It is amazing how many items will fit is these relatively small boxes. Most of the shoeboxes filled this day will be going to young boys ages 2-4 and 10-14. If you were away (as many parishioners were on this particular Sunday) you will have another opportunity to pitch in and lend a helping hand. Cindy is hoping to complete 400 boxes for this year. A Small Treasure

I wear an odd silver cross sometimes, a cross that my late husband gave me when we were living in Norway. The arms of the crude cross each end in a large lumpy disc; the image of another cross is raised in the center of the arms. The top of the vertical arm extends upward and bends over



onto the back to make a loop for hanging. It must have been made of melted metal poured into a crude mold dug in the earth. It isn't lovely and I wouldn't be so fond of it if it weren't for the words etched into the back: "Copy. Norway. Original from 900 A.D."

I'm fascinated with the idea of Norwegians living in deep snow and brutal cold, catching fish and hunting deer and praying by the light of torches. So far from the constant heat in the Middle East of Christ's birth, with vineyards and date palms. How did Christianity spread all the way to Scandinavia? Did the Vikings bring it from England and Scotland? Did a Scandinavian travel there? Or was it a longer journey that our shared faith took, arriving with some first-century apostle who came from a greater distance?

I'm sure that Sanford or Thad could answer with ease, but I'm not going ask either of them because I like pondering the questions. I like thinking about how far the Good News was able to spread in the first 900-years after Christ's death. I wonder who made the cross in His name.

Liturgy And Modern Language: Fad or What Jesus Actually Said?

On November 2, after the 10:00 a.m. service Thad will present a 40-ish minute forum about the ecumenical effort to use language that better approximates what Jesus actually said and which reflects the liturgical growth within the church over the last 100 years. We'll spend most of the time looking at the versions of the Lord's Prayer, but also some of the new language for Eucharistic Prayers (see Rector's column; pages 1-2). As part of this education we will also experience some of these materials during the 10:00 a.m. worship on Sunday, November 23 (Last Sunday of Pentecost). We hope you will enjoy learning about and experiencing a liturgy that so many churches are using in the 21st century.

language. The Eucharistic Prayer will be from Enriching Our Worship, which is part of the Supplemental Liturgical Materials prepared by the Standing Liturgical Commission and approved for use in the Episcopal Church in 1997. As they point out: "Enriching Our Worship is not intended to supplant the Book of Common Prayer, but rather to provide additional resources to assist worshiping communities wishing to expand the language, images and metaphors used in worship." With that in mind we will give thanks for language like: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Did you notice the big, theological difference from the BCP? BCP: shed for you and for many; EOW: poured out for you and for all. Yes, there is the nuanced change from "shed" to "poured," but I think the big change is that it is made clear that Jesus died for us all, not just for some select many.

Then, we'll end the month with the First Sunday in Advent. How amazing to be getting ready for and thanking God for the gift of the Incarnation. Here God looks at the human body—young, old, soft, loud, short, tall, etc.—and says "YES! What a wonderful part of my creation! I'm coming to be with you"

Finally, all through this month our Stewardship Committee is asking us to be thankful for the gift of St. Luke's Episcopal Church: to strengthen her as she gets ready for a new Rector; to support her financially to present a solid fiscal foundation for the year to come; to look at our own attitude about money and discern what generosity (and the tithe) is all about. I hope you will join me and others in this time of "stewardship" and remember that all these threads that touch our lives are gifts from God and for which we are asked to say, simply, "Thank You!"

Gifts & Skills Discernment Work

My thanks to everyone for your discernment work in October. I have been contacting over 20 people via email and will see if they feel called to any of the 6 ministries we discussed. Here is what I wrote:

"I am writing because members of St. Luke's Episcopal Church have discerned that God has given you some of the gifts and skills needed for various liturgical ministries. Here is what they read before putting forward your name: These are both liturgical and pastoral ministries that are not for everyone. Often they are for the people blessed by God and the Holy Spirit with the gifts of interpretation and clarity (lector); a calm reverence and understanding (intercessor), a sacred presence of servant hood (chalice bearer) and a combination of all with the added gift of gentle leadership (worship leader).

I have listed below the ministries for which others think you have the gifts/skills. Please look them over, think about them, pray about them and let me know NO LATER THAN NOVEMBER 6th—whether-or-not you agree that you have such gifts/skills and whether-or-not you'd like to use those gifts/skills at St. Luke's."

However, three important points to keep in mind:

- This is not meant as a way to get more bodies doing tasks for the church. This is really a chance to discern if you'd like to go deeper as a member of the worshiping community at St. Luke's and begin to help shape the liturgy through your presence. This is especially true if you see more than one ministry listed!
- This is MEANT to be a nudge from community member(s) (and the Holy Spirit?) to invite you to go deeper with God.
- IF YOU DECIDE to say "yes" to any of these ministries, then I will be working with all the folk who said "yes" about some training and "next steps" for each ministry. [Just FYI: The ministries of Preacher and Worship Leader require some more extensive training required by the Canons of the church, including being licensed by the Bishop. But let's cross that bridge if we come to it. Everything is doable!]

Thus, what a wonderful effort and please keep the people and process in your prayers.—*Thad*

Ministry Discernment Committee Trains With Exciting New Technology

On Wednesday, October 15th the MDC conducted a practice interview with Canon Lynn Bates electronically using new computer technology rather telephone interviewing. Consequently, Lynn was in Burlington, Diocesan Companion, Ann Cooper, was in Middlebury in her home, and everyone else was in Willard Hall



viewing and listening through a laptop computer projecting the proceedings on a blank wall. It was a little like being in a theatre as we could see each person full screen when they were talking in real time. Lynn and Ann could see our three-member interviewers full screen on their computer devices. We were all connected via cloud computing for approximately an hour and a half. It was a planned meeting intended to perfect forthcoming interviewing with the rector candidates we now need to screen.

The new software is called "Zoom" and is now widely used specifically for job interviewing. It allows for face-to-face visual and voice connectivity, which is so important in discerning the character and personality of each individual. After signing the church up with a paid account, I simply invited participants via gmail to join our meeting at a scheduled time. The distant participants click on a link to join our meeting. In fact, Lynn joined our training meeting already in progress with Ann, and we then began team interviewing. Those MDC members not interviewing, participated by witnessing the questioning and replies. The meeting ended with Lynn presenting us the names in a spiritually moving prayer format, which you all may see (minus the names of course) on the church bulletin board.

As this article goes to press, your MDC is waiting for replies sent to all candidates asking for their resume, profile and response to three specific questions. Then we begin the in-depth interviewing via Zoom using identical questions to each candidate in order to insure a level playing field for all. Please keep us in your prayers.
