According to the Church calendar, the month of November begins with the Feast of All Saints on November 1. On that day, we celebrate the innumerable individuals, known and unknown who

have reflected the light of Christ in their generation. In a real sense we are celebrating ourselves on this day, or at least, we are reminding ourselves of our potential, and of the power given by the Holy Spirit to each of us to bear Christ's light in our own time and place.

What we are reminding ourselves, and we often need such a reminder, is that we live graceful lives. No matter how awkwardly it sometimes manifests itself from our perspective, our lives are full of grace; God's love freely given. All is grace, no matter how gentle and lovely, or harsh and dreadful it appears to us.

That which distinguishes individuals as saints is not their sanctity, certainly not being holier than thou, nor their deeds; although sanctity and good works are manifestations of what being a saint means. What truly distinguishes saints from others is that their lives are lived by a simple trust in God and the grati-

tude it engenders. Their lives are lived in continual thanks to God as the giver of life, who has saved us from our worst inclinations, i.e. sin and weakness, and who has empowered us to recognize and live grace.

It is no coincidence that the English words grace, gratitude, and gratefulness share the same Latin root. All is grace, but without gratitude it isn't recognizable. Living

St. Luke's Annual Blessing Of Pets Will Be Held On October 8th



Always a popular event, St. Luke's **Blessing of the Pets** will be held on Saturday, **October 8**, beginning at **10:00 a.m.**, on the back lawn of the Church. This event is held annually on the Saturday falling closest to October 4, which is the *Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi*. St. Francis is known for his love of the larks flying about his hilltop town. The story goes that he and his early

brothers, staying in a small hovel, allowed themselves to be displaced by a donkey. St. Francis founder of the Order of Friars Minor (Franciscans) who died on October 3, 1226, once said, *"If you have men who will exclude any of God's creatures from the shelter of compassion and pity, you will have men who will deal likewise with their fellow men."*

All pets and their owners are invited to participate in this service that both honors and gives thanks for the special role pets play in our lives. In addition to receiving a blessing by the priest, each pet is given a tasty treat and a St. Francis pet medallion which features the image of the patron St. Francis of Assisi. In the event of rain, the blessing will move indoors to Willard Hall.

“Nothing is Small If God Asks It”



I was a young woman when I read those words on a bookmark in a cathedral bookstore, and they changed my life forever. It was a time in my life when the world seemed very wrong and I felt completely powerless and insignificant. But those seven words just

blazed up at me from that small slip of paper, and I heard them as if someone had shouted at me. They resonated deep within me and, in a heartbeat, I understood that even the smallest efforts I could make at kindness or charity or help to others would allow others to see God’s love shining in me.

Those simple words turned me into an evangelist-by-example. I’m an overly courteous driver. I say “good morning” to everyone. I talk to small children and the elderly and teenagers and the disabled. I volunteer my time. I hold doors open, and urge others ahead of me in check-out lines. I smile at everyone, and I know that I’ve touched a stranger’s heart, just for an instant, when my smile is returned.

These are just small things, I know. But all my life I’ve believed that God is really asking me to do them. I’ve continued to look for moments to be kind and friendly and caring and helpful to those who cross my day’s path, no matter how briefly. And decades later, reading Mother Teresa’s words in *The Blessings of Love*, they confirmed my belief in those small things:

As of the end of August our income and expenses should be 66.7% of the annual budget. As you can see, pledges are barely keeping up and Total Income is slightly over mainly due to the August Supper and Silent Auction. In order to meet the budget with the built-in deficit our income should average \$11,213 per month. To end the year with no deficit our income should average \$11,786 per month. We have not met either of these averages the last couple of months, perhaps because of vacation schedules and travel. Hopefully now that fall is here and schedules are getting back to normal everyone who has been away will be able to bring their pledges up-to-date.

September Vestry Meeting Highlights

The evening began with the continuing book study and discussion of *"Called To Be Church,"* followed by the monthly Vestry meeting agenda. The focus for the September meeting was Stewardship. **Bill Hoyt** is chairman of the committee and he reported that the committee has met several times and has completed plans for the fall stewardship campaign. It will be kicked off on Sunday, **October 2** with a sermon by **The Rev. Angela Emerson**, Diocesan Minister of Stewardship Development. The campaign will culminate on Sunday, **November 20th** when the pledge cards will be placed in the collection plate during the offertory portion of the Eucharist.

The Vestry discussed the need for continued work and prayer on defining the **Vision Statement** as outlined at the Vestry retreat in June. We will spend part of the evening on Wednesday, **November 16th** discussing our mission at a light supper meeting to which the whole congregation will be invited. Hopefully we will build on our work and be able to clearly define St. Luke's Vision Statement.

The annual audit has been completed and the Vestry thanked **Bonnie Johnson**, the presenter of the audit, **Red Johnson** and **Richard Crocker** for their efforts on this project. The committee feels things are in good shape, but recommends that a property inventory be done (taking photographs of items as appropriate) and then storing the inventory document and photos in a safety deposit box.

Under upcoming events the members were reminded of the following happenings:

- **Visit by Bishop Ely** on October 23, St. Luke's Sunday. There will be a reception following the 10:00 a.m. service that day and the Bishop will meet briefly with the Vestry.

The **2011 Nominating Committee** was formed to recommend one new Vestry member for a 3-year term for presentation at the Annual Meeting in January 2012.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

Some Prayers To Say While Carving Pumpkin Faces



After Liz Curtis Higgs wrote the popular children's book *The Pumpkin Patch Parable*, people began using her analogies to say a prayer while carving their Halloween pumpkins. The pumpkin prayer, a Christian alternative to Halloween traditions, reminds people of all ages what God has done for us. Use it this fall when your family makes jack-o'-lanterns.

- While cutting off the top of the pumpkin, pray, "Lord, open my mind so I can learn new things about you." (See Proverbs 1:7.)
- While removing the seeds and pulp, pray, "Remove the things in my life that don't please you. Forgive

the wrong things I do, and help me forgive others." (See Matthew 6:14-15.)

- While making eyes, pray, "Open my eyes to see the beauty you've made in the world around me." (See Psalm 104:24.)
- While making the nose, pray, "I'm sorry for the times I've turned up my nose at your many gifts." (See James 1:17.)
- While making the mouth, pray, "Let everything I say please you." (See Psalm 19:14.)
- While lighting the candle, pray, "Lord, help me show your light to others through the things I do." (See Matthew 5:16.)

After carving your pumpkins, display them as examples of how God's love transforms us into new creations. (See 2 Corinthians 5:17.)

August Worship Committee Notes

St. Luke's Worship Committee met in August and discussed the following upcoming Worship Events:

October 8 – **Pet Blessing**, 10:00 a.m.

October 8 – **Dinner Church**, 6:00 p.m. New event similar to the Seder. Everyone participates in preparing the meal at the church.

October 23 – **Bishop Visitation** (St. Luke's Sunday) 2 services with confirmations/faith reaffirmations, if any.

November 1 – **All Saints' Day**, 6:30 p.m. Holy Eucharist

November 6 – **Choral Evensong**, 4:00 p.m.

November 23 – **Thanksgiving Evening Eucharist**, 6:30 p.m.

A few other aspects of the worship at St. Luke's were talked about at this meeting:

- Martha Stretton suggested we begin using the simplified Anglican Chant for the Psalm on the first Sunday of the month. The entire Psalm would be chanted by the congregation. After much discussion it was decided to give it a try on Sunday, September 4th.

- Martha will be away on September 18 and October 23 and will try to get Joe Grannis to play those two Sundays.

- Bonnie Johnson suggested we go back to the Prayers of the People in the BCP, as she and some others feel they are more meaningful than the current format. The current *Prayers of the People* are based on the scripture of the day and others felt this important. Pros and cons discussed. For now we will continue as is and consider changing back to the BCP in October when the next worship schedule changes.

- This led into a discussion of the need for training as there is a lack of consistency and confusion as to how the prayers are presented. It was decided we should hold training sessions for all worship participants (Ushers, Intercessors, Lectors, & Chalice Bearers). Acolytes and Altar Guild excluded as Jean Hancock & Adelaide Johnson handle that training. Participants will be urged to attend one of the following training sessions:

Saturday, September 10; 10:00 a.m. – Noon

Saturday, September 17; 10:00 a.m. – Noon

(Editor's Postscript: These 2 training sessions were held as scheduled. If any of the service participants were not able to attend, they should contact the Rector.)

We are attempting something new but ancient at St. Luke's. Our first **Dinner Church Service** will be held on Saturday, **October 8th at 6:00 p.m.** in Willard Hall. Think dinner theater, but not. The Service will be based on one of the earliest

models of the Eucharist which took place in the midst of a meal. with the Breaking of the Bread at the beginning, a Lesson and Story in the middle, and the Sharing of the Cup towards the end; all in the context of a meal with simple unaccompanied singing at various places.

Because this is a first time event, the meal will be provided by a few individuals (probably spaghetti and salad). If there is enough response, it will be a continuing event with later celebrations being a communal effort of those who will be in attendance, and the meals prepared in the Parish Hall itself. Bishop Ely to Visit St. Luke’s On Oct. 23, Feast Day of Saint Luke



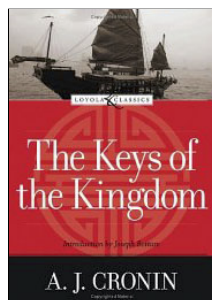

Confirmation is the Rite by which a person previously baptized publicly proclaims his or her desire to follow Christ, accepts the responsibilities of his or her Baptism, and assumes adult responsibilities in the Church. It does require some instruction so anyone wishing to be confirmed should let our Rector, The Rev. Paul Brannock-Wanter, know as soon as possible.

There will be an informal reception for Bishop Ely in Willard Hall following the 10:00 a.m. service. We urge everyone to make a special effort to be present on October 23rd and extend a warm welcome to Bishop Ely.

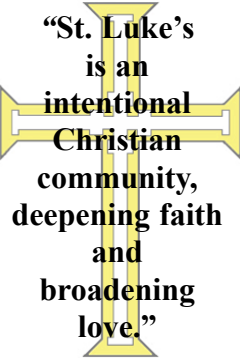
