Epiphany & New Beginnings

On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. [Matthew 2:11, Reading for The Epiphany of our Lord Jesus Christ]



Epiphany is season in the Church year when we hear the tale of the journey of the Magi to Bethlehem to see the newborn King of the Jews, Jesus. This group of Zoroasters relied on the stars in the sky to point them on their way. Matthew's Gospel is the only one to give this story we hear on the Feast Day of the Epiphany, on January 6th, also sometimes known as the "Twelfth Night." Although Matthew devotes twelve verses for this account, we are still left with some unanswered questions: How many Magi were there, for example, who were traveling to Bethlehem? Were there

women among them who were also Magi? Scripture tells us that the gifts were of gold, frankincense and myrrh, but does that mean there was only one gift of each kind, or multiple gifts of each. Each century and place in the world have their version of this story. We here in the Western world have come to recognize just three Magi for whom we have given the names of Kaspar, Melchior, and Balthasar.

To dwell on these questions is, though, to miss the truth of the message. This beautiful story of homage and worship is about God manifesting God's Self (Epiphany means "Manifestation") to the Gentiles. The tale is about the Baby King who is Jewish already reaching across

A New Church Website Is Coming

With God's grace a new web design team has come together. Members include Heidi and Doug Edson, Pat Fromberger, Marti Assenza, Andrew Pennell, Rudy and Cindy Roundy-Winston. They have volunteered because Lew and Bonnie Watters needed to step down from these demanding ministries that run on an old computer and outdated software in their home.

This journey of faith began in November when Lew approached the River Valley Technical Center technology teacher Gail Fletcher to see if there were students who would be interested in helping us in what seemed to be a daunting task. Our timing was perfect as her junior class was just beginning to study and learn web design. Our need became a class project. Using text from our old website and images from our Flickr photo server on Yahoo, nine students began by creating individual home pages using popular and user friendly software from WIX and Word-Press. Students were guided by models and examples, which our design team had suggested. In early December, nine different home pages were completed for us to review. Two designs received a majority of member votes, which were then refined and developed into fully functional sites. The winning students were instructed to include a photo slide show, colorful backgrounds with logos, links and pull down tabs to additional relevant pages.

On Tuesday December 22, just before the Christmas school break, Bonnie and Lew Watters and Marti Assenza were invited to the classroom in nearby Springfield to see student presentations. It is one thing to assemble a fully functional website and quite another to also demonstrate an understanding of complex content centered around a community of faith. We met and talked with three individual students about their creations that were absolutely amazing.

Beginning in the second week of January, Marti Assenza, Lew and Bonnie Watters will go to the RVTC classroom to begin learning how to use and manage the software sitting alongside our student mentors who will be receiving community service credit for their volunteer services. Following the advice of instructor Gail Fletcher and approval from our senior warden, St. Luke's locked in a license for the WIX software for one year at a special year-end price of \$74. Plans call for buying a new computer for the outer office to enable Marti Assenza be the lead content manager. Because the software is on a cloud server, other designated members of the design team can access the new site to update relevant content.

You can learn more about our process, and try out the WIX software on a link on our Discernment Page. There is also a link to the River Valley Technical Center in Springfield. As always, your comments and suggestions are welcome.

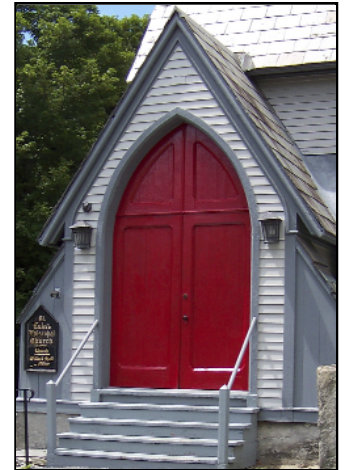
We Are “Keeping The Red Doors Open” At St. Luke’s

Before All Else Fails...

In “Too Busy Not to Pray” (InterVarsity Press), Bill Hybels cites reasons that prayers may seem to go unanswered (unconfessed sin, selfishness and so on). The most common cause, though, is prayerlessness:

“People often tell me how they have attempted to address a pressing need,” Hybels writes. “They have gone to counselors, read self-help books, claimed biblical promises, practiced self-discipline, confided in Christian friends, practiced assertiveness or submission or self-denial or positive thinking, even read books about prayer—and their need is still not met.” But when asked if they’ve prayed “fervently and regularly” about the matter, the answer is usually no.

James 4:2 says, “You do not have because you do not ask God.” So instead of thinking “When all else fails, pray,” try this: “Pray before all else fails.”

2016 Vestry Nominees

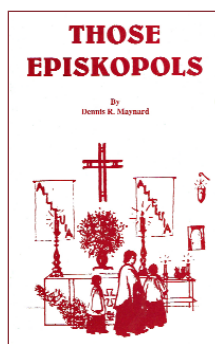
Write A Note To Our Soldiers

Epiphany Study

For the Season of the Epiphany, we will be reading and discussing the book, "Those Episkopols" by Dennis R. Maynard. This easy-to-read book is for the "Seekers" and the "Seasoned" alike who are interested in taking a closer look at the Christian faith from the viewpoint of the Episcopal Church. Our study will begin on Wednesday,

January 6th, the Day of the Epiphany, and will end on February 3rd—one week before Ash Wednesday. Each week of this five-week Study, we will focus on one or two chapters (they are very short) to talk about. A part of our Study will also include examining sections of the Book of Common Prayer that will serve to enrich our discussion.

Each Session will be offered twice weekly, at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesdays (Willard Hall) and at 11:35 a.m. on Sundays after the 10:00am service (Rector's Study.) All are invited to participate. Needed for this Study is the book by Maynard plus *The Book of Common Prayer*. Copies of "Those Episkopols" will be available for purchase or to borrow. Suggested donation for the book is \$10.00.

A little about the author: The Rev'd Dr. Dennis Maynard is a retired Episcopal Priest who served some of the largest and most rapidly growing parishes in Texas, South Carolina, and California. He currently serves as a guest retreat leader and board consultant and preacher throughout the U.S. As a storyteller, Maynard's writing style uses humor and down-to-earth language. Examples of this are in his titles: "Why Don't Episcopalians Act More Religious," "Can You Get Saved in an Episcopal Church" and "Are There Any Episcopalians in Heaven?"

Income is already over our projection for 2015 and, provided that we don't encounter any extraordinary expense, December may be in the black when proceeds from the Christmas Tea and Wreath-Making Workshops will be added. Our near-breakeven month is helping us to keep below the large shortfall projected for year-end.—*Kathryn Wright, Assistant Treasurer*
