A Merry Balance

In Luke 10:38-42, Martha gets a bad rap. After all, we need Marthas to get things done and to show hospitality. (Note that Martha is the one who opens up her home to Jesus in the first place!)

Beautify The Sanctuary With A Gift Of Christmas Memorial Flowers



It has long been the tradition of our faithful altar guild members to adorn the sanctuary and nave at St. Luke's with stunning red and creamy white poinsettia plants in preparation of celebrating the birth of Christ.

Poinsettias are also called, "Christmas Star," perhaps because the shape of the poinsettia

flower and leaves are thought of as a symbol of the Star of Bethlehem which led the Wise Men to Jesus. It's said that this winter flower's association with Christmas comes from a Mexican legend. The story goes that a child, with no means for a grander gift, gathered humble weeds from the side of the road to place at the church altar on Christmas Eve. As the congregation witnessed a Christmas miracle, the weeds turned into brilliant red and green flowers. The red colored leaves symbolize the blood of Christ. The white leaves represent his purity. The plant is named after Joel Roberts Poinsett, first United States ambassador to Mexico and the amateur botanist who introduced the plant to the U.S. in 1825.

At St. Luke's Church, members give donations to purchase the poinsettia plants as memorials for departed loved ones or in special thanksgiving for family members and special friends. The Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols is possibly the best-known Christmas service in the Western world. The service celebrates the birth of Jesus by telling the story of the fall of humanity, the promise of the Messiah, and the birth of Jesus in a series of short readings



from the Bible. The readings are interspersed with carols, choral music, and congregational singing of hymns. For many it's a moving spiritual experience. Do plan on attending and bring along a friend or neighbor as well!

A Christian Symbol: Angel

Angel, which means "messenger" in both Hebrew and Greek, is a spiritbeing God created to perform tasks for him. In the Bible, angels appear in human form (always as men) to deliver divine messages. Angels appear separately to Joseph and Mary, announcing Jesus' upcoming birth, and "a multitude of the heavenly host"



(Luke 2:13) tells shepherds of the Savior's arrival. Scripture offers little information about angels, though we know some rebelled against God. Among the holy angels, categories include cherubim and seraphim.

November Vestry Meeting Highlights

The upcoming Christmas holiday season is a time of wonderful joy and anticipation, but—as the year winds down to an end—also a time of essential planning and reality.

- Focus: Finance/2019 Budget: Treasurer John DesLauriers presented a worksheet for the 2019 budget showing three columns: the present 2018 budget, Version 1 for 2019 and lesser Version 2 for 2019. He explained the changes noted in the two proposed versions. However, the two largest expenses—salary and health care—are basically fixed, and projected income is expected to be less because of the death or relocation of important supportive parishioners. **Diocese** Loan Payment. In addition, the principal and interest on the loan must be repaid quarterly for the next 10 years. The first payment starts in December at \$1,141. Thereafter in 2019 it will be about \$1,167 per quarter. Fuel. Prices are up for the 2018-2019 season, but our usage last season was low. Therefore this season we have contracted for 1,500 gallons at \$2.899 per gallon, rather than last year's 1,800 gallons at \$2.299 per gallon. Grounds Maintenance. To continue to save money, we will again have parishioners mow in the summer; but will have shoveling help in the winter. Altar Flowers. Eileen Widger has taken over as Directress for Adelaide Johnson. Until a new owner comes to Chester Flowers in January, flowers will come from Woodbury Florist or Shaw's. In the summer they may come from members' gardens. Flowers are an income/expense wash at about \$25 per Sunday for remembrance. Outreach. John proposes the same 2018 donation in both 2019 versions because parishioners feel strongly about that support. Final Draft Budget. After pledges are received, a final draft budget will be voted on by the Vestry at the December Vestry Meeting. Pledge Drive. Skits featuring Belinda Whipple Worth and Marti Assenza and then David and Marjorie Carey will be presented on two November Sundays to inspire parishioners to return their pledges before December 1.
- Junior Warden's Report: Rental Policy and Form. Andrew Pennell created a draft for guidelines and pricing. A subcommittee of the Reverend Heidi, Belinda Whipple Worth, David Carey, and Marti Assenza will check with the Diocese for samples, edit the draft as necessary, and bring a revised draft back to the Vestry for consideration. Outside Lighting. A few months ago Andrew installed a solar light on the fence post near the back walk/drive to provide light at night. He will install sensors to allow the post lights go on at dark. When the Andersons take ownership of the Moon Dog building in January, a light will be installed there to help illuminate the back area.
- Senior Warden's Report: Vestry Member Terms and Expiration Dates. Terms expire for John DesLauriers,

Marti Assenza, and Janet Hunter upon the election of new Vestry members at the Annual Meeting in 2019. As agreed before the 2018 Annual Meeting, Belinda Whipple Worth is resigning after one year of her 3-year term. John has agreed to have his name added to the slate to complete the last two years of Belinda's term to keep term timing on track. Janet and Marti will consider running for another three-year term, but the Vestry would like at least one additional parishioner who is willing to serve. Anyone who is interested should contact Belinda or another Vestry member to learn more about the opportunity to become more involved at St. Luke's. Belinda will encourage interested parishioners to serve in an article for the December LITS.

- 2019 Annual Parish Meeting: In the past, to comply with church canon, the parish has met in January and quickly passed a motion to continue the meeting on a named date in February to allow for figures to be gathered for the Annual Report, which will not be written by Lew Watters this year. A volunteer is needed to take over this important task. The report and meeting will be discussed at the December Vestry Meeting. [Subsequent to the Vestry meeting, Rick Hunter volunteered to take on the task.]
- Christmas Decorations: Greenery will be scheduled at different times for the outside and inside of the church to make the tasks easier and to allow the outside to be decorated in advance of the Christmas Tea and the Town's Overture to Christmas.
- Cookie Tour on Sunday December 9, 1-5 PM.: The Vestry supported Bonnie Watters' request to have the church open for the Main Street event and encouraged her to organize the needed docents and bakers for 20 dozen cookies.
- Next Regular Vestry Meeting: (second Wednesday) December 12th, 6:30 p.m. in Willard Hall. Focus of meeting will be the 2019 Budget and the Annual Parish Meeting.

Wonderful Wreaths!

The 2018 Wreath-Decorating Workshops once again brought delight to experienced participants and surprising, newly discovered creative talents to first-time wreath artists. Some participants treated friends or relatives to the sessions as a birthday present or special gift. Others have made the workshops an annual tradition that heralds a Christmas season filled with family and friends. One came as a result of a conversation at a St. Luke's Pancake Breakfast. Whether people came alone or with friends, all involved enjoyed decorating luxurious evergreen wreaths with myriad natural seeds, pods, berries, and different greens and ribbons especially gathered to encourage people to create their own personal wreath. In four different workshops the week before Thanksgiving, 30 people from 11 towns in Connecticut, Vermont, and New Hampshire decorated 40 wreaths that prepared them for the Christmas season with a decoration that would last well into 2019. In fact, one longtime participant confided that she had only just removed her wreath the day before this year's workshop. She said her wreath was in a covered position on the north side of her house and looked almost as good as when she hung it up one year ago.

Once again the selection of materials was unusual and vast. Special thanks for special greens supplied and the loaning of glue guns and clippers go to Pat Fromberger. Enormous thanks go to amazing gardeners Nina and Don Huffer, who scout for new natural items each year (such as this year's broom corn), grow many of the items, and contribute an astounding variety of evergreens, seed heads, pods, pine cones, and other natural elements. Appreciative thanks also go to John DesLauriers and David Willis for helping with set-up and clean-up. In addition, each man created a stunning wreath! These are multi-talented, all-around wonderful men.

PINS Provides Monetary Assistance To Local Family

The PINS (Partners in Service) committee recently received a request from Robbie Wierzbicki, our liaison person, who is working with a family in the Ludlow area. They are behind in their rent due to the father being in a car accident and no longer having a car to get to work resulting in him being let go. They are about \$1700 in debt with their landlord and the family with two small children are now being evicted. The father has found another job where he can walk to work but will not be able to catch up with the rent. The PINS committee voted to donate \$300 to the family towards the back rent.—*Marcia Clinton*
