

## **Trinity Sunday, June 11th**

Trinity Sunday, officially called "The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity," is one of the few celebrations of the Christian Year that commemorates a reality and doctrine rather than a person or event. On Trinity Sunday, Christians remember and honor the eternal God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Trinity Sunday is celebrated the Sunday after Pentecost, and lasts only one day, which is symbolic of the unity of the Trinity. Eastern Churches have no tradition of Trinity Sunday, arguing that they celebrate the Trinity every Sunday. Westerners also commemorate the Trinity at every Eucharist, although Episcopalians set aside a special feast day for this purpose as well.

#### A Celebration of Life



**Kathryn Wright July 8, 1948 – May 15, 2017** 

Our dear sister and fellow parishioner, Kathryn Wright passed away very suddenly and unexpectedly on Monday, June 15th in her home in Bellows Falls, Vermont.

Kathryn was born in Denver, Colorado in 1948 and became an Episcopalian at the age of twelve. She told her family she wanted to go to church, so her dad directed her to "shop around." Choosing the Catholic Church after her research, he suggested the Episcopal Church. The rest is history.

Kathryn lived and traveled to many places from Albuquerque, NM where she married her late (first) husband and for more than a decade of foreign postings to Bahrain, Singapore, Malaysia, Norway, Scotland and England. I don't know when Kathryn made Vermont her home but she came to St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Chester via a "Saturday Night Supper Event" in 2005 and was a member ever since. Prior to St. Luke's she worshipped at Immanuel Church in Bellows Falls, VT and St. John's in Walpole, NH. No matter where she chose to worship, Kathryn was always fully involved and committed to her faith communities as well as the broader community—with a special interest in outreach and assisting those in need.

Kathryn was a bright and talented woman. She earned her B. S. in Accounting from the University of

Nebraska as a correspondence student through the American Embassy, and then pursued her MBA at the London School of Economics. An at-home mother as much as possible raising her two children (a daughter, Heather and son, Dana), Kathryn had twenty-five years experience using her business and accounting skills in the private sector. Administration, human resources and finance work in small area businesses in the ski industry, the travel industry, the engineering field, and the natural foods industry allowed her to go into offices in evenings and to work at home. Even in retirement she continued with one client's accounting work.

During her twelve years at St. Luke's, Kathryn generously shared her talents and commitment to the Lord, serving on the Vestry in the roles of Christian Education Coordinator, Junior Warden, Senior Warden, Assistant Treasurer, Treasurer, Finance Committee and was a Diocesan Convention Delegate. She was a member of the discernment team and as the Senior Warden during that 2½ period, guided us through the new rector search process after Paul Brannock-Wanter resigned in 2012. Kathryn was a licensed Eucharistic visitor and served on the Diocesan Council, with a special interest in The Rock Point Summer Camp, where her grandson, Hayden, was an enthusiastic attendee and later a camp counselor.

Kathryn will be remembered for her direct approach, take-charge personality, and her deep and abiding love of the Lord. She may have appeared abrupt at times, but she always maintained a loving commitment to reaching out to others in the Lord's name. She loved to cook and did catering jobs on the side to help support herself. Her richly, deep-chocolate cake became a favorite at the August Supper and other food events and will especially be missed by Norm Harrison, who ordered one every year for his birthday.

In her Senior Warden Column in the October 2011 LITS, Kathryn wrote about how nothing is small if God asks for it and how those simple words turned her into an evangelist-by-example. She quoted some words written by Mother Teresa in "The Blessings of Love" and shared how they confirmed her belief in those small things:

"Each time anyone comes into contact with us, they must become different and better people because of having met us. We must radiate God's love."

Perhaps this is a fitting legacy that Kathryn leaves to us as well. Hopefully we have become better people in knowing Kathryn and by her example will continue to radiate God's love. We will miss Kathryn's presence in our lives at St. Luke's and pray she finds peace and rest in her heavenly Father's arms. —*Pat Fromberger* 

## **May Vestry Meeting Report**

- Focus Topic: Christian Education. The adult programs have a regular following. Jean Hancock reported on the variety of books discussed at the Monday lunchtime Book Club and recommended as "powerful" reading "Dignity," written by Ann Hicks, who will be a speaker for the fall Diocesan Convention. Heidi mentioned "Painting the Stars," where diverse people were interviewed on science and religion, as the new subject for Studies on Wednesday and Sundays. Regarding the Church School, Sean Whalen and Jessica Buchanan couldn't attend the Vestry meeting, but had reported a likely decrease in regular future weekly commitment—possibly only once or twice a month. Jean and Heidi will check online programs that are available so we can determine what options exists for others to become involved in teaching Sunday School.
- Treasurer's Report. John DesLauriers reported that QuickBooks and the budget are now fixed, so the budget can be tracked in the future, and the next Profit & Lost statement will have percentage figures for all line items. John is still waiting for Diocesan help in clearing up the books: preparing a quarterly balance sheet that includes improvements to the building, shows a final accounting on work done in 2016, and brings all accounting up to date. Sally Hoover had created a list of questions for John to ask, but the man who would come doesn't know QuickBooks and will come only for an afternoon, which is not enough time to solve the problems. The Parochial Report is overdue, and an audit needs to be done in 2017. Andrew Pennell said he would like to take QuickBooks into the online version, which is more portable. The budget has "good structure" now, but the books still need cleaning up. Andrew proposed hiring Nancy Pennell (his mother) for an unspecified period of time to reconcile the 2016 books and past financials so we can be up to date, comply with required reports, and prepare for a new Treasurer to take over at the January 2018 Annual Meeting. It was clear, however, that everyone wanted Lynda to continue as Assistant Treasurer. Motion to authorize Andrew to explore with Nancy Pennell the assignment of her taking on the clean-up bookkeeping task for St. Luke's at \$15 per hour: Belinda; second, Jean; all in favor. [After the meeting, Andrew spoke with Nancy, who agreed to start immediately.] In the meantime, Andrew and John will meet to complete parts of the overdue Parochial Report that Heidi could not finish, so it could be sent to the Diocese.
- Vestry Retreat on June 2 & 3. On behalf of the Vestry Retreat Committee, Belinda reported that she had found facilitators, and Janet Hunter had arranged for the retreat to take place gratis at Gethsemane's Hall in Proctorsville. Friday dinner will include spouses/partners, be potluck, and

- start at 5:30 p.m.. Saturday will be 9:00 a.m.-3:00 pm. starting after breakfast with coffee and baked goods as a snack with a sub for lunch. The topic will be "Unbinding." Facilitators will be Todd McKee and Angela Emerson. Todd's estimate of \$625 for expenses includes the \$375 facilitators' fee and mileage, supplies (pads, markers, etc.), food, and a \$25 donation to Gethsemane Church. Since that estimate exceeded St. Luke's retreat line item of \$250 in the tight 2017 budget, Todd suggested the possibility of a Diocesan grant, with a deadline of 5/19, to fund around half of the anticipated expenses. Hence the need for a swift completion of the Parochial Report in order to qualify, with Belinda completing the rest of the grant paperwork and submitting it by the deadline. Discussion followed about how to fund the remainder of the cost, but the consensus was to proceed swiftly with the grant application.
- **Rector's Report.** Heidi will take two weeks off in June to attend CREDO for active clergy. The Rev. Susan Langle will be Supply Priest for two Sundays.
- Other Business: Community Monthly Dinner. There was lots of food on May 4, but only two non-St. Luke's attendees, one of which left because the lights were too bright. [NOTE: Some days after the Vestry meeting an email from Janet Hunter said that the remaining two sessions were postponed because of Rick's shoulder operation.]
- Recognition Sunday will be held on June 4, Pentecost, Birthday of the Church. Discussion arose as to the purpose of the "Good and Faithful Servant Award." No one knew of any written criteria for the GFSA award or if it had to be only for service to St. Luke's or could be for a St. Luke's member who did service above and beyond our faith community. The discussion about the purpose of the award will be tabled until the August 9th Vestry meeting.
- New Church Musician for St. Luke's. Ashley Paine is moving to New Hampshire, and her last Sunday will be at the end of July. A subcommittee will be formed to create a job description, start immediate advertising, and interview candidates. The committee will include Heidi, Belinda (choir representative), and someone from the congregation.
- Parishioner Letter. Lillian Willis read a letter from two parishioners who were concerned about re-engaging former parishioners, keeping those involved now, and attracting new parishioners (especially young people) to St. Luke's. Acknowledged were the pressures of jobs, chores, and sports on younger families; the small attendance at free suppers in spite of advertising; the decrease in pledges/donations coupled with the burden of relying on those with fixed incomes to fund the church and its heat; suggestion of limiting a sermon to 10 minutes; suggestion of new music events or a big supper in spring or fall (with proceeds going to heat the church). They also recommended sending out a

questionnaire to those who were not regularly attending to find out why they were not coming each Sunday. The Vestry was most appreciative that parishioners would make their concerns known. It recognized the problems mentioned, and decided—rather than send out a questionnaire—to have Vestry members commit to speak in person with those who were no longer regular attendees to find out what had changed and what could be done to both bring them back and attract new people. Heidi will help prepare a list so Vestry members can choose someone well known to them for this discussion.

## Our Place Drop-In Center Bellows Falls, VT



Our Place Drop-In Center located on 6 Island Street in Bellows Falls, is one of the many worthwhile, local, outreach programs that St. Luke's Outreach supports. As most of you know, we spend 60 percent of our outreach money on local programs and 40 percent on national and international programs. Our Place Drop-In Center is an excellent resource

for you to know about in case you or someone you know is in need of a bit of assistance on an ongoing or one time basis. The hours are listed at the end of the article for your information.

Our Place has been serving the greater Rockingham community for 25 years. It is a community meal site, food pantry and social service resource for hundreds of people each year.

The kitchen staff prepares nourishing meals with fresh food that is either donated or purchased from a variety of sources including local markets and farms and dairies as well as the Vermont Foodbank. For many eating at Our Place is one of the few social interactions in their daily lives. The food pantry is open five days a week and offers a good selection of free groceries each month to an average of 160 families. In addition, Our Place delivers more than 40 bags of groceries to seniors and disabled people each month. Some people need supplemental food every month to have enough to nourish themselves and their children, and some people only come to Our Place once or twice a year when they have a loss in wages or an unexpected expense.

Our Place also serves as a place to ask for information and assistance in navigating the complex and often confusing social service system, as well as for help in solving their unique personal and family problems.

Our Place is open Mon.-Friday: 8:00 a.m.-4:40 p.m.

All are welcome to free meals.


