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An Invitation To Join Us For A Traditional SEDER Meal On March 28th



St. Luke's Church will celebrate a traditional Seder Meal on Wednesday evening, **March 28 at 6:00 p.m. in Willard Hall**. Our first Seder was in 2006. The text for the evening, the "Haggadah," includes songs, readings, and responses, along with explanations of the various symbolic foods that will be used to tell the Exodus story. Following will be the symbolic meal of roast lamb and goat, chicken, roasted potatoes, vegetables, tossed salad and macaroons and meringue cookies. The Haumanns of Misty Mountain Farm will again be providing the delicious lamb and goat. Meal coordinator, Bonnie Watters, will be contacting additional food contributors.

The traditional Seder marks the night when the Israelites were "passed over" by the angel of death when the tenth and final plague—the death of all the firstborn—was visited upon Egypt. The angel passed over all homes marked by lamb's blood on the doorpost. The lamb whose

In this new iteration, there is some thought of groups having an additional focus, such as a discussion on a Bible passage. Or, perhaps, a group might want to play games, make music or have political discussions.

In any case, look for more information to come from David and Marjorie Carey. Although, when they speak about "Foyers," you may hear them say, "Foy-yay!" (See article on page 5.)

New people are being added to make parish calls. Even if you are not sick! Janet Hunter will be contacting folks asking if you might like a "casual" visit to talk about whatever is on your heart and mind: spiritual, religious, or otherwise.

When Jesus entered Jerusalem days before his death, crowds welcomed him by waving palm branches, which were common symbols of victory and rejoicing. Thus churches continue to use them in remembrance of that occasion, knowing that Jesus' crucifixion was ultimately his triumph over sin and death. As early as Leviticus 23:40, God commanded Israel to use palms in a festival of rejoicing. In Revelation 7:9-10, Christian martyrs carry palm branches as they praise the Lamb before the throne of God.

Highlights of February Vestry Meeting

The regular monthly Vestry meeting was preceded by a delicious dinner prepared by Heidi & Doug Edson to welcome new Vestry member David Carey, as well as those who were continuing during the 2018-2019 year. Church paparazzo Lew Watters appeared and snapped another entrancing Vestry photo (seen at right.)

- **Vestry Reporters for Sunday Service:** Someone asked if the Vestry reports are necessary since there is a thorough article in each LITS that gives a full report of the prior month's Vestry meeting. Belinda Whipple Worth mentioned that two comments from the Annual Meeting requested more openness and communication about what is happening in the parish. Therefore the consensus was that Sunday reports after the Vestry meeting would continue unless we receive multiple requests that they stop.

- **Focus Topic: Outreach.** Co-Chair Jane Davis reported that the committee of Jane, Co-Chair, Sally Hoover, Marcia Clinton, Marjorie Carey, Eileen Widger, and potentially Doug Edson, had not met yet. Jane distributed a tentative list of the organizations to benefit from St. Luke's donations. The list showed the amounts for each distributed in 2017 (for a total of \$5500), as compared to those suggested under the \$3600 reduced budget for 2018. Most of the 15 organizations had some reduction. Jane will get back to the Vestry with the final list after the committee has met. Although amounts regretfully had to be cut, Jane stressed that St. Luke's was responsible for additional outreach donations since the list did not include the work done by volunteers at the Foodbank in Brattleboro or the donations to the Chester Conservation Committee's environmental scholarship fund from the Wreath Workshops, the Children's Section of the Whiting Library from the LEGO Contest, or the donation to the CAES Playground from the 2018 Plant Sale. Jane will speak with Chris Meyer to see if some physical help from parishioners is needed for the State-funded breakfast club at CAES and will also investigate promoting a service project for older students (possibly help in Puerto Rico through the Diocese).

- **Treasurer's Report.** John DesLauriers explained the difference between cash accounting and accrual accounting. He suggested, and the Vestry approved, the policy that St. Luke's formally adopt the accrual system. **QuickBooks.** John wants to upgrade to the online version. The present 2014 office version is out of date and would cost over \$200

to upgrade. In contrast, the online version would require a monthly fee, but could start with a clean slate from the reconciled system that John has been working on using the accrual method of accounting; could import all past records as desired; can work with a Smart Phone, Mac, or PC; integrates with checking account and Vanguard funds and money-market accounts; can do payroll if we stop present ADT; has 2-step verification and is secure; allows authorized users to work from their homes, thereby freeing up Heidi's office and allowing John and Andrew Pennell to consult from their homes or phones, instead of having to meet at the church. The Vestry approved trying the Trial Online Version of QuickBooks for \$10.60 for four months with an evaluation of its effectiveness to determine future action. **Debit Card:** The Vestry also approved having John apply for a debit card tied to the checking account with a minimum of authorized users and stored in the safety-deposit box at TD Bank for purchasing items online (such as QuickBooks).

- **Norman Wright Gift:** A \$20,000 gift from Norm's estate and a \$1,000 donation from Dick Kingsbury in Norm's honor prompted the Vestry to approve placing \$10,000 in a money-market account (to be available, if necessary, under the passed 2018 deficit budget) and put \$11,000 in Vanguard Mutual Funds. Endowment Funds. There are both restricted and unrestricted funds. John has asked Doug Edson to look into their names, amounts,

history, and restrictions so we have a better idea of what is available and if funds are being allocated and tracked properly. He would like to discuss this topic and St. Luke's Endowment Policy at the next Vestry meeting.

- **Six Loose Ladies:** Janet Hunter reported that the business will rent Willard Hall twice in 2018 (April and June) @ \$100 each day. Janet will open and close for them.

- **Diocesan Requests.** Volunteers are needed for the Diocesan Discernment Committee for New Bishop of Vermont. St. Luke's is urged to recruit one child from outside the church to go to Rock Point Camp. Bishop Tom wants parishes to contribute to the Endowment Fund for Rock Point. The Vestry will consider how St. Luke's can help and meanwhile encourage individuals to contribute.

- **Lenten Calendar.** St. Luke's will not participate in the Ministerium's Lenten services this year because they conflict with our services and activities during Holy Week. Heidi has invited the other churches to our Seder Meal and will publicize the Ministerium services. Starting with Palm Sunday on March 25, St. Luke's services will be held in the church again. **Music:** Anne Goodreau has started Thursday choir rehearsals 6:45-8:30 p.m. in Willard Hall and will hold two separate after-church Sunday rehearsals for Easter.

- **St. Luke's Rector:** Heidi, the Senior Warden, and Treasurer will be meeting to discuss what duties and tasks from a list Heidi supplied can be taken over by others since Heidi's time was reduced to half time as of February. Heidi's **New Office Hours** are **Tuesday-Thursday 9 a.m.-12 p.m.** (Wednesday will include the mid-week service). Fridays she will work from home.

- **Old Business: Wi-Fi Tower.** Junior Warden Andrew Pennell will look into a proposal that a cell tower be added in the steeple and will come back with more information. **Mutual Ministry Review.** The consensus is to do it with Lynn Bates from the Diocese at the Vestry Retreat sometime in the spring. **Altar Guild.** More volunteers are needed. **Pastoral Care.** Janet Hunter, Marti Assenza, and Heidi are meeting to ensure St. Luke's is meeting parishioners' needs. Marjorie Carey will help. Janet proposed calling those in the Parish Directory to say hello, ask for their needs, and additions to the prayer list or other contact. She suggested adding photos of parishioners, along with their names in the Directory, to enhance recognition. **Foyer Dinners.** Several Vestry members and parishioners are interested in starting this monthly series again. David and Marjorie Carey are willing to organize the program. (Read article on this page.)

- **Next Regular Vestry Meeting:** Wednesday, **March 14th.** The focus topic will be "Maintenance."

St. Luke's Outreach Committee

The Outreach Committee budget has been reduced from \$5,500.00 in 2017 to \$3600.00 in 2018 to reflect the reductions in the church-wide budget. We, the co-chairs, Jane Davis & Sally Hoover, have met and begun the preliminary process of reducing the amounts of our donations to the many programs that we are supporting and came up with a proposed listing for 2018. This will be reviewed by the Vestry and the entire Outreach Committee team. Once everyone agrees on the proposed reductions to each of the organizations, a final list will be distributed.

Episcopal Relief & Development

Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) is one of the wonderful programs that St. Luke's supports. They have been inspired by and taken their mandate from Jesus' words in Matthew 25. ERD works with church partners and other local organizations to save lives and transform communities worldwide. They rebuild after disasters and empower people to create lasting solutions that fight poverty, hunger and disease. ERD is currently working in 40 countries and impacts the lives of 3,000,000 people.

All of Episcopal Relief and Development's international programs seek to mobilize local resources and expertise toward sustainable, community-led programs. **Their 4 core program areas are:**

- Alleviate hunger and improve food and water supplies.
- Create economic opportunities and strengthen communities.
- Promote health and fight disease.
- Respond to disasters and rebuild communities.

Episcopal Relief and Development is an organization that makes us proud to be Christian and Episcopalian. We feel that the money that St. Luke's Church sends to ERD, is used carefully and thoughtfully toward our mandate to love our neighbors as ourselves.

SAMS Missionaries Visit St. Luke's

A small group of St. Luke's parishioners (see photo below) gathered for a potluck supper in Willard Hall on Thursday evening, February 1st, and had the wonderful opportunity to meet and visit with **Russ & Heidi Smith**, SAMS (Society of Anglican Missionaries & Senders) Missionaries in Chile. Following the meal they gave a short slide presentation about their long time ministry and answered many questions about their experiences.

Russ & Heidi work in the Araucanía region of Chile to help build up the Church in this area, and are currently in the U.S. for a 3 month "Home Ministry Assignment" visiting their supporting churches, which included St. Luke's. Russ is involved in the Rural Bible Institute providing theological education to the indigenous peoples of Chile. Heidi is heading up a training program for child evangelism. They will be returning to Chile on March 13th.

St. Luke's Church has been a supporter of SAMS missionaries, Russ & Heidi Smith since the early 1980's when Rev. Andrew G. Osmun became involved with this ministry. This year due to our budget challenges at St. Luke's, we will have to reduce the amount of monetary support given to SAMS. LEGO Contest Discount Ends On March 9

This is a reminder that the early-bird discount of \$5 for the **2018 LEGO Contest** will end on March 9. While registration may be taken even on the day of the contest—Saturday, **March 17, 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.** at the NewsBank Conference Center—after March 9 the entry fee will go to \$20. This event is open to students in grades Pre-K through Grade 8 and their families. Detailed information is in the February LITS or may be found on St. Luke's website. Registration forms are also available at www.ourchester.org and www.chestertelegraph.org. Printed forms are available at the Whiting Library in Chester, at Chester-Andover Elementary School, and at the Library and the Elementary School in Grafton.



The most important facts to remember are that all creations must be original, must fit into a space 24" x 36" for a single entry fee, and will be judged on their originality, imagination, and presentation. Participants must bring their entries to NewsBank between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, March 17. If a structure is a team entry, the age of the oldest member will determine the grade category. There is also a separate family team class for collaborating children and parents. Motorized LEGOs will be considered in a separate section.

Judges will interview the entrants between 10:00 a.m. and Noon. At 12:30 p.m. LEGO prizes will be awarded to winners and runners-up in the different classes, with special awards for the Judges' choice for Best in Show and Most Vermont creations. The Creators' Choice Award will be given to the entry that the contestants themselves vote as the most outstanding creation. While the judges are looking at the entries, participants can share ideas and make an additional construction at two special LEGO stations. They will not be able to remove their creation from the special areas and won't be able to enter them in the contest, but this is a good opportunity for students to construct something different, perhaps with a friend, for additional fun. Refreshments will be on sale to make the waiting time even more enjoyable.
