No one knows when the Master is planning to return but, when the Master arrives (sometime during the night), Jesus is telling the disciples to be ready at the door of the house with one hand on the

doorknob and the other hand holding the oil lamp. The person waiting at the door is stuck there until Jesus comes! Both hands are "tied up" until the Lord comes back.

For much of this summer, we've been exploring the question about what it means to be a disciple of Christ. Luke's gospel seems to be saying to us that faithful discipleship is both action and prayer. These two words seem

From the Senior Warden

Preserving And Celebrating Our Heritage



Ispent quite a bit of time this past month exploring some of the archive files at St. Luke's in preparation for putting together an exhibit of photographs for the Open House/Tour we participated in during Chester's 250th Celebration. This resulted in a greater awareness of two things for me. The first is that we are in dire

need of a person(s) who has an interest and would be willing to bring our archives up to date and make sure they are stored properly to preserve them. This was done to a great extent by Pat Ballou and Joyce Tiemann (our former archivists) but has been sadly neglected since they both retired and moved to new communities. It never seems to merit enough priority or to go beyond the talking stage.

The second thing I knew about, but perhaps now have a greater appreciation for, after rereading some of the historic documents—are the men and women whose dedication, faith, perseverance and generosity made it possible for the organization of our parish in 1868 to be known as "St. Luke's Parish." One of the astounding facts is that the building of St. Luke's Church was completed in 1872 at a cost of \$15,000 including all the furnishings and the organ. The Fullerton family gave the majority of the funding, so you probably have noticed their names on the stained glass window behind the main altar.

We along with many past generations have also made sacrifices and been dedicated to preserving this beautiful structure and the special heritage of the St. Luke's faith community. In the year 2018 we will be celebrating our 150th anniversary. This will give us a wonderful opportunity to highlight our special heritage and share our special stories. It's not too soon to begin thinking about this celebration and making plans. If you have some thoughts and ideas, we invite you to share them with our Rector and Vestry members. We will look forward to hearing your comments.

St. Luke's Sanctuary Spruced-Up For Chester's 250th Celebration



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
Join Us For "Saturday Night At The Movies" at St. Luke's on August 20th

The Church Repairs Are Moving Right Along

Things are progressing on the list of repairs and renovations. Since the June update the carpenters from Palladium Builders have competed the replacement of all of the base trim as well as the new handicap access ramp and stairway to the north east entrance. Their workmanship and attention to detail is exceptional. Once the sign is moved to the end of the ramp and staining is done this

needed welcoming access should blend in nicely with the church building. The doors in this area are also in need of repairs which will need to be completed before winter.

Mosher Painting of Chester was on the schedule to start in late August however he started prep and painting the lower sections as fill in work prior to the official "start date". When you see the arrival of an 80 ft. man lift you will know he has arrived

to stay until completion. There is a good chance there could be some carpentry repairs needed to the back rose window sash but we won't know for sure until the lift arrives allowing for closer inspection.

Springfield Paving laid down new tarmac at the entrance to Willard Hall and by the new stairway at the north east entrance. Soon Green Mountain Seal will be coming to fill all the cracks in the existing walkways and reseal all but the new pavement.

Sparky Electric has completed the wiring for additional lighting in the choir area. The light fixtures are on order and hopefully will be installed before the choir returns in the fall.

Last fall while doing slate repair a temporary fix was made to the flashing in the tower area. The permanent fix requires replacement of a section of copper flashing which we would hope to have completed before winter.

On the interior there are areas of plaster that are in need of repair and repainting which will be done selectively.

And our Diocesan loan request has been approved (\$40,300 at 3% for 10 years) and we should receive the funds shortly! —*John DesLauriers*

Bill Dakin stopped by later in the morning with two girls visiting from Sweden. A young family of four from Perkinsville, VT were very much interested in the architecture. The father especially taking in every detail—even exploring the back side of the altar. He was very impressed with the beauty of our sanctuary. By the end of the day, 20 visitors had come through the doors. Although the church remained open on Sunday afternoon (following the services), there were no additional visitors.

A special thank you to the 5 docents (and Lillian who trained us), for being guides and answering questions about our history. Thank you to the work crew who polished up the sanctuary the week before (read the article on page 3) and to the gardening crew who created a new walkway flower bed (see July LITS) as well as to Marcia Clinton who faithfully maintains the beautiful garden beds in the front of the church year around.

Lew Watters perhaps best summed up the weekend with his comment: "I would say it was a good thing for St. Luke's to be part of the town event. Our exhibit was very well done and informative. It is a good start for planning our 150th coming in 2018."

Collecting Backpacks & School Supplies For PINS



The schools are closed for the summer, but the PINS (Partners in Service) committee have been collecting backpacks from store sales and thrift stores for the next school year. We have over 30 backpacks and would like to give 60 plus backpacks filled with school supplies as we did last year. These backpacks will be distributed to kids in foster

families or families in crisis by the social workers from the Springfield office of VT Department for Child and Family Services. The backpacks go to kids from kindergarten to high school. Items we are collecting are:

We work closely with Robbie Wierzbicki, our liaison person from the Vermont Department for Child and Family Services. We have asked to be contacted with specific requests on an on going "as needed" basis when individual needs and emergencies arise. PINS is a vehicle for putting faith in action. The beauty of PINS lies in its ability to convey a message of love, empathy and caring to vulnerable children who are experiencing feelings of loss, fear, isolation and grief. A child's realization that someone in their community cares for them makes an enormous difference to individual well-being.

Operation Christmas Child August Update



Despite expenses coming in above budget, the extra income brought us to a healthy \$3,323 surplus for the month. Our Butterfield Loan application has been approved and we should receive the loan funds in August, when painting of the church will be completed.
