This is the only fundraiser for PINS (Partners in Service) activities and its success is dependent upon volunteers from the congregation. We still need dona-

tions of gift items for the raffle portion of the evening, but they need to be delivered to Willard Hall by Friday, March 10th. Contact Marcia Clinton if you have a question about what to donate or simply bring your items to the church.

PINS is a local outreach program for children and youth in crisis. We work closely with the Springfield office of the Department of Child and Family Services on an "on call" basis. The program allows social workers and other staff to voice the needs of the children in their caseloads, needs that would otherwise go unheard and unmet. Each year we have given Easter dinner to 3 or 4 needy families along with food staples and Easter baskets to the kids in these families; and in August give back-to-school backpacks filled with school supplies to be distributed by the social workers.

Lenten Ministerium Series

This year during Lent, the Ministerium of Chester and Andover is pleased to announce its 2017 Lenten Series to be held each Wednesday evening beginning on the 8th of March and ending on the 5th of April. Instead of the customary worship service held at each church in the course of the Series, this year we are planning something different. Our theme for 2017 will be "Whole Life Worship" and it will entail a unique experience at each of the churches in the course of the Series.

The Ministerium came up with this theme in January, with the wish to breathe some new life into this annual custom. "Whole Life Worship" is basically how we experience God in worship and praise in all aspects of our life together as Christ's body: through Fellowship, Reflection, Witness & Praise, the Everyday, and by sharing Communion with each other. Note: The complete Lenten Series Schedule of times and places is listed on page 7.

St. Luke's will be hosting the first week of this Series on March 8th with a Potluck Meal and a Devotional. Due to an expected large turnout, St. Luke's venue will take place at the Congregational Church in Chester beginning at **6:00 p.m.** For the devotional, the plan for now is to lead participants in a short reflection on a passage of Scripture using the Lectio divina method of study. The Ministerium is excited about this year's Lenten program and we hope that as many of you as can will take part as we reconnect with one another in our Christian community this Season of Lent. Janet Hunter is looking for people willing to help her with hosting this event with preparation, set-up, and cleanup afterwards (the Congregational Church will also help!) Highlights Of February Vestry Meeting

At the February 8th Vestry Meeting the Focus Topic was Outreach, but the 2017 Budget was also a necessary part of the discussion because the Outreach Committee needed to know if the St. Luke's would continue its commitment of tithing income from pledge and plate and what funds, therefore, the committee could count on to be allocated to support the Outreach ministry.

- Focus Topic: Outreach. The Outreach Committee. represented by co-chairs Jane Davis and Sally Hoover, responded to the budget realities discussed at the Annual Meeting by presenting a tentative plan that indicated support for specific past charities have been eliminated: CHABHA has disbanded, and Operation Christmas Child would not continue at St. Luke's because of Cindy Roundy-Winston's move to New York. The donation to SAMS (Society for Anglican Missionaries & Senders) was being halved. In addition, this year support would go to either Park Place or Our Place. Otherwise the organizations proposed for outreach support were those listed in the Annual Report. However, that report did not indicate any amount per charity because the Outreach Committee was awaiting the total sum available from the Vestry, which, in turn, was awaiting a clear picture of the church's finances and information on potential reductions for health and property insurance. After much discussion about suggestions made at the Annual Meeting, the Vestry decided that the Outreach Committee could tentatively start planning on having \$5500 available, but the committee is urged to contribute more to local causes and late in the year because the actual amount available from tithing may decrease if income does not increase.
- 2017 Budget. The deficit budget proposed at the Annual Meeting had aroused great concerns regarding the sustainability of St. Luke's if expenses continued to exceed income. Suggested revisions had included eliminating Outreach altogether, reducing or eliminating funding to anything but local charities, looking into additional ways to save on health and property insurance, and asking parishioners to increase their pledges by 10% in order continue the church's charitable giving. Accompanying these suggested partial financial solutions were statements by some parishioners that outreach was a part of Christian mission and that they would leave the church or reduce their contributions if Outreach were not a major part of St. Luke's service to the community. The Vestry left the Annual Meeting with a commitment to first resolving the insurance matters to see what reductions in expenses could be attained, but it also needed a better sense of the actual

financial state of the church. Sally Hoover is acting as Interim Treasurer to try to reconcile some confusing line items and better organize the allocations. While she is still working on that project, it is apparent from the January Profit & Loss Statement that pledges and funds received are down a third.

- Insurance. Unable to take advantage of Health Connect for the Rector, because of requirements in the church canons that funding for health insurance must come from the church budget, we discovered we could take advantage of a small employer program in Vermont that, in combination with Medicare, would allow the same coverage for the Rector at a savings of about \$3000 per year to St. Luke's. The paperwork for that adjustment has been submitted, and changes should go into effect within 2-3 months. Potential savings on property insurance still needs to be fully investigated.
- Transparency. Copies of the Agenda for Vestry Meetings and the latest Profit & Loss Statement will be available at the back of the church for anyone interested. Much of that information, as well as the approved meeting minutes, are on file in the Church Office. Oral reports by Vestry members to parishioners will continue on the Sunday immediately following the monthly meeting. Highlights of the monthly meetings will continue to be posted in the next month's LITS. The Vestry will be reporting back to the congregation as progress is made on changes to the budget.
- **Rental of Willard Hall.** The Vestry approved rental of Willard Hall to "Six Loose Ladies" for a workshop on Saturday, March, 25, 9:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m., for \$100. Janet Hunter will open and shut the hall for them.
- Ministerium Lenten Series. St. Luke's will be hosting the Potluck Supper that kicks off this series on Wednesday, March 8, beginning 6:00 p.m. at the Congregational Church in Chester (it is being held here since they have a larger hall.) In addition to contributing main dishes, side dishes, salads or desserts, St. Luke's members will be responsible for set-up and clean-up afterwards.
- Next Vestry Meeting: Monday, March 6th—the focus topic will be "Maintenance." Vestry meetings have been moved to the first Monday of the month during Lent because of the Wednesday evening Lenten Series.

Adult Study Is More And More Interesting...

Bonnie and I have been on board with the Adult Study Programs that are held weekly on Wednesdays. Our latest journey into the Gospels is from a series, "Conversations with Scripture: The Gospel of Matthew." The Anglican Association of Biblical Scholars publishes it. These study guides are composed of short chapters that lead us on a vibrant look at the historic context beginning with Biblical times as well as significant interpretations by religious scholars from mainline denominations up to the present.

Our current study is an in-depth look at the Gospel of Matthew approached from a biographical point of view. Who were Matthew's readers? Interestingly, they were both Jews and Gentiles. Thus Matthew "begins his gospel with a genealogy of Jesus 'the Messiah' (anointed one in

Hebrew) and also claims Jesus is the 'Son of God,' which was blasphemy to the Jews. The next chapter, the Teachings of Jesus is a comprehensive look at Jesus as teacher, especially his principal ideas for his disciples. We read the stories from various translations of the Bible. Finally, study author John Y. H. Yieh examines Jesus Followers, his opponents and finally his early church.

My study of the context of Gospels has provided me with a far better insight and understanding of what it means to be a Christian in the modern world. Thanks be to God.

About Partner In Health

When is the last time you were in Rwanda, Liberia or Sierra Leone? How about Malawi or Lesotho or the Navajo Nation, Haiti, Mexico, Russia or Peru? "Never" or "seldom" you say? Actually, because of St. Luke's outreach support of **Partners in Health**, you have been to all of these countries, every day.

You have built and run hospitals and clinics, made house calls, trained community health care workers and stayed for the long haul. You work with local governments and health care providers, to deliver 1st world health care to 3rd world countries (or regions of countries). You have taught HIV/AIDS prevention, helped transport patients to distant clinics, worked tirelessly to prevent the spread of multidrug-resistant strains of Tuberculosis, and set up cancer treatment centers where no treatment had previously been available.

And, right here in the United States, you work with the Navajo Nation where one in three persons are diagnosed diabetic or pre-diabetic. You train local health care workers to make house calls, diagnose and educate patients about diet and medications. You also are working to deliver fresh produce to areas that haven't previously had access to them, through the Fruit and Vegetable Prescription Program.

You are relentlessly and tirelessly delivering hope, and a better quality of life to people you have never met. Congratulations St. Luke's!!

LEGO Discount Ends On March 10

This is a reminder that the early-bird discount of \$5 for the 2017 LEGO Contest will end on March 10. While registration may be taken even on the day of the contest—Saturday, March 18 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the News-Bank Conference Center—after March 10 the entry fee will go to \$15. This event is open to students in grades Pre-K through Grade 8 and their



families. Detailed information is in the **February LITS** or may be found on St. Luke's website. Registration forms are also available at www.ourchester.org & www.chestertelegraph.org. Printed forms are available at the Whiting Library in Chester, at Chester-Andover Elementary School, and at the Library and the Elementary School in Grafton.

The most important facts to remember are that all creations must be original, cannot be larger than 24" x 36" and will be judged on their originality, imagination, and presentation. Participants must bring their entries to NewsBank between 9:00 and 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, March 18. If a structure is a team entry, the age of the oldest member will determine the grade category. There is also a separate family team class for collaborating children and parents. Motorized LEGOs will be considered in a separate section.

Judges will interview the entrants between 10:00 a.m. and Noon. At 12:30 p.m. LEGO prizes will be awarded to winners and runners-up in the different classes, with special awards for the Judges' choice for Best in Show and Most Vermont creations. The Creators' Choice Award will be given to the entry that the contestants themselves vote as the most outstanding creation.

While the judges are looking at the entries, participants can share ideas and make an additional construction at two special LEGO stations. They will not be able to remove their creation from the special areas and won't be able to enter them in the contest, but this is a good opportunity for students to construct something different, perhaps with a friend, for additional fun. Refreshments will be on sale to make the waiting time even more enjoyable.
