Journeys And Epiphanies

For a journey, and such a long journey:

Lately I've been reflecting on how frequently the motif or image of a journey figures throughout the Biblical narrative. Even within the Christmas or infancy cycle of readings from the Gospels for this season of the year, one finds numerous references to journeys undertaken. There is Mary's visit to Elizabeth, the holy family's journey to Bethlehem, the shepherds short

journey/jaunt, and the wise men's much longer journey to the same, and finally the holy family's flight into Egypt.

In any reading of Scripture one can not avoid the idea of journey; sometimes out of necessity or the gravity of the human condition and sin; at other times, drawn by grace; but at all times whether consciously and willingly, or often unconsciously and unwillingly, led by God. Journey is seen as our common lot as humans. By extension the Biblical perspective on humanity covers not just journeys of physical or geographical distance, but with

equal if not greater regard, the metaphorical and metaphysical distance traversed by the individual soul in the lifelong journey of faith.

Perhaps the greatest present difficulty concerning this concept of faith journey is the widespread prevalence of the viewpoint that there is a well delineated map for the journey in Scripture or the many numerous self help

manuals of our era; a map that will get us from point A to point B. While many present manuals seem to intentionally foster this false perspective, Scripture assuredly does not. Yes, there are hints and guesses, there are those things which one ought to do or ought not to do. Even about these there is less clarity than we presume.

The intention of Scripture is not that of either manual or map. It is journey as a love story wherein one finds the assurance of God's love and redemption. The faith journey of Scripture is one of constant surprise, and of those numerous unattended moments when grace broke through leading to that one unattended moment when grace was incarnated, fleshed out, in Christ Jesus, and through him in those who followed and still seek to follow him. The joy of this journey of faith whether exuberant or bittersweet is in the surprise, life as surprise, and in the unwarranted and enduring presence of God's love.

Whenever I think about Pat Saul, her cheerful smile comes to mind. Pat loved the Christmas Tea and along with her husband, Mike, acted as the cashier and greeter for this event for nearly as many years as she was a member of St. Luke's (she and Mike came to St. Luke's in 1997, having moved to Chester, Vermont from Yalesville, Conn.)

From the moment she and Mike stepped through the doors at St. Luke's they became totally involved in the life of this faith community. Pat served on the Vestry for a number of years and later as the Vestry Secretary & Clerk. She and Mike were Delegates to the Diocesan Convention numerous times and served as Deanery

Representatives. Pat & Mike were lectors during worship services and Pat was a prayer leader. She sang with the choir for a short time until her health prevented her from doing so (but she continued to sing out with joy from the pews.) She regularly participated in the Wednesday Morning Prayer Group and Holy Eucharist and with Mike attended and supported almost all the special events at St. Luke's. For the past 2-3 years, Pat acted as the office church secretary, 3 days a week, on a volunteer basis and she and Mike copied and assembled the weekly Sunday Bulletins in recent years.

Pat was not a person you could ignore when she was in the same room with you. She was never shy about expressing her opinions and had a deep and abiding faith in the Lord. She was a "people person" and loved being among others. Or as Paul expressed it at her memorial service, "Pat was a party girl." One of her passions was "outreach" and helping others in the local community as well as in the world. She took up the reins of the United Thank Offering (UTO) when Jane Zezza passed away and was always ready and eager to take up the cause of those in need. Another of her passions in recent years was to raise funds for a Memorial Garden at St. Luke's Church. This dream became a reality in the summer of 2008, when the garden was planted. Pat has always wanted her ashes laid to rest here at St. Luke's when God called finally her home.

Pat was such a vital presence at St. Luke's and in the local community that it is difficult to grasp the reality of her death. I still expect to look up and see her sitting in her favorite pew, or get a phone call from her during the week asking me some question about church. She has touched all our lives with her unwavering faith and witness of God's love. We will truely miss her, but are grateful knowing she is free of the debilitating pain from rheumatoidal arthritis that she courageously endured for so many years. Our prayers go out to Mike and to their children as they grieve the loss of a loving wife and mother. —Pat Fromberger



A Christian Symbol: "Ecce Agnus Dei"

Latin for "Behold, the Lamb of God," this is the phrase John the Baptist used twice to point out Jesus to others (John 1:29, 36). It marks Jesus' Epiphany (manifestation, revelation) as the Anointed One (Christ, Messiah).

Essentially, the kingdom of God is the rule of God. Where God's will, rather than ours, is done, there is the kingdom. And the glory of the kingdom is that wherever it is found there we find health, wholeness of life, joy, and peace.

Why must we still pray, "The kingdom come?" Because, as Aldous Huxley puts it, too few of us have learned to pray, "My kingdom go." Our self-will, our determination to have things our way rather than God's way, is the only reason why God's kingdom is not the only kingdom we see and experience on earth. But the good news is that the kingdom is *near*. It is in fact *right here*. If we want it. (Forward Day By Day, January 11, 2010.)

The Epiphany Of Our Lord Celebrated On January 6

Epiphany is the climax of the Christmas Season and the Twelve Days of Christmas, which are counted from December 25th until January 5th. The day before Epiphany is the twelfth day of Christmas, and is sometimes called Twelfth Night, an occasion for feasting in some cultures The term epiphany means "to show" or "to make known" or even "to



reveal". As with most aspects of the Christian liturgical calendar, Epiphany has theological significance as a teaching tool in the church. The Wise Men (the Magi) who brought gifts to the infant Jesus were the first Gentiles to acknowledge Jesus as "King" and so were the first to "show" or "reveal" Jesus to a wider world as the incarnate Christ. This act of worship by the Magi, which corresponded to Simeon's blessing that this child Jesus would be "a light for revelation to the Gentiles" (Luke 2:32), was one of the first indications that Jesus came for all people, of all nations, of all races, and that the work of God in the world would not be limited to only a few.

At St. Luke's Church we will observe The Epiphany of our Lord on Friday, **January 6** with a service of **Holy Eucharist**, **Rite II at 6:30 p.m.** in the sanctuary. We invite you to join in this special celebration with us.

PINS (Partners in Service) Report

Every year the Department of Child and Family Services, Springfield office, holds a Christmas party for foster children and their families. At the party there is a free Christmas shop for children to buy gifts for their family and foster families. We at St. Luke's were asked to contribute items for the shop and wrapping paper, ribbon and tape. Adelaide J. and Pat F. co-chairs of the Christmas Tea offered a free run through the two rooms of Grandma's Attic at the end of the day to take anything that might be appropriate for the kids' shopping. Four boxes filled with new or very lightly used items were delivered to the Springfield office the week before the party. Robbie Wierzbecki, our coordinator for PINS was thrilled with the amount and variety of items for the kids.

PINS (Partners in Service) is faith communities and Human Service Agencies collaborating to help local children and families in need. The beauty of PINS lies in its ability to convey a message of love, empathy and caring to vulnerable children who are experiencing feelings of loss, fear, isolation and grief. A child's realization that someone in their community cares for them makes an enormous difference to individual well-being.

230 Shoeboxes Sent To Operation Christmas Child

A huge thank you to everyone who helped with the *Operation Christmas Child* shoeboxes! This year, 230 shoeboxes were finished. This is the most we have ever done. Let's see if we can surpass that number in 2012. We can still use soap, shoeboxes, all kinds of toys for boys, clothes either homemade or store-bought, and as always we need tons and tons of jar, bottle or can covers—any size either plastic or metal. We used 230 pencil sharpeners and 230 pads of paper, and 2,300 pencils. As you can see, the need for these items is great as every box has school supplies included.

I am working on knitted balls and crocheted rings and am making lots of games. I could use LOTS of yogurt container type lids and all sizes and shapes of covers metal or plastic for game pieces. As soon as I have a collection of games and toys ready, I will display them for all to see.

Keep that change coming! This year, we collected \$164.50 for the shipping of the boxes and \$143.50 of it came from the change jar. Please consider donating your spare coins today. The "Change for Children" jar will be in Willard Hall.

Also please consider joining me in knitting, crocheting, or sewing for children with AIDS in Africa and the homeless at home and around the world. I have lots of easy knitting patterns for socks, hats, mittens, etc.
