

St. Luke's Church invites you to participate in a traditional Seder Meal on Wednesday, April 12 in Willard Hall, beginning at 6:00 p.m. St. Luke's began holding Seders in 2006, as a way of acknowledging our common Jewish biblical roots. The Seder is a ritual meal that celebrates the Jewish festival of Passover. From the Senior Warden

Lenten Meditation

Tonight I am sitting by my fire, enjoying the Sunday evening "All the Traditions" folk music show. I get a phone call from the friend of one of my clients. Generally, I do not give my phone number to clients or to their friends. In fact, this is the first time I have ever done so. In her situation there are persuasive reasons to



make an exception to this rule of professional boundaries. The friend tells me that her friend, my client, who has recently, very unexpectedly, lost her husband, is in a very bad way. She is suicidal and refusing to accept help or hospitalization. In fact, she cannot cope with the death of her "Rock." He was the one who knew, understood and loved her in all her facets. She relied on him absolutely. She wouldn't use this language, but he was her "savior" in many ways. And then one day at work a major artery burst and he was dead. No warning. No time for preparation.

We know that the crucifixion, the death of our Savior, is coming and exactly when, because we have been repeating this cycle for two millennia. My client had no idea. Neither did Jesus's Disciples have any idea.

Even when you know it is coming, how do you prepare for the death of your Savior, the Ground of your Being?

This is all very heavy, isn't it? I give this depth of thought and feeling only the very briefest spurts of attention. Otherwise it's too much! I suspect I would not be able to bear the reality of this Death. Even though I know that Life returns, that Jesus rises from the Dead. Like my client, if I really let myself live into the reality of that death, I might conclude that it is just too hard to go on without my Savior, my Rock.

As a spiritual discipline, for the benefit of my spiritual development, what would it be like if I took the time to prepare for the death of my Savior, as though unaware that Life and Resurrection are coming in the future? What would it be like to live into the reality of that loss? What would it be like to experience the loss of that on which my life depends?

Youthful LEGO Engineers Display Amazing Creations

Thanks to NewsBank, its Chester Conference Center on Saturday, March 18 was agog with young engineers who created some fabulous entries in the sixth annual LEGO Contest, sponsored by St. Luke's. Exhibitors in grades Pre-K through Eighth—and their siblings, parents, grandparents, and friends—came from 17 towns in Vermont and one in New Hampshire. All attendees enjoyed drinks provided by Lisai's Market in Chester and donuts, partially donated by Allen Brothers in Westminster, as they reviewed the many different entries and shared ideas and techniques for their constructions.

Individual, team, and family entries were judged by grade for originality, imagination, and presentation. What met the eye was not always the whole of the exhibit. A seemingly "solid" LEGO box called "Puzzle Safe" measuring 8"x8"x4" had a hidden key that, when removed and inserted into small holes in the walls, prompted pieces to move, so that eventually a door was opened to reveal the interior of the box. Other exhibits included an arcade, pinball machine, pneumatic crane, camera, vehicles of all kinds, battle stations, ice skates, restaurants, pet centers, farms, and more. Many exhibits had movable parts—some powered by a battery—and lights.

Judges Doug Edson, Chris Meyer, Andrew Pennell, and high-school student, Gurion Lake—grandson of the Watters—spoke with participants to learn in detail the aims and special features of their designs. The judges then wrote personal comments on each exhibit card to let the contestants know what was most appealing or impressive to them and to emphasize the fact that the judges appreciated all the time, imagination, and skill involved in each entry.

Around noon, LEGO ribbons and prizes were awarded to the winner and runner-up in each grade category, and a medal was given to every participant. In the Family category, second place was won by Isaac Lake and Family of Brookfield (they are the grandchildren of Lew and Bonnie Watters) for "Red Skull's Palace."

Three special awards were also given.

Most Vermont: "Five Seasons in Vermont" by the Doran Family of Chester, VT

Best in Show: "Lego Pinball" by sixth grader Joey Gomez of Chester, VT

Creators' Choice: "Pinball Wizzard" by the Reineman-Howard Family of Windsor, VT. This award was voted the show's favorite by the contestants themselves.

Three first-place grade winning exhibits are on display during April at Chester's Whiting Library: "Vermont Fresh Food Restaurant" by first grader Victoria Turco of Chester; "Ice Skates," by second grader Michelle Klepp of Baltimore; and "Still Life Photography" by fifth grader Estella Gross of Cavendish. The public is invited to come see at their leisure some of this year's award-winning constructions and consider what might be a good entry for the 2018 contest.

Proceeds from the contest will enable St. Luke's to send a donation to the Children's Section at Chester's Whiting Library. The financial success of this event is attributed completely to generous in-kind donations from three local businesses; to financial contributions by St. Luke's parishioners Jane Davis, Pat Fromberger, Bill Hoyt, Adelaide & Red Johnson, and Andrew Pennell; and to Chris Meyer, who donated many large and expensive LEGO sets for prizes. Special thanks go to our four enthusiastic volunteer judges and to the amazing volunteer help provided by Jessica Buchanan, Adelaide & Red Johnson, Lew Watters, Kathryn Wright, and David Willis. The support from so many at St. Luke's and the community made this familyoriented and inspirational program possible and effective once again. March Vestry Meeting Highlights

The March Vestry was opened with prayer and reading of the St. Luke's Mission Statement. Our focus for this month was "Maintenance." A concern about dampness under the carpeting from condensation on the concrete floor was raised. There is no potential mold problem because the dehumidifier removes the moisture, however, it has caused the adhesive to show along the joins of some of the carpet squares. These can be replaced individually as needed.

- **Financial:** There is approximately \$11,000 left from the Butterfield Loan for renovations. The Vestry will discuss at the April meeting whether to return the \$11,000, thus paying down the Loan, or to keep it to use for the work still needed to be done. Work still needed includes repair of the flashing around the roof, repair of the red doors, and plaster work on the inside at front and back of the sanctuary.
- **Rector's Report:** Heidi reported that she has joined the Formation/Education Committee which is charged with developing a Mission Statement about Christian formation in the Diocese.
- The **Worship Committee** has decided to have an "Easter egg stuffing party" on Holy Saturday. By inviting parishioners and children to join together in this activity, it is hoped to increase the visibility of the children in the congregation.
- The **Ministerium Lenten Series** began on March 8th with a potluck dinner hosted by St. Luke's at the Congregational Church. This year's theme is "Whole Life Worship." Heidi led those gathered in a Lexio Divina style Bible study based on Genesis 12:1-4. "Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go. . . "
- Fuel Costs: There was discussion about whether or not to hold worship in Willard Hall rather than heat the sanctuary on especially cold Sundays, given the \$5,000 per season cost of fuel oil. Conversation included the themes of frugality and stewardship of our limited financial resources, providing a space apart conducive both to worship and children's Sunday school. The congregation is asked to communicate thoughts on this to members of the Vestry. (Read the article in this page for further details.)
- Treasurer: We are still looking for someone to fulfill the duties of Treasurer. (Don't be shy, if you sense you are being nudged by God!) In the meantime, the Diocese can have someone from the Audit and Oversight Committee provide some help. We may decide to hire a person outside of the parish to do some of the monthly bookkeeping and report duties.
- Outreach: At next month's meeting (April 3rd), we will be discussing our Outreach philosophy and budget as a follow up to concerns raised during the Annual Meeting.

We welcome your thoughts on this important aspect of St. Luke's mission to "broaden and deepen God's Love." Remember that all are invited to attend and participate!

- Willard Hall Rental: Motion was made to rent Willard Hall for the amount of \$75, from 9:00 a.m.- 6:00 p.m. on the 25th of March. It was seconded and carried unanimously. Janet will open and close the building, turn the Heat up and down and turn everything off at the end of the day.
- Other Matters: It was suggested by Belinda that separate discussion topics be included in our usual round of monthly focus topics. Discussion, followed by consensus to do so. General comments were made that the inclusion of this type of discussion or activity as part of the Annual Meeting may not be the most effective way to address them at the end of a long morning.

The meeting adjourned at 8:50 p.m.. The next Vestry Meeting will be held on Monday, **April 3rd** and the focus topic will be "Fellowship."








On Saturday, March 11th, St. Luke's Maple Fest Dinner & Raffle—the annual fundraiser for PINS (Partners in Service)—was held in Willard Hall. Forty-three people attended, which was a disappointingly lower number than previous years. But those who did turn out and brave the chilling temperatures that evening were treated to a baked ham dinner with side dishes, plus a choice of wine and an array of desserts—all with a hint of maple syrup. This year, thanks to a generous donation from "a friend," there were two tables teeming with gifts for the raffle held following dinner.

Many, many thanks to the faithful volunteers who step forward every year to make this one and only

annual fund raiser a success. Certainly could not do it without you!!

PINS is a local outreach program to children and youth in crisis. PINS collaborates with the Springfield Department of Families and Children. The program allows social workers and other staff to voice the needs of the children in their caseloads, needs that would otherwise go unheard and unmet.

For the evening the dinner brought in \$430, the raffle tickets sold amounted to \$345, and donations for the wines were \$66. Expenses for the event were for the meat and wines. Everything else was donated. The profit for the evening was \$662.17, plus whatever left-over food was sold.

Every year the committee asks our liaison person, Robbie Wierzbicki from DCF, for 3 or 4 families who could benefit with an Easter dinner, boxes of food staples and Easter pails filled with toys and some candy for the kids. We are looking forward to that shopping expedition.
