"Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." Matt. 5: 16

What Does It Mean To Be Righteous?

"For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." [Matthew 5:20]



For most of the month of February at Sunday worship, we will be hearing Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. As we unpack Jesus' teachings in chapter five of Matthew's Gospel, most of us, I think, will agree that Jesus seems to be "laying down the law" when it comes to His words on "righteousness" and how we, as Christians, should live and practice this. To make matters worse, it seems that Jesus is setting the bar impossibly high by insisting that we become even more "righteous" than the scribes and the Pharisees. The burgeoning Christian community of Matthew's Gospel was experiencing the dilemma between remaining loyal to God's Word as given through Moses or to begin adhering to a new Word of God given through Jesus.

A similar dilemma confronts us here at St. Luke's as we look ahead to this year. Much like that early faith community in Matthew's time, we, too, are asking some questions about how to faithfully move forward given some of the challenges we are facing. In difficult times, it is tempting to adopt a more protective mindset that desires to hold on to what it is we have already. This way of thinking, however, often involves a (perhaps subconscious) tightening of rules or boundaries. The challenge

St. Luke's Annual Meeting: 2017 Budget Is A Major Concern

St. Luke's members gathered together in Willard Hall on Sunday, January 22, following the one worship service that morning to enjoy additional fellowship and a delicious potluck brunch. The Annual Meeting officially opened at 11:00 a.m. with a prayer led by The Reverend Heidi Edson, who also moderated the meeting. Lillian Willis was appointed Recording Secretary. Twenty-eight adults plus six children were in attendance.

- **Approvals:** The minutes from the 2016 Annual Meeting were approved and the 2016 Annual Report was accepted with several minor corrections. Lew Watters was thanked for putting the report together again this year.
- **ELECTED TO THE 2017 VESTRY:**
 - Andrew Pennell – for another three-year term.
 - Belinda Whipple Worth – for a one-year term (filling the 1-year term left vacant by Kathryn Wright.)
 - Jean Hancock and Beth Salisbury – for three-year terms. Nominations were sought for one remaining three-year slot, but none came forth.

Rev. Heidi then presented Pat Fromberger with a gift in appreciation for serving as Senior Warden this past year.

- **Diocesan Convention Delegates:** Marti Assenza, Jean Hancock, and Janet Hunter were elected as St. Luke's Delegates to the convention to be held at Jackson Gorge in Ludlow November 3-4, 2017. Alternates elected were Anita Wright, Belinda Whipple Worth, and Georgiana Cheney.

that lies before us has to do with the question of how to move forward while still honoring the St. Luke’s traditions in and of our past as Jesus honored His Jewish tradition while He was on earth.

I believe the answer lies in our understanding of this word, “righteousness” and how it is we practice this as the church in the world. First thing to know is that by virtue of God’s new covenant of grace, we are already righteous in God’s eyes. What counts is not what God wants from us; what counts is whom it is God wants! And that, my friends, is us! Jesus, who, Himself, embodied the law, fulfilling it in Himself, teaches us how to practice this righteousness from God that we’ve inherited as God’s beloved children. The “formula” that comes from Micah, an Old Testament prophet, is pretty simple: do justice; love kindness; walk humbly (Micah 6:8). That’s all we need to remember as we walk into 2017 together with God.

Ash Wednesday Services To Be Held at St. Luke's On March 1



St. Luke's is offering two worship services on **Ash Wednesday, March 1** with the **Imposition of Ashes & Holy Eucharist** at **NOON** and at **6:00 p.m.** in the Church. This service marks the beginning of our 2017 Lenten Liturgical Season that continues through April 15th (that includes Palm Sunday and Holy Week.)


Ash Wednesday, the seventh Wednesday before Easter Sunday, is the first day of the Season of Lent. Its name comes from the ancient practice of placing ashes on worshippers' heads or foreheads as a sign of humility before God, a symbol of mourning and sorrow at the death that sin brings into the world. It not only prefigures the mourning at the death of Jesus, but also places the worshipper in a position to realize the consequences of sin. Ash Wednesday is a somber day of reflection on what needs to change in our lives if we are to be fully Christian.

On Ash Wednesday, the “imposition of ashes” is symbolic of that attitude of penitence reflected in the Lord's prayer: “forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us” (Luke 11:4, NRSV)¹

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“The Light Shines Through: Our Stories Are God's Story”

“It is with joy that I share the news with you that I have written a book (my first) that is being published by Church Publishing, Inc. and is scheduled to be released in early March of this year (2017).

The title is: “The Light Shines Through: Our Stories Are God's Story.” Each chapter explores the story of a character from Scripture through the lens of what they might have experienced; however, there is a unique twist to that exploration. We read these stories all the time and every year they turn out the same. It is easy to breeze over the impact that an event might have had for that individual's life. Actually, like us, the people of scripture really didn't know how their particular situation would turn out in the moment they were living through it. They confronted the uncertainty, anxiety and drama of facing into an unknown future much like we do in our own life events—events in which we might also be wondering where to turn and search for answers. Each chapter probes an individual's encounter with faith while also reflecting on what might be our own similar experience with God.

Since these stories were selected from those in the three-year liturgical calendar, you will find familiar stories and possibly some new and interesting approaches for future preaching ideas. There are also reflection questions at the end of each chapter to assist groups that use this book for deeper discussion. Additionally, a special Appendix is included that incorporates the Scripture citations to facilitate a reader's access to the story.

I hope you might check out the link below* and see what you think. Retreat and workshop materials are currently under development based on this work as well.”

- **TREASURER DISCUSSION:** The treasurer's position at St. Luke's needs to be filled. The parishioners were asked for names of possible nominees to serve as treasurer. This is a one-year position which will be elected by the Vestry. The person does not have to be a Vestry member. Lynda Farmer will continue as Assistant Treasurer and John Hoover as Pledge Treasurer. Some names were suggested that the Vestry will follow up on as soon as possible.

- **BUDGET DISCUSSION:** The presentation and discussion of **St. Luke's 2017 Budget** was led by Andrew Pennell. The 2017 budget, which had been prepared by the Budget Committee (John DesLauriers, Doug Edson, Andrew Pennell) and was approved by the Vestry on January 9, 2017, again proposed a deficit, but this year the deficit was far greater than that of 2016. Interim Treasurer Sally Hoover is working on getting final figures, so the year-end figures and final budget can be accurate. Because there were so few discretionary items in the budget and potential cuts could dramatically change the church's ability to deliver a traditional worship experience and continue its long-time policy of tithing for "Outreach" the Vestry decided to bring the deficit budget to the parish for its input and suggestions. Questions raised: If membership is decreasing and revenues are not increasing, is it reasonable to deplete reserves and eventually close the church? What does the parish want? What is St. Luke's mission now, in light of reality?

Suggestions for financial reductions centered around a few topics and arguments pro and con. Tithing for "Outreach." End tithing for outreach or give only to those organizations geared to Chester. However, St. Luke's presently services 15 communities and is not limited to

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only Chester. Present "Outreach" donations are already mostly local. Very few suggestions have been received for outreach over the years. What about people who are members, but don't come to church? Could everyone be asked to give 10% more so the church could tithe for outreach? We could add present small contributions to Chester organizations from LEGO Contest and Wreath Workshops to the outreach gift list since they have never been counted there and those gifts come from funds that are raised from the programs themselves.

Can we reduce heating costs by eliminate heating the church during the winter, although many do not like to worship in Willard Hall. Heat budgeted for 2017 is unusually low because of a surplus from 2016, so that is not an accurate area for large potential savings. There could be a policy of not heating when the temperature gets too low for the church to be comfortable by service time.

A clarification of the Diocesan Assessment was requested. The old formula was based on a rolling average of the past three years (2013, 2014, 2015), before the biggest income drop. The new formula will base the percentage on our monthly income, and will allow monthly payments, but St. Luke's will still owe the required total at the end of the year.

Sean Whalen made note of the fact that the allocation of \$300 for Church School hasn't been spent in the past and could be eliminated. Yet that allocation is minimal now, and elimination would not support the church's desire to attract young families.

At the beginning of the discussion on tithing, a motion was made and seconded that outreach be eliminated from the budget. The discussion noted above followed before any vote. As a result of parishioner comments and suggestions, the motion was withdrawn based on the above discussions, the upcoming Vestry budget discussions, an appeal to parishioners to increase their pledges by 10%, and a revised budget that will be presented to the parish.

Parishioners were requested to make their strong feelings and suggestions known, as well as prioritized, to Vestry members in advance of the Vestry's next meeting to discuss the budget. All church members are welcome and encouraged to attend Vestry meetings.

- **TABLE DISCUSSIONS:** Following the business meeting, Lew Watters organized everyone into 4 tables (by their chosen topic of interest) to brainstorm ideas on how St. Luke's might become more visible in the community. [Read the article "Sharing Our Special Gifts" on page 5 for a summary of those discussions.]

Despite the serious nature of the meeting's focus: St. Luke's major budget deficit and the declining membership—there was a lot of positive energy generated at this gathering, which is both encouraging and hopeful for the future. We are all grateful for the steadfast faith and strength of our vibrant community. Thanks be to God!

TABLE 1. Celebrate 150th Anniversary in 2018

Have open houses with history tours. Invite/tap information from living descendants of founders or early parishioners. Have a special service with bishop in attendance, use prayer book of the time and dress in vestments of the time. Invite past members, rectors and politicians. Public relations articles should include photos old and new published in the Chester Telegraph online and other local newspapers. Conduct a capital campaign. Look to the future.

TABLE 2. Participate in the Annual Fall Festival Saturday, September 16 & Sunday Afternoon

Sean and Martha reviewed details about the old Homework Club started by Joe Grannis. Now, however, there are after-school programs through the elementary school. Although there will be competition from free breakfasts offered at the school, there might be an opportunity for a before-school program.

Universal Pre-K is in the process of being established, but it might be a good opportunity for a professional to offer such a Pre-K program at Willard Hall. Sean mentioned a Susie Couter Marsh (Susie's Little Peanuts) from Weathersfield. The program would bring income to St. Luke's and expose young families to the church. A past problem was insurance, but Zion Episcopal Church in Manchester does this now. There was definite interest in this idea.

Also of great interest was the formation of a Chess Club. There is a movie on this and the club would bring kids to an intellectual activity that is gaining popularity in the news.

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[Later Janet Hunter said that Rick would likely be interested in teaching both chess and bridge. Reports are that the new Steering Committee for the Village Master Plan might suggest adding chess tables to the Town Green. A Chess Club would seem to be a great idea and easy to do.]

Also a Bridge Club or Art classes. Previous successful watercolor classes at the Academy Building were denied access to the building and ceased. They are not in Chester at the moment, but are desired [and would fit the other arts offered on Main Street: quilting, knitting, pottery].

TABLE 4. Engage in Social Media, Especially Facebook or a Blog

Andrew: We already engage in "picture" blogging (i.e. photos on our Flickr site). We would need a person who is willing to set up and manage our Facebook page. It needs constant attention and updating. Someone needs to manage content. This might be a great way to tell about the LEGO contest, for example. Also there are services available that disseminate information (at a cost.) This service manages who sees the messages based on needs and interests (kind of like the "pop-up" ads you see when you go online.)

Pat: Lew Watters says there are at least 5 or 6 people in our parish who currently use Facebook. Could we possibly get one of them interested in managing a Facebook page? This might help us reach a younger demographic and young parents we are not reaching now. Belinda: We are immigrants in a foreign country; having to learn a new language; it's a mystery to us. Everyone agreed that the most important thing we need to consider is content. What message do we want out there? Sharing our faith? Telling about St. Luke's happenings? Other?

Each year we have given Easter dinner to 3 or 4 needy families along with food staples and Easter baskets to the kids in these families; and in August give back-to-school backpacks filled with school supplies to be distributed by the social workers. —*Marcia Clinton*





2017 LEGO Contest Is Saturday, March 18. Pre-Registration By March 10



The **2017 LEGO Contest** is taking place on **Saturday, March 18 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.** at the **NewsBank Conference Center**, 352 Main Street, Chester, VT. This event is open to **LEGOmaniacs** Pre-K through Grade 8 and their families.

Participants should construct their original creations (no kits allowed), with a maximum size of 24" x 36", and bring them on March 18 between 9:00 and 10:00 a.m. to the Conference Center, generously donated by NewsBank for the event. Entries will be judged in different grade categories from 10:00 a.m.

to noon for their originality, imagination, and presentation. If a structure is a team entry, the age of the oldest member will determine the grade category. There is also a separate family team class for collaborating children and parents. Unique motorized LEGOs will be considered in a separate section.

At 12:30 LEGO prizes will be awarded to winners and runners-up in the different classes, with special awards for the Judges' choice for Best in Show and Most Vermont creations. The Creators' Choice Award will be given to the entry that the contestants themselves vote as the most outstanding creation.

Refreshments will be on sale to encourage everyone to stay and view the different entries, as well as to share ideas and techniques during the judging. Again this year young people may create an additional construction at a special LEGO station. They will not be able to remove their creation from the special area and won't be able to enter them in the contest, but this is a good opportunity for students to construct something different, perhaps with a friend, for some additional fun.


