## "Morning Has Broken"

(1982 Hymnal)



Amorning has broken" is a hymn I personally love to hear during the Easter season. I used to listen to Cat Stevens sing this hymn back when I was a teenager. Of course, I didn't realize then how far back in time this song goes. It's original tune is "Bunessan," a Gaelic melody that was composed in the Scottish Highlands in the 1930's. Percy Dreamer, the editor of the Songs of Praise where

this hymn first appeared, wrote that there was a need for a hymn to give thanks for each day. Later on as an adult, when I started going to the Episcopal Church for worship, I was delighted to see this hymn in our 1982 Hymnal!

Spring is here and the Morning has come! Christ is risen! The tomb where Jesus lay is now empty. Mark's Gospel tells the story so well. The first to discover the empty tomb three women: Mary Magdalene, Mary, the mother of James, and Salome. These women start out very early in the morning for the tomb. They thought Jesus was

still dead. Along the way they worried about the heavy stone rolled in front of the tomb. "Who will roll away the stone from us..." How shocked and surprised they must have been to discover that the stone was already rolled back and Jesus' tomb was empty.

As I write this, the temperature is 25 degrees outside. It's hard for me to believe Spring has come. I picture the three women collecting all their spices and other things needed for Jesus' anointing in the

## We Invite You To A Seder Meal On Wednesday, April 1

St. Luke's invites you to participate in a traditional **Seder Meal** on Wednesday, **April 1** in Willard Hall, beginning at **6:00 p.m.** St. Luke's began holding Seders in 2006 as a way of acknowledging our common Jewish biblical roots.

The Passover Seder marks the night when the Israelites were "passed over" by the angel of death when the tenth and final plague—the death of all the firstborn—was visited upon Egypt. The angel passed over all homes marked by lamb's blood on the doorpost. The lamb whose blood on the doorposts ensured salvation was referred to as the paschal lamb. The paschal lamb was then eaten that night at "the Lord's Passover."

The text for the evening, the "Haggadah," includes songs, readings, and responses,

along with explanations of the various symbolic foods that will be used to tell the Exodus story. Following the symbolic meal, a delicious dinner of roast lamb, chicken, goat, vegetables, and macaroons and meringues will be served.

## From the Senior Warden

### **Listening For God**

The Vestry goes on an annual retreat every year in May instead of holding a regular meeting. We have a potluck dinner with spouses and partners the night before, and then spend the following day in thought and prayer and silence, reading Scripture for discussion. We



hold the retreat at St. Joseph's Dwelling Place in Ludlow and spend time walking the beautiful grounds, contemplating God's work. Sometimes we have a task to accomplish, like writing new Mission and Vision Statements. Or we have an outside facilitator to guide us through the day, focusing on the topic that the Vestry has chosen for the retreat. Last year, we formed a committee and chose "Water for Thirsty Souls" as our topic. We spent the day focused on scripture and psalms about life-giving water, and we prayed for clean water for everyone on earth.

This year we haven't formed a committee, and instead have just shared some topic suggestions with one another. We thought about "What is God doing in our Community?" which is part of the Bishop's Becoming More Missional initiative. And then we liked "Feed My Sheep," with the exhausted Vestry members being the sheep. (The Vestry was frozen for the duration of the search for our new rector, so some members were on for six consecutive years.) But one wise Vestry member said: "How do we make space to hear what God is saying to us? Perhaps before we can "feed God's sheep"-we ourselves, need to be fed (nourished by the Holy Spirit) so that we can hear what God is calling us to do." So we've chosen "Listening to God" as this year's topic. I wonder what our facilitator will select for scripture and psalms? It will be a good day, and we're all looking forward to the retreat. One member remarked "I'd be happy to listen to Him while resting in His arms and being fed." We will come away centered, with our spiritual batteries recharged, and our enthusiasm for the work to be done renewed. Keep us in your prayers.



## Holy Week: A Pilgrimage Of Faith

Holy Week begins on the Sunday of the Passion, March 29 culminating with The Great Vigil of Easter on Saturday, April 4—the sacred celebration of Lent and Holy Week—and the beginning of the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection on Easter Day, Sunday, April 5. It is the climax of the Christian Year and unfolds in Scripture, Psalm, Sacrament and Liturgy the story of redemption.

Holy Week is a journey that begins with a procession into the city and leads to an upper room and a meal, to a cross on a hill, and to a tomb in a garden. Through these events our relationship with God has been forever changed. Jesus said, "I, if I be lifted up, will draw all humankind unto me." In this Holy Week, we feel the drawing of God: drawing us out of ourselves and the isolation of our lives into the wonder of a love that will go on loving us even to the cruel death of a cross—and beyond!

For the lifting up of which Jesus speaks is not only the lifting up of the Son of God upon the wood of the Tree, but it is also always the lifting up of the Sons and Daughters of God from the sin, death and bondage of our daily existence to that new life in which we are united to Christ's resurrected body. Remember that the whole drama of this week is not completed until the Ascension and Pentecost, because that act of love in the Person of Love—Jesus Christ who is God's only Son—has only one end, and that is to make us a Community of Love as Christ's holy Body, the Church.

May your liturgical pilgrimage be blessed with a hallowed sense of the presence of God to aid and comfort you in your earthly pilgrimage. May your heart be emptied by the grief of Christ's passion and death so that God may fill you anew with the overflowing joy of Jesus' victorious resurrection from death. May you know yourself a loved member of Christ's family and an inheritor of the redeemed company of saints.

Jesus is not only at the end of our pilgrimage; Jesus is with us in the Way itself. As he has told us, "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life."

## \* The Great Vigil of Easter

The Great Vigil of Easter is the culmination of the sacred celebration of Lent and Holy Week, and the beginning of the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection. It is the climax of the Christian Year and unfolds in Scripture, Psalm, Sacrament and Liturgy the story of redemption.

Of all the celebrations of the Church Year, the Great Vigil of Easter is preeminent, for it alone vividly portrays all that was, that is, and that ever shall be in the drama of our redemption: Christ yesterday and today, the Beginning and the End, the Alpha and Omega. His are the times and

the ages and to him be glory and dominion through all ages of eternity. Amen.

The Great Vigil of Easter will be celebrated at St. Luke's Church on Saturday, April 4, beginning at 7:00 p.m. in Willard Hall. The service begins in darkness and proceeds to a joyous burst of light. The Vigil Liturgy moves with austere solemnity and great joy from one part to the next, as we watch and wait for the Lord's Resurrection. Bring yourself, family, friends and a handbell or noisemaker—and, some finger food for a party following the Service.

## Maple Fest Dinner & Raffle — Another Great Success!

At the annual Maple Fest dinner fund raiser on Saturday, March 21st, 65 people were treated to roast pork and all the "fixins" plus choice of wine with dinner and an array of desserts—all with a hint of maple syrup. The evening was a show of the great spirit of community support for Partners in Service (PINS). The infamous raffle table overflowed with 32 choice prizes. There were paintings donated by Ruth Harrison, prints by Robert Sydorowich and Lew Watters, several selections of wine gift baskets, a mystery novel, hand blown glassware, pottery, plus other artistic and craft items from parishioners and friends. The highlight of the evening is when John Hoover closes the ticket buying and starts announcing the winning names for the treasures. Great food, old friends reunited, new friends made and obvious good cheer permeated the air throughout the evening.

Many, many thanks to the faithful volunteers who step forward every year to make this one and only annual PINS fund raiser a success. Certainly could not do it without you!!

PINS is a local outreach program to children and youth in crisis. PINS collaborates with the Springfield Department of Families and Children. The program allows social workers and other staff to voice the needs of the children on their caseloads, needs that would otherwise go unheard and unmet.

For the evening the dinner brought in \$645, the raffle tickets sold amounted to \$100, and donations for the wines was \$68. Thus making the total \$813, donations for food and wine sold after the event will add to the total, minus the cost of the meat. Everything else was donated.

In February the PINS committee became aware of a fund raiser one of the social workers was involved in for child furniture for the department waiting area. This would be a new addition to the few adult chairs there now. She needed \$200 to reach her goal, so it was voted to donate the \$200.



## 2015 LEGO Contest Has Huge Turnout

While the bottom line hasn't been figured out yet, this year's LEGO Contest, sponsored for the fourth year by St. Luke's and held on Saturday, March 21 at the NewsBank Conference Center in Chester—was the largest exhibition yet. The number of 2015 entries increased over those from last year by 33% to total 67, and exhibitors came from 23 towns in Vermont and four in New Hampshire. Entrants, siblings, parents, grandparents, and friends eagerly crowded the big NewsBank facility to see this year's original creations.

Two judging teams (St. Luke's members or relatives Chris Johnson—Bonnie & Sanford's son, Chris Meyer, Andrew Pennell, and Gurion Lake—a Watters' grandson) went around the room speaking with the exhibitors to try to discover the intent and details of the creations. And Doug Edson joined the judging crew for one class so no relative had to judge his child or sibling. Afterward the judges wrote appreciative comments on each entry card. All contestants received a medal for entering, and first-and second-place ribbons and prizes of various LEGO kits were awarded to grade and division winners.

## **March Vestry Meeting Highlights**

• Maintenance was the monthly topic of the March 9 Vestry Meeting. Junior Warden Andrew Pennell reported on the procedures and projects he has outlined for the year. Because of Andrew's travel schedule, John DesLauriers and Sean Whalen have agreed to provide some day-to-day help so that Andrew can concentrate on the larger maintenance projects—especially those listed by Scott Newman in the Condition Assessment he prepared through the Preservation Trust of Vermont. The first priority for 2015 will repairs to the slate roof. Andrew will have the slate roof expert listed in the PTV Restoration Directory look at the transition from tower to roof, in addition to other foci. The estimate is about \$5000. Other 2015 jobs will be to replace the rotted trim and maybe have all the window casings scraped and painted (big paint build-up makes cracks, collects moisture, and promotes rot), also replace the gutter that fell down.

Mention was made of various other problems, some of which are likely to be slated for attention in 2016, and many of which require further investigation and also formal estimates. The Diocese's Butterfield Loan will be repaid by the end of the year, so we will consider if we want to do anything major after that time.

- Treasurer's Report. Of great help to the church's financial picture is the fact that the Edsons only spent \$4,300 of the \$10,000 allotted as moving expenses for the Rector. Monthly income and expenses are on track. Norm Wright will join the Audit Committee.
- Rector's Report. Heidi reported on increased participation for the Wednesday services/studies and Sunday adult studies. She would like volunteers to consider leading some of the discussions. Heidi and Pat Fromberger have been meeting to get seasonal user-friendly bulletins in place, such as the one for the Wednesday, March 11th Lenten service at St. Luke's. Preparations are under way for Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday with their traditional services and festivities.
- Stirrings of the Spirit Grants. Lillian Willis discussed her idea for a hands-on educational gardening program where interested new gardeners are provided with the materials and instruction to be able to put a 9'x12' vegetable garden in place for the coming growing season. The Vestry approved having Lillian pursue the grant (which Kathryn is willing to write to submit by the 3/15 deadline.)
- Celebration of New Ministry: Institution of Heidi Edson as Rector of St. Luke's. This celebration by the Bishop will take place on the evening of Wednesday, May 6. The Vestry is working on the details for a reception following this important service.
- Next Vestry Meeting: Monday, April 13, 7:00 p.m. with Bible study at 6:30 p.m.. —*Lillian Willis*

We are happy to report that David Carey, David Willis, and Norm Wright have volunteered to work together as our Audit Committee for this year. They will be starting their work soon and will give a report to the Vestry which can be forwarded to the Diocese this summer. Thank you to all three of you!
