenly between the two churches to benefit specified outreach. The Baptist Church would supply the grand piano and venue. St. Luke's is asked to front \$200 for the wine-and-cheese reception afterward. Leaf season may attract more visitors and increase potential attendance, so the Vestry approved the \$200 expenditure.

- **Vestry Meetings for 2015.** Because of Vestry member conflicts, it was agreed to change the monthly meeting from the 3rd Thursday to the 1st Monday, (except in March & September when we will meet on the 2nd Monday due to holiday weekends.) Members recognize that up-to-date financial information likely will be lacking since statements are not usually ready so early in the month.

- **Arborist Offer.** In honor of Norm & Ruth Harrison, Westminster West arborist, Jordan Fletcher, who provides pruning services for many St. Luke's members, has offered pro bono tree work at the church during March. Lillian Willis will check on what is needed and get back to him with the information so he could schedule the work at his convenience.

- **Next Vestry Meeting** will be on Monday, March 9th. Focus topic is maintenance.



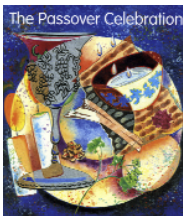
You Are Invited To A Seder Meal

Save the date of Wednesday, April 1 when St. Luke's will be holding a traditional **Seder Meal**. St. Luke's began holding Seders in 2006 as a way of acknowledging our common Jewish biblical roots. The Seder is a ritual meal that celebrates the Jewish festival of Passover (when the Israelites were "passed over" by the angel of death when the tenth and final plague (the death of all the firstborn) was visited upon Egypt.

This year's celebration will be held during Holy Week on Wednesday, **April 1st, at 6:00 p.m.** in Willard Hall. The Haumanns of Misty Mountain Farm in Townshend, have generously offered to again provide the lamb and goat for the feast. Other details are being gathered to share soon. We are asking anyone who has cooked or provided in the past—as well as asking new people—to step forward and help. Marcia Clinton is doing coconut macaroons and Bonnie Watters will make chicken and roasted potatoes, but we will need more cookies, vegetables, and salad. Kathryn Wright and Bonnie Watters are organizing this year's dinner, so if you have questions or wish to volunteer to help, be sure to let them know. Also look for a sign-up sheet at church to make your commitment to come, to cook, to help prepare that Wednesday afternoon and to clean up.

There will be no charge for the Seder Meal this year, but a freewill offering will be taken to benefit "Kids for Peace." The Seder is a family-centered affair and children have a significant part to play. It is rich in tradition and a time for joy, good eating, singing and celebrating God's redemption of us all. We hope you will come join us and invite your friends and neighbors. Reservations will be recommended since the space in Willard Hall is limited to about 85 persons. (We are looking for someone to handle the reservation calls. Please speak to Bonnie Watters if you can do this.)

Footnote: On Sunday, March, 22, the Adult Study session (following coffee hour) will review the booklet "*The Passover Celebration*" to help us gain a better understanding of the Seder Meal ritual. All who plan to be involved in or attend the Seder should attend this session.

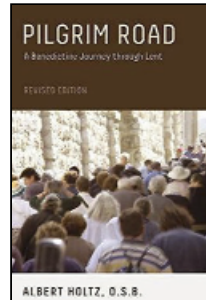

Mid-Week Eucharist & Adult Lenten Study

A Mid-week Eucharist & Adult Lenten Study began on Wednesday, **February 25**. Both are being held in Willard Hall: **9:30 a.m.** for the **Eucharist** and **10:30 a.m.** for the **Book Study**. All are welcomed to come and make this a part of your Lenten discipline. The Mid-week Eucharist is a more informal service with a short reflection on the Scripture readings or a saint the Church remembers in our "Lesser Feasts and Fasts" book from the Episcopal Church.

The title of our Lenten Study* is from the book "*The Pilgrim Road: A Benedictine Journey through Lent*" by Albert Holtz, O.S.B.. Holtz, a Benedictine monk in New Jersey, is also a master of novices and a master for Benedictine communities around the U.S. The theme of our study will center in the "Journey" we take during this Season. Each chapter is divided into short readings that cover the five weeks of Lent and Holy Week. Each week, we will choose together one or two of these readings which we will then read together and reflect on. Books for this study are in Willard Hall. There is no "homework" required but if you would like to borrow a book to read ahead, be sure to bring it back with you for the Study as there is a limited supply."
