From the Senior Warden

In about four months we will gather for our Annual Parish Meeting. Having worked for a few corporations over the years I have come to appreciate the ease with which meetings can become places where "Minutes are kept and hours are lost." Yet I find myself wishing that we could meet as a parish for business discussions more than once a year. Of course, that opportunity is present at each monthly Vestry Meeting—all parishioners are welcome to attend—and yet there's something powerful about an intentional gathering of the parish family to discuss our mutual concerns and assess our health as a faith community.



It's not too early to reflect on this year and to think and pray about the issues that lie before us as a community of faith, and to do so with our Statement of Purpose in mind.

We applied for and received a grant from the Diocese to cover the expense of our last Vestry Retreat, at which our new Statement of Purpose emerged: **"St. Luke's is an intentional Christian community, deepening faith and broadening love."** The Vestry's job in the near future will be engaging the parish in how we bring this statement forward.

How do we deepen our faith? How do we broaden our love? We need to think, pray, and work together as a parish to embrace these questions. Developing our Statement of Purpose into a shared mission will require more than a few discussions. Absent that hard work, however, what will we use as the yardstick for making decisions? Groups that are clear about mission have a way to evaluate questions that come before them. Those that do not, I suspect, have many meetings where hours are lost.

Among the several bits of business on each Annual Meeting's agenda is the election of the Vestry for the coming year.

If you feel a call to serve the parish in this way, please let any Vestry member know. The work of the Vestry is both demanding and rewarding, and many of you have given generously of your time to the parish in this capacity for years on end. Keeping fresh voices at the table is important, as is giving those who have served a term or two a chance to refresh themselves and gain new perspective by taking time off.

Deepening faith and broadening love are both challenges. Neither is complete without the other. Neither can be done in isolation. Consider how we might gather as a faith community to engage these challenges.

make them objects. We categorize; we create a them and an us, a same and another, a black and a white, an either and an or, and all too frequently, a victim and a victimizer always with irreconcilable differences. We hold these empirical truths to be self evident.

No, what I mean by living subjectively is to take an imaginative leap of the heart and to live in the faith and trust that everyone and everything is the subject of God's redeeming and life changing love. It is to see all as subject to the possibility of grace, not excluding ones own self. To live this way is to find oneself in the Way; or in a real sense to put on Christ, to be a Christ bearer in this objectified and splintered world. It is to be compassionate in a dispassionate world.

Grace can not be categorized. God's love can not be objectified. God's love is all. The reason of our hearts knows this, even if Reason does not. God's love is costly but it is without cost, and we, all of us, and the whole of creation are its subject. Forgive my daydreaming, but what if?

Their dedication over the years has kept this event a major St. Luke's fundraiser and they are now experts at pricing the "stuff" that comes in! September Vestry Highlights

St. Luke's Vestry met on September 15. The regular meeting agenda was preceded by the ongoing Vestry/Parish Book Study on "*Called to Be Church*", with the discussion of Chapter 5 led by **Bonnie Johnson**.

The meeting itself began with **Jane Davis** sharing her "spiritual journey." **Christian Education** was the focus of the evening with the following conclusions reached:

- Education sufficient for the present time
- Bible study continuing
- Suggestion made to think about a future program that would include the adults and children
- Suggestion for a program between the services

The **Financial Report** was presented, with a special note of gratitude for an anonymous gift of \$5,000.00 that will help reduce our budget deficit.

The Rector reported that he received a letter of resignation from **Sally Hoover** as a member of the Vestry due to a commitment she has made to begin training as an EMT in Windham. Sally will continue in her position as St. Luke's Treasurer (which need not be a member of the Vestry.)

Paul also reported that **Donna Reidt** has not found a position yet and will continue in her role as Deacon at St. Luke's Church.

In her Sr. Warden's report, **Martha Stretton** noted that a grant was received from the Diocese for the cost to cover the speaker/coordinator at the last Vestry Retreat.

Jr. Warden's, **Kathryn Wright** reported there are 19 pieces of cracked glass in the stained glass window over the altar in the sanctuary. The Vestry voted that a contract be established to fix this at a cost of \$1,200.70.

Old Business: There are still complications with the sound system in the sanctuary and these will be presented to the engineer.

New Business: A Nominating Committee was formed to include **Lynda Farmer, Peter Rosengarten, Mike Saul, Jean Hancock, and Norm Harrison**. They will hold their first meeting on Sunday, October 3rd at 9:00 a.m..

Kathryn Wright, our Church School coordinator, will be attending a "Safer Church Training". Mike Saul will share his "spiritual journey" at the October Vestry meeting.



A Christian Symbol: The Lion

Stewardship & The Giving Tree



A little over a year ago Peter Rosengarten and I went to a stewardship workshop in White River Jct., VT. We were both singularly impressed by a church that celebrated all the areas of giving that their parishioners participated in outside the church. These activities were showcased on a large wall for all to see.

St. Luke's has a long, solid history of sharing outside the church so we wanted to put together our own display of gifts, we have called it **The Giving Tree**. These are concrete expressions of God's grace manifested by members of St. Luke's and they demonstrate the community's caring concern for neighbors beyond the walls of church. It lends support to the bold claim that God resides in common life through the filling of the Holy Spirit.

Last year we celebrated our giving without overusing the word 'Stewardship'. This year we are using a theme focusing on our **Gala of Gifts**. Included in this theme we are encouraging every parishioner, young and old, to make one or several icons demonstrating their individual gifts to the wider world. This project (which I reported on in the Sept. issue of LITS) was initiated on Sunday, September 12. A large silhouette of a tree with many branches has been created and fastened to a free-standing bulletin board at the rear of the church. Some icons have begun to appear but we need your participation! There is paper, markers and velcro backs in a basket near the bulletin board for you to use. If you haven't already done so, please either take what you need or use your own materials at home to make our tree blossom over this fall season. Include a photo of yourself or of your special ministry, if you have one.

Some of you might be thinking that Jesus said that we should not brag about what we do for others and I did give this some thought as we were preparing this project, but in talking with Paul we decided that this tree is not to show off but rather to share the widespread and varied areas where our parish is making a difference in the wider world and to heighten our awareness of gifts that can really make a difference.

To quote a thought that came from the book the parish is reading, "*Called to Be Church*": "Christian unity is never merely a verbal sentiment or heartfelt ideal; it is a social practice that meets real needs wherever they are found."

10/10/10 Action Idea for Congregations

To a significant degree, Vermonters' carbon emissions come from our cars—and this includes driving to church on Sunday or to synagogue, mosque, etc. On the **10/10/10 Weekend, Oct. 8-10**, congregations can encourage their members to come to services via carpool, bicycling, walking, etc. If one or more volunteers will step forward in each congregation to explain the 10/10/10 idea (for example, through newsletters, bulletins, and announcements at services) and to help to arrange carpools, this action could come together quickly. We hope that carpooling and using other alternative forms of transportation will become a habit that members of congregations will continue. 
