From the Senior Warden

The Glory of The Lord in The Wilderness

"They looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud."



Theard these words in church today. I had thought that the Glory of the Lord appeared in rainbows and the sun's corona. Or during a great spiritual event: The Birth of The Messiah, The Resurrection of the Messiah, the feeding of thousands, raising Lazarus after being three days dead. Good and positive events and places.

But here is the Glory of the Lord, in the Wilderness!

The Israelites were hungry in the Wilderness, whining and crabbing, wishing for the good old days, as Heidi described it. Wishing they had died oppressed back in Egypt where at least their bellies were full.

As I consider current world events, I fear we are on the precipice of a significant Wilderness. As I consider the hurricanes that have battered and ruined the lives of people in the Caribbean and along the Gulf Coast, I know those people and places are experiencing a dire Wilderness. I pray they may also be given grace to see the Glory of God in their Wilderness.

But, coming back to the scripture: here is the Glory of the Lord, in the Wilderness. What does this mean? Does this have any meaning for us individually? If I am experiencing some sort of bleak or black "wilderness," spiritual, or psycho-emotional, what if I were able to look ahead of me and, looking further into the Wilderness, I could see the Glory of the Lord!? It might be a profound kind of experience; one that might change me. Perhaps I would carry that experience of the Glory of the Lord within me through the Wilderness

The recent earthquakes in Mexico were devastating and frightening. In the town of Cholula many of the hundreds of domes and bell towers of the Colonial era churches were damaged. Bells will not be rung and Mass will be held outside fearing that the vibrations of the bells could bring down church buildings.

What if St. Luke's (the building) were damaged or destroyed? What if there was no beautiful Gothic-style building with an historic tracker organ?

cream, dog biscuits, cold drinks and chairs in the shade, with no expectation of a cash donation. People always asked again to double check, when we said, 'It's free.' Heard more than once: 'Really? Churches usually want money.' Many seemed touched by this small gesture of generosity on our part."

Friday, before the festival, Marti Assenza and Janet Hunter packaged baked vegetarian and purchased healthy "blessed" dog biscuits that were handed out to many dog visitors, not to mention a goat. Heidi comments: "I handed out or offered a lot of the dog biscuits and reminded the owners about the October Blessing of the Animals."

In addition there was a scavenger hunt for young people, created by Lillian Willis. Mostly adults wanted to do the hunt, especially because at the end, the prize was to ring the church bell. Under the tent there were craft projects for children, church school post cards, and a colorful handout (designed by Bonnie and Lew) about St. Luke's Church, now taking the place of the rack card. Quite a few people asked to look inside the church where Doug answered many questions. Jean was in the church some of the time and was struck by the number of positive comments that were made about the beauty of St. Luke's. People also wanted to tell their own "church" stories. Sunday afternoon, the talented duo of Jennings & McComber (Kara Watters Lake and husband Andy) performed their impressive Celtic folk music and original songs. It was a perfect ending to a fun weekend.

So why were we doing all this? Several weeks ago Rev. Heidi talked in her homily about changing attitudes toward mainline religions after talking with a visiting couple. They talked about their Lutheran church in New York, and shared about their many years of active membership and how sad they were to see their church over the years becoming smaller and smaller. "We all agreed that the Church was finding it difficult to reach Millennial and other unchurched (or under-churched). How can we get these people involved in the faith and life of the faith community?" We tried and this year's Chester Fall Festival participation may provide us with a positive way forward.

September Vestry Meeting Highlights

St. Luke's Vestry gathered on Wednesday, September 13 for their monthly meeting with a special a focus topic on "Stewardship." Rev. Heidi led a short *reflection time on John 6:1-14 about the "Loaves and the Fish." Following prayer and a reading together of St. Luke's Vision Statement, they segued into regular meeting agenda.

• Approval of Minutes: It was decided and voted upon to postpone the approval of August Meeting Minutes because a final draft had not been submitted. Both the August and September Minutes will be reviewed and approved at the October Meeting.

Additional Agenda Items:

- Fall Festival On the Green: Finalizing of plans for St. Luke's presence in the upcoming Chester Fall Festival on the Green September 16 & 17.
- **Piano:** A second point for discussion centered on an 85-year old baby grand piano for sale that St. Luke's might be interested in purchasing. (Footnote: Ashley had suggested that we look for a good piano, preferably a baby grand, for the sanctuary as the keyboard doesn't have a full sound.
- Focus Topic–Stewardship: Belinda presented "talking points" from Anthony Robinson's book, "Changing the Conversation" to get us thinking about how to approach the Stewardship Season. Basis for our conversation was the passage from John 6 (*See under reflection time.) Questions reflected upon were: "Why we personally come to St. Luke's?" "How can we introduce others to our community and engage them here at St. Luke's?" "How do we learn to fish?" Point was made to distinguish "technical problem" from "adaptive challenge." The Vestry is seeking church member(s) to lead and serve on a stewardship team or committee for our 2018 campaign. Please speak to Belinda if you are interested and need more information.
- Asst. Treasurer's Report: Nancy Pennell and Andrew are still reconciling St. Luke's financial records. Good progress is being made. Heidi raised question about which account number to use for Supply Organist reimbursement slips. The correct account for this is #5514 (Supply Musician). There was no Profit &Loss Statement because the account was not yet reconciled. Lynda, upon request by John, however, will send the Vestry the more recent Profit & Loss Statement(s).
- **Jr. Warden's Report**: Work with the lighting for the choir area of the church is ongoing. Andrew noted that the halogen and LED lights are not compatible.
- **Sr. Warden's Report:** Belinda completed her signature on the Vanguard form and handed the paperwork to Lynda to be filed.

• Rector's Report: Heid reported that the Ministerium met on Tuesday, September 12th at St. Luke's. Changes are taking place in both the Chester Baptist Church and at St. Joseph's Catholic Church. Both churches are undergoing pastoral transitions. Heidi will be attending a Diocesan Council Meeting in Rutland on September 30th. Our annual visit with Bishop Tom Ely will be on Wednesday, January 10, 2018. A vestry meeting with the bishop is planned for that date.

• OLD BUSINESS:

Final details of **Chester Fall Festival** were briefly discussed. Jean Hancock reported that people have signed up to work with planning for our Children's Sunday School program. She will organize a meeting with them for going forward. Note: (Be sure to read the follow-up "Chester Fall Festival" article on pages 1 & 3 of this newsletter.)

• NEW BUSINESS:

Rev. Heidi asked about the level of commitment to "The Upon this Rock Point Parish Partnership Campaign." It was discussed and agreed upon to have individuals contribute to this fund and to make announcements to this effect. Heidi confirmed that the Diocesan Convention Reimbursement monies are indeed to be used to reimburse Delegates most of the Convention costs not to exceed an average of around \$100. or so. St. Luke's budgets \$500. for Convention per year.

- St. Luke's 150th Anniversary: A discussion was initiated about how we might celebrate St. Luke's 150th Anniversary. St. Luke's Episcopal Church was consecrated in May of 1868. General agreement is to hold special service or services during this month. We will invite Bishop Tom to participate.
- NEXT VESTRY MEETING. Wednesday, October 11 with a focus topic of "Publicity and Communications."

PINS Update: Helping A Family In Need

Larly in September the (Partners in Service (PINS) committee received a request from Robbie Wierzbicki, our liaison at the Springfield office of the Department of Child and Family Services (DCF). She had grandparents who came forward to raise their grandson. They would need some help to make an additional bedroom for the little guy. The DCF office is able to give them \$400 towards the \$800 total cost of the addition. The majority of the members of the PINS committee voted to match the \$400 to assist the grandparents in adding a new bedroom for their grandson.

The PINS committee since its conception has asked to be contacted with specific requests on an ongoing "as needed" basis when individual needs and emergencies arise. Flexibility and creativity are defining characteristics on PINS partnerships with DCF personnel.

(SAMS) Urgent Prayer Request From The Smiths

We have not written about the violence in our Region, the Araucanía, recently. But now we will say something. Last week, in one 24-hour period, 4 churches were burned north of here. Three days ago a group of people occupied the Catholic cathedral in Concepción (Bío-Bío Region) about a situation here in Temuco. Just now, Pastor José Pino of San Mateo Church wrote on the church's Whatsapp this: "I ask that we pray for peace in the Araucanía, because there are now threats of burning churches in the city (Temuco, the capital of the region). Holy Trinity Church is on alert. Let's pray that nothing happens."

Holy Trinity is a historic, 109-year-old, downtown church, made completely of wood. It could be a vulnerable (it is the only wooden church downtown) and very symbolic target. The pastor and his family live on the second floor of a connected, old wooden building. So this prayer request isn't just about a building, but about the safety of our brothers and sisters. *Thank you*,
