What Will Clergy Candidates "See?"



I reported to the Vestry some reflections about my first 6 (now 8) weeks with you all at St. Luke's. The response to asking for items for the PINS (Partners in Service) effort to provide back-to-school backpacks and materials for foster care/family-in-crisis children amazed me. We

can be a generous bunch of folk! Likewise, the hospitality and wonderful food for the 76th Annual August Supper made quite the impression on my 88 year-old mother-in-law. From the Senior Warden

We're Making It Official

Visitors often mention how friendly and welcoming we are at St. Luke's. We take pride in our hospitality, and in our sincere welcomes. Every new face gets a "welcome to you" during the Peace, is urged to sign the guest book, and never sits or stands alone at coffee hour. We're helpful during the service, handing out the insert folder and holding up *Lift Every Voice* when we're not singing from the hymnal. We smile a lot, and we mean it. We are open and loving to all, as Christ would have us be.



The Vestry reaffirmed that at our August meeting. *"It is understood that St. Luke's Vision Statement (on the home page of the website and also at times in the bulletin) refers to God's gift of hospitality, of welcome and love, as being freely given to all and any, and that 'all' means everyone."* In addition, the Vestry approved adoption of official non-discriminatory language for our search for a new rector that will be posted on our website and will be made part of our posting on the national Episcopal Church website. *"The Vestry will instruct the MDC that in considering candidates for the rectorship it will follow the nondiscriminatory policy passed by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church in 1994."* That policy states, *"No one shall be denied access to the selection process for ordination in this church because of race, color, ethnic origin, age, national origin, marital status, sexual orientation, disabilities or age, except as otherwise specified by these canons."*

Rector candidates are now looking at our posting on the Episcopal Church's national website, and looking at St. Luke's website to discover what kind of church we are. They will see that we walk the Way of our Lord, with faith in the Holy Spirit, truly open to the person that God will soon send us.

Discerning Liturgical Ministries

I think this community is amazing and that we are blessed in lots of ways with people with wonderful gifts and skills. One of the conversations I'll be inviting us to have is about discernment. That word is not just for the Ministry Discernment Committee, but applies to lots in our lives. I'll be inviting us to discern together who of our members might have the gifts and skills for the ministries of lector and intercessor/chalice bearer. These are both liturgical and pastoral ministries that are not for everyone. Often they are for the people blessed by God and the Holy Spirit with the gifts of interpretation and clarity (lector); a calm reverence and understanding (intercessor) and sacred presence of servanthood (chalice bearer). I'll be preaching and teaching a bit about this topic and look to invite us to "discern together" in early October about who might have such gifts.

Church School Update

Some interested folk met on August 17th and we reaffirmed the importance of children having intergenerational contact with Christian adults and thus experiencing the love of God in community. So, Church School for children will start on Sunday, **September 14th** using the format we adopted last year: 1st Sunday: **Gospel Lesson Discovery**; 2nd Sunday: **Church Ministry Discovery**; 3rd Sunday: **Gospel Lesson Discovery**; 4th Sunday: **Outreach/Helping Discovery**. We'll try to mimic what the adults are doing upstairs: scripture, teaching and prayers. Child care will also be available. Thad will be contacting key folks about taking a Sunday so as not to burden any one person. Interested? Please talk with or contact Thad.

Worship Committee Report

The “Worship Committee” met in its advisory capacity to the Interim Rector on Sunday, August 10th and discussed several ideas concerning worship at St. Luke’s. Thad presented these to the Vestry at the August 11 meeting and the following decisions were approved:

- CHOIR star-up will be Sunday, **September 14th** (along with Church School); music continues to be very good and Jacob will continue to challenge us.
- LITURGY: Thad had invited people to think about new liturgical elements, like trying Rite Two once a month at 8a.m.; using the ICET/ecumenical version of the Lord’s Prayer; using Enriching Our Worship version of the eucharistic prayer; and trying a new bulletin format that would have all responses needed by the people (less book juggling). Most members were in favor of trying new things, but we all had concern about the impact of “change.” We decided to keep things mostly the same as they are during this interim time. Thad will present 2-3 educational forums about new liturgical materials [such as: The ICET text (International Consultation on English Texts) of the Lord’s Prayer (BCP page 364, right-hand version) is based upon 30 years of new research about what Jesus actually said and is not a “modern language” version] and we’ll try some of the new material on a Sunday in late November.
- THE PEACE: We’ll continue to work on making the passing of the peace “not coffee hour.”
- PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE: We’ll continue using the BCP Form VI and on alternate Sundays saying together the Discernment Prayer. NOTE: We’ll save paper. Birthdays /anniversaries are in the monthly LITS.
- SPECIAL LITURGIES: **October 4th** St. Francis Day (see article on page 7); **October 19th** Feast Day of St. Luke; **All Saints Day** will be celebrated on **Sunday, Nov. 2nd**.
- LECTORS, INTERCESSORS & EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS: Thad will invite the community into a discernment process about who might have the gifts and skills for these ministries. We need some new people for these ministries. (Read article on page 2.)
- MARRIAGE POLICY: The Vestry briefly discussed the current “marriage policy” for St. Luke’s and Thad will review it to see if it is up-to-date.

Website Is All A Buzz

Having been involved in designing, maintaining and tweaking several websites over almost a decade, I have learned how visitors interact with websites based on a host of web statistics available to web designers. So what are we seeing and what might the numbers and charts mean for St. Luke’s? Interest is obviously peaking during these summer months when our Transition Ministry Portfolio is live for prospective rectors to visit online.



First, a good measure of reader interest is to know how many web pages are viewed and for how long during a given “session.” Some of our longest sessions are now up to 15 minutes or more, and these visitors are reading more than 20 web pages, plus PDFs. That is very significant when one considers the average number of pages viewed is fewer than 4 and only 3 minutes in duration.

Second, not only are these new visitors going deep into our website, they are looking at all the pages you would expect a clergy person to be interested in reading. Remember, he or she is searching for a new ministry. So the discernment page is now consistently near the top of the list of all pages visited after the home page. Then, these in depth visitors go to the worship page, music, calendar, fellowship, outreach, church education, rector, church history, and our giving tree. Additionally, content created especially for prospective clergy like the Chester OTM PDF, St. Luke’s Town Profiles PDF, and St. Luke’s Clergy Service Area PDF are being downloaded.

Third, our newsletter LITS is heavily read every month, but now our back issues are read like never before because they are linked on our archives page. Web statistics provides designers with an exact count on every document that is clicked on. So far just in the month of August alone, there were over 600 hits on the current LITS, the Office for Transition Portfolio (OTM) had 146 hits, Town Profiles 114, and Clergy Service Area 42!

One last source of visitor interest is our Flickr photo server, which provides daily statistics on what photos are being viewed. Here again, the numbers have increased dramatically.

So Bonnie, my expert web statistics partner, and I are very excited about the level of interest we have seen so far on the church website: www.stlukesepiscopalvt.org. See for yourself what our online story is saying to clergy searching for a new church to serve. You won’t skew our numbers, because new and old visitors are also counted daily.

Boca Costa Medical Mission

Margaret Hugg (Belinda Whipple-Worth's daughter) and a RN at Mt Ascutney Hospital, is embarking on a 10-day medical mission trip to Guatemala on **October 4**, as part of a medical team. Margaret visited St. Luke's on Sunday, August 24 to tell us about this special mission and to seek any support we might be able to provide. The purpose of the mission is to bring medical and surgical services and to man a clinic for persons living in rural Boca Costa de Solola, Guatemala (one of the poorest areas in Central America) – who otherwise have no access to health care. In addition to seeking financial aid to help fund the trip, Margaret is allowed to bring a 50 lb. suitcase filled with much needed supplies, including all sorts of school supplies, children's clothing in sizes 2T-4T), personal care items and first aid supplies. There will be a more detailed list of the items needed and a plastic bin at the back of the church until **September 28th**. We hope everyone will be generous in helping out. Paper Mache Angel Workshop

On Monday, **September 29**, from **1:30 p.m.-3:00 p.m.**, Belinda Whipple-Worth will hold a workshop in **Willard Hall** on making "Paper Mache Angels" for the Christmas Tea & Sale. These angels recall special childhood memories for Belinda which she shares here:

"Beginning during 'The (Second World) War,' my grandmother hosted an annual "Sugar Plum Party" for her young nieces and nephews to fill in for the sadness of the older ones fighting on various fronts. Her house was decorated from stem to stern, each corner with a different scene: snow scenes made with whipped Ivory Snow; angels; or creches; lights and burning candles everywhere! And the "Sugar Plum Tree" on the dining room table with tiny Christmas ornaments, a gingerbread dog and a chocolate cat. The table was laden with candies and cookies, 100 dozen, she said! Each year her Christmas tree would have a different theme. I remember one year a tree full of white doves (actually many were seagulls!), another year all shades of blue. Gran would make a present for each child who came. When I was a child, that meant about 60 hand-made presents. She would also frequently make a family present, these paper mache angels being one, were made in the early '60's."

Successful Backpack Collection



After 6 weeks of cajoling the St. Luke's congregation to buy and donate back-to-school items to fill backpacks, on Monday August 18th the PINS (Partners in Service) Committee met to sort and fill the backpacks. We were very fortunate to have John and Sally Hoover's son Josh and his family assist us with the work. Pencils, pens, paper, crayons, erasers, sharpeners, folders, binders, thumb drives, and notebooks were sorted. We filled 63 backpacks with appropriate items for the grades K-12 and a few pre-K packs. Then a trip to three stores to buy more thumb drives, notebooks, folders and day planners, and then we were able to deliver them to the Department of Children and Families (DCF) in Springfield. The staff was expecting us and were thrilled



to receive them. One social worker told us a story of delivering backpacks to 2 brothers last year and their excitement of receiving them and then being the envy of their friends. At the end of summer every year the DCF staff puts on a back-to-school picnic for their clients (foster families and families in crisis) and distributes the back-

packs to the kids. Every backpack has a tag with the grade level and the statement: *"Filled with love for you from St. Luke's Church Chester, VT."*

St. Luke's is the only church in this area that donates

back-to-school backpacks and every year we have been able to increase the number given. This year we included more appropriate items for each grade level and this did increase the cost. Thank you to everyone who participated in this successful venture. We could not have done this project without the generous outpouring of donations from all of you. A total of \$283.76 was spent from the PINS treasury to complete each pack.

PINS (Partners in Service) is a local outreach program: a vehicle for putting faith in action. PINS mission statement is to promote the well being and successful development of children and youth served by Vermont's DCF through creating and supporting partnerships between faith communities and human service organizations.—*Marcia Clinton*
