Moses is remembered by most people for the event of the crossing of the Red Sea where God, after Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, parted the waters for the children of Israel to safely pass over

into another land, free from the pharaoh's cruelty. With no remaining danger or threat, Moses and the Israelites relieved and grateful, turn their hearts to God in song.

Imade an impulsive decision to fly to Franklin, Kentucky, to see the Total Eclipse of the Sun. A Spirit-led decision, I hope, because I passed up on a rare opportunity to get together with all my "Methodist Sisters," dear friends of forty years. I took my thirteen year old grandson Wyatt with me and we visited my cousin Louise who lives

right in the Path of Totality. Louise's mean but beloved mother had died just a few weeks ago, so it was a bittersweet time for us to be together.

On Monday morning, the day of the Eclipse, we set ourselves up on the front porch in rockers and porch swing with our NASA-approved glasses, overlooking soybean fields. Tracking the progress of the eclipse was interspersed with reminiscing about our childhoods and stories illustrating family relationships.

It was an intense experience, made up of my close relationship with Louise; the gradually darkening sky; my witnessing and holding her grief and the pained relationship with her mother; the cicadas getting louder as the sky darkened; puzzling over the antagonistic dynamic between our fathers; awe at what we were witnessing in the sky as the sun disappeared taking the color from Louise's lovely garden inspired by our "Gran's" garden; thankfulness for the rich creativity of Gran that she fostered in us; the intensely white corona which, indeed, looked like a crown of white diamonds; a feeing of awe, and even of relief, with the birds beginning to chirp their early morning songs as the noon time stars faded with the sun's returning.

This experience captured for me the human experience: close relationships often full of pain and confusion, but made more bearable and meaningful by nurturing and loving relationships; and spread over all, God's Crown of Glory, giving life, context and perspective.

At the airport there was a small glitch with Wyatt's return ticket. The airline representative said, "You'll just have to stay here." "That's OK," said Wyatt. "I have family here and I like them." *Amen.*

St. Luke's August Supper...


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River Produce donated fresh produce, and Lisai's Market offered their delicious hams and roast beefs at fair prices.

Completed supper surveys by guests shared a common theme: Don't change a

thing except the weather. Most of the guests have come for years and will be back next year for our 80th! They love the variety and quality. Having planned for nearly 150, the threatening weather was a big factor in the lower attendance. Church members eagerly purchased leftover meats, salads, cold soups and many desserts on Sunday morning.

This year's Silent Auction saw fewer sales due to the need to move items inside Willard Hall as weather threatened before the August Supper. Consequently, there were fewer dinner guests and bidders. However, a few sales of quality items raised \$245. Items not sold at the Silent Auction will roll right into the annual "Sale on the Screen" in September and October. August Vestry Meeting Highlights

The Focus Topics of the August 9 Vestry Meeting were Worship, Altar Guild, and the Status of the Search for a Church Musician and Supply Organists.

- Worship Committee: Heidi Edson's meeting on Saturday, August 26 will discuss the Rite I and Rite II services up to Advent. Altar Guild. Adelaide Johnson reports that Red Johnson, Rick Hunter, and George Cheney are helping their wives with duties after the services. It was mentioned that women are able to serve as Ushers at the Offertory, and Andrew Pennell will ask one or more for the next service.
- Search for Musician: Two reports from David Willis, Chair of the Search Committee, outlined the organizations that have been contacted and the minimal responses to date because schools were not in session. There will be more hope for interest when students return for the fall semester. Supply Organists. Candice Montesi will play for August; Martha Stretton in September. The subsequent schedule is yet to be determined.
- **Finances**: Assistant Treasurer Lynda Farmer reported that \$15,000 from Vanguard Funds was transferred into the checking account to pay bills. In addition to Lynda, the Vestry voted to change the second signatory on the Vanguard Accounts to Belinda Whipple Worth. **Pledges.** Andrew Pennell reports that pledges are on budget, and the deficit is in line with what was predicted.
- Junior Warden's Report: Andrew will replace certain lights in the choir area with better bulbs. Heidi reports that the second main overhead light on the left side of the nave is out.
- Rector's Report: On the second Tuesday of September Heidi will host the Ministerium meeting. Special Fall Services include an offsite September 15 Committal Service at 3:00 p.m. at Rosie Segal's Apple Orchard for Mary Farr, a former parishioner who died in Florida, and a large wedding for Sam Digel and Anna Prather from Washington, DC, on October 14, with reception elsewhere.
- New Business: August Supper. Apparently new attendees did not know about the "Silent Auction" inside Willard Hall; but signs and announcements will rectify that for future bad-weather situations, which adversely affected the number attending (about 80) this year. A complete report will follow for the next meeting.
- Protocol for Monetary Gift Giving: Monetary Gifts for pastors or departing organists, etc., should not have checks made out to the Church since that would inappropriately increase the Church's income and subsequent Diocesan assessment. In the future, a person will be designated to whom the checks should be written (with the giftee noted in

the memo line). That designated person will then cut a check to the giftee on behalf of the parishioners who contributed. Andrew has offered to accept those gift checks.

- · Restricted vs. Unrestricted Vanguard Funds: Some Vanguard accounts have restricted funds, but the records are not very good as to why; yet principal and interest need to be noted properly. Gift givers may have to be contacted about their intent and the amount of their original gifts. In the meantime, the following policy for gifts was approved and will be written up and filed in the church office. Policy for Restriction of Gifts. Unless there are external factors requiring that the funds be restricted, funds should be unrestricted. Examples. Unrestricted. LEGO income should be unrestricted because it is an internal decision: i.e., Lillian Willis proposes the gift to the Whiting Library each year. Seder Meal income would be unrestricted because recipient Kids for Peace is an internal decision. Restricted. Habitat for Humanity. PINS is unusual in that it is Marcia Clinton's decision, but all income is restricted because it all goes out as a restricted expense.
- Reclassification of Some Budget Items: Andrew and Nancy Pennell and John DesLauriers will reclassify some items as a result of the explained, and more appropriate, gift distinctions.
- Church Books for 2016. Nancy Pennell finished her review and correction of records for 2016 on August 9. Maintenance has been reclassified under Capital improvement. She will make a few changes as a result of the approved restricted vs. unrestricted policy discussed and then release the books for the 2016 Audit. A revised P&L will be distributed at the September Vestry Meeting. Nancy will then bring the 2017 records up to date and review them with Lynda to clarify the changes.
- Proposal by Bonnie & Lew Watters for the September 16 and 17 Chester Craft Fair: The Watters sent out a rationale and suggestions for activities by St. Luke's at the event. Discussion followed, and the following activities were recognized as desirable and possible.
 - **Scavenger Hunt.** Quiz by Lillian exists (add stone kitty in Memorial Garden); to start outside; needs overseers and handiwipes; those who complete the quiz can ring the church bell. No food in church.
 - **Dog Biscuits.** Jessica Buchanan has a recipe for dog biscuits. If they are made, they could be blessed by Heidi and distributed to the many people who attend the fair with their dogs.

Free Popcorn in St. Luke's bags. Andrew will check to see if his parents still have the popcorn machine.

Information. Have table with info/forms for LEGOs, wreath decorating workshops, book discussion, etc.

For the most part, several of our members are doing this and this is a good way to help them feel welcome.

- Moving Communion Location: Heidi asked for input on whether we should consider moving Communion to the bottom of stairs to the Sanctuary in view of the reality that negotiating the steps leading up to altar and kneeling at the railing has become a challenge for some of our aging membership. The conclusion was to keep things as is for now. If someone does have difficulty they have the option of requesting communion be brought to them in the pews. It was suggested, however, that we consider this approach during major services (i.e. Easter, Christmas, etc.)
- **Music & Choir.** Martha Stretton is willing to serve as Supply Organist when able.
- Morning Prayer/Evening Prayer: Morning Prayer will continue on Wednesdays. Some interest has been shown in holding Evening Prayer. We would welcome more feedback from the membership regarding Evening Prayer services. Please speak to Rev. Heidi.
- Children's involvement in Service. Plans are in the works for Children's welcome packets that will include Lessons for the day and some craft materials. Jean Hancock is working on forming a team to develop plans .for Sunday School. (See article below)
- Next Worship Committee Meeting: Plans for the Advent Season will be the main focus. The tentative date is either Saturday, October 28th or November 18th. Rev. Heidi will send out an email.

Back-To-School Backpacks Another Success

This year we were able to include flash drives for the high school students. A shopping trip was necessary to buy items to complete all the backpacks, but before we went \$95.00 in cash was donated that morning for extra supplies. The total for the buying spree was \$115.61, minus \$95 and all we had to spend was \$20.61!


