Reflections On The Season Of Lent



Recently I overheard someone mention their struggle with the spirituality of repentance in relation to sin. As we approach the liturgical season of Lent, "sin" and "repentance" come front and center in our prayers and personal practices. People have a lot of trouble with the idea of "sin" because it so easily brushes up against an innate sense of guilt and the feeling that we can

somehow never be good enough when really we might feel we are doing the best that we can. Why is it that we so quickly go down the road of guilt as though we are dusted with original evil at our birth? Why is it so difficult to stop and accept the love of God for what it is—restoring, redeeming and transforming.

The original Hebrew word for sin is "Chet" and provides quite an interesting perspective. This word refers to "missing the mark" as in aiming at a target and missing the

bulls-eye. If you were an archer, what would you do if you missed a target? You'd stop what you were doing, adjust your stance and direction, weigh the factors that might be getting in the way, focus—concentrate—take another careful aim and try again. And you would keep trying until you figured out how to come closer to the mark. Does your inability to hit the mark right away or all the time make you a bad person?

Our Cathechism defines sin as "...the seeking of our own will instead of the will of God, thus distorting our relationship with God, with other people, and with all creation." (Book of Common Prayer, page 848). Seeking our own will instead of the will of God is a sure way to "miss the mark" of what God intends for us. True, we are responsible for how we aim but we shouldn't stop there as though that is all there is. God always calls us back to

That this event took place on the Epiphany of Our Lord, seems most appropriate as the MDC members were revealed to the faith community. A brief ceremony followed the sermon at which time Rev. Carole presented the team to the congregation. Canon Bates then asked this question: "Are these persons whom you present prepared by a commitment to Christ, by regular attendance at worship, and by commitment to this responsibility to exercise their ministry to the honor of God and the well being of God's Church?" and Rev. Carole replied, "I believe they are." Canon Bates then addressed the team members and asked, "To you who have been called to serve on the Ministry Discernment Committee in this congregation, as long as you are engaged in this work, will you perform it with diligence, love, and patience?" To which they replied they would. Then the entire congregation repeated this antiphon, "You are my witnesses, says the Lord, and my servants whom I have chosen." Thanks and prayers followed. Canon Bates then faced each member, individually addressing them by name saying, "In the Name of God and of the congregation of St. Luke's Church, I commission you as a member of the Ministry Discernment Committee for this congregation. Why even have the theology of sin and repentance, if not to help us realize our dependence and trust in God alone. For in God's arms of compassion, forgiveness and grace is where we truly belong and Jesus always points us in that direction.

During this holy and sacred season of Lent, I invite you to enhance your spiritual "archery skills" through faithful prayer, stimulating study and engaging conversation as you walk beside Jesus on his journey to Jerusalem and the challenge that met him there.

When you review the Annual Report you will see that while pledges did not make budget by over \$7,000, prior year pledges and plate offerings more than made up the shortfall. With total giving more than budgeted and salary expenses decreased due to Paul's retirement, it was unnecessary to withdraw money from the Vanguard accounts to support our operations this year. Looking ahead to 2013 if income remains at current levels we should be able to increase our reserves in case of future shortfalls. Thank you all for a good financial year.

"The format is straightforward: 32 saints are placed into a tournament-like single elimination bracket. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time and people vote for their favorite saint. 16 saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo. The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. Things get a bit more interesting in the subsequent rounds as we offer quotes and quirks, explore legends, and even move into the area of saintly kitsch." I highly recommend this site not only because it is solid learning, but also because it is just plain fun...and who couldn't use a few chuckles along the way.

When winter weather lures people indoors and school vacations and national holidays present extra time for creative projects, students are encouraged to work on their entries for the 2013 LEGO Contest. This event is open to the public and will be held on Saturday March 2, 9:00 a.m.-12:30 p.m in Willard Hall. The \$5 pre-registration discount deadline is February 26.

LEGOmaniacs Pre-K through Grade 8 and families are invited to enter and display their original creations (no kits are allowed) for others to admire. Entries should be constructed at home, brought to Willard Hall, and set up in a space of approximately 18 x 30 inches from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. on the day of the contest. Entries will be judged in different grade categories from 10:00 a.m. to noon for their originality, imagination, and presentation. If a structure is a team entry, the age of the oldest member will determine the grade category. There is also a separate family team class when adults and children have collaborated.

At 12:15 p.m. LEGO prizes will be awarded to the winners and runners-up in the grade and family team divisions, with special awards for the Judges' Choice for Best in Show and Most Vermont creations. While the judging is going on, participants will have the chance to check out the other fabulous entries and to share techniques and ideas with the



other exhibitors. Refreshments will be on sale to encourage people to stay and view the different entries.

Participants should pre-register by February 26 to be assured of a space. Entry forms may be downloaded from www.stlukesepiscopalvt.org. Printed forms are available at the Whiting Library on Main Street in Chester. A check for the pre-registration fee of \$10 per entry should be made out to "St. Luke's Church" with a footnote, "Lego Contest" and mailed, along with the registration form, to the registrar, Lillian Willis, P. O. Box 318, Chester, VT 05143. Both the entry form and fee must be received by February 26 in order to reserve a space. Entries the day of the contest will be \$15, if there is space; but to avoid disappointment, pre-registration is strongly encouraged.

she and mom participate in about a dozen shows a year throughout the New England area.


