# How Is God Working In Our Midst?

This is the fundamental question the Ministry Discernment Committee seeks to answer in our search for a Rector at St. Luke's.

Your committee has now met three times formally and once informally since our commissioning in January,

and we are now moving into the serious planning work that will directly involve all the members of St. Luke's.

On Wednesday, **May 8** our first **All Parish Meeting** will begin at **6:00 p.m**. After sharing a light meal, prayer, and Bible study, we will all look into our past by creating a History Time Line together. God willing, our meeting will end promptly at **9:00 p.m.** Four questions will be our focus lead by your MDC members, Pastor Carole and an outside facilitator experienced in this defining exercise.

- 1. What events were going on in the World around us that affected our worshipping community? (Examples might be 9/11, the Second Iraq War, the housing bubble and economic collapse of 2008.)
- 2. What things/events were going on here in our parish that affected our life together? (e.g. The Chester Bridge closings, Tropical Storm Irene, departure of Father Paul.)
- **3.** What things/events were going on with me personally that influenced my faith and participation in worshipping at St. Luke's? (e.g. Bible Study, book studies such as, *Changing the Conversation*?
  - **4.** How am I feeling now about my church and me?

Here is a glimpse of how our evening together might flow. A Time Line will be posted and "salted" with a few events from MDC members. Group discussions and sharing will then add more content, hopefully from everyone as they are called by God to share. We will conclude with reflection and prayer. The Time Line will remain posted encouraging everyone to continue to reflect and add to our rich history, both the joyful and the sad. For those parishioners who cannot attend, we will provide a suitable questionnaire.

In the meantime, do not be afraid to seek out and discuss these questions and any other concerns you may have with the members of your Ministry Discernment Committee, with Pastor Carole, or our Vestry. Also, do let us know if you need transportation to and from this **All Parish Meeting**. Childcare will also be provided.

A Ministry Discernment bulletin board can be found in the church. The minutes of all our meetings, our charge from the Vestry and our own time line for reaching our goals are posted. 
### Back In Time...

# **March Vestry Meeting Highlights**

The Vestry business agenda at the March 11 meeting started with some sobering discussions before ending on a lot of positive notes.

- **First** in the sobering category was the resignation, effective July 1, 2013 of **Martha Stretton**, our Organist and Choir Director. A committee of Rev. Carole Wageman, Jane Davis, and David Willis was formed to start the search process for a replacement.
- Second, was the mold issue in the basement. Engineers are currently giving recommendations to address the problem. Bids, work plans, and time schedules will be sought quickly from as many vendors as possible (ideally three) in order to apply for Diocesan grants to address remediation costs. The hope is to have the work start as soon as possible and schedule it around church events and commitments. Part of any grant match will be work done by parish volunteers in terms of supervising and painting, and any other likely segments that can bring down the cost of the work and speed up the process.
- On the positive side are additional improvements that are planned to be done during remediation. These include a consolidated and expanded bulletin board area to publicize the work of the parish while eliminating the present free-standing physical structures, new smart thermostats that

will allow for setting the temperature up or down remotely for events, and other smaller building improvements to air quality and organization.

- Treasurer Sally Hoover went over the last month's finances. While income was down (presumably because of the shorter month of February and the number of parishioners who had gone south) the budget was generally on target and should anticipate greater revenue in the good weather ahead.
- It was reported that **Outreach Committee** chairman, Don Robinson, is in the process of contacting the organizations receiving church grants, to ask that they each sign up for a date to give a five-minute description of their organization after both Sunday services.
- Rev. Carole announced that she was taking vacation April 1–14 after Easter, and that all pastoral calls would be forwarded to Senior Warden Kathryn Wright. She reported that Jean Hancock, St. Luke's contact for the Diocese's *Alleluia Fund*, had been trained and will make a presentation at the April 7 services about the fund and the specific ministries for which donors could earmark their support. The Diocese is providing information via bulletin inserts about the fund and the appeal that will start the Sunday after Easter.
- The Vestry Retreat will be Friday and Saturday, June 7 & 8 at Jane Davis's house. It will focus on our spiritual growth and needs with the theme: "Water for Thirsty Spirits,"
- Lastly, the **Vestry approved** a donation of \$125 to the Children's section of the **Whiting Library** from funds garnered by the LEGO Contest on March 2 (see article on pages 1 & 3) and also approved Bonnie Johnson's request to hold a *Pampered Chef* Party on Saturday, **April 20** at **2:00 p.m.** in Willard Hall as a fundraiser for the church.

If everyone keeps up their pledges and does their share, this year should be a good one for St. Luke's.
